

## **DWCUP President's Remarks**

## **DWCUP** Call your representatives

FOR THOSE OF YOU LOOKING TO TURN YOUR ANGER INTO ACTION, here's some advice from a high-level staffer for a Senator. Re-posting from a friend of mine:

There are two things that we should be doing all the time right now, and they're by far the most important things. You should **NOT** be bothering with online petitions or emailing.

- 1) The best thing you can do to be heard and get your congressperson to pay attention is to have face-to-face time if they have town halls, go to them. Go to their local offices. If you're in DC, try to find a way to go to an event of theirs. Go to the "mobile offices" that their staff hold periodically (all these times are located on each congressperson's website).
- 2) When you go, ask questions. A lot of them. And push for answers. The louder and more vocal and present you can be at those the better.

However, those in-person events don't happen every day. So, the absolute most **important thing** that people should be doing every day is calling. YOU SHOULD MAKE 6 CALLS A DAY, to each of your 2 Senators and 1 State Rep (to their DC office and their local office).

The staffer was very clear that any sort of online contact basically gets immediately ignored, and letters pretty much get thrown in the trash (unless you have a particularly strong emotional story — but even then it's not worth the time it took you to craft that letter).

Calls are what all the congresspeople pay attention to. Every single day, the Senior Staff and the Senator get a report of the 3 most-called-about topics for that day at each of their offices (in DC and local offices), and exactly how many people said what about each of those topics. They're also sorted by zip code and area code. She said that Republican callers generally outnumber Democrat callers 4-1, and when it's a particular issue that single-issue-voters pay attention to (like gun control, or planned parenthood funding, etc...), it's often closer to 11-1, and that's recently pushed Republican congressmen on the fence to vote with the Republicans. In the last 8 years, Republicans have called, and Democrats haven't.

#### Guidance when calling:

- A) When calling the DC office, ask for the Staff member in charge of whatever you're calling about ("Hi, I'd like to speak with the staffer in charge of Healthcare, please") local offices won't always have specific ones, but they might. If you get transferred to that person, great, if you don't, that's ok ask for that person's name, and then just keep talking to whoever answered the phone. Don't leave a message (unless the office doesn't pick up at all then you can but it's better to talk to the staffer who first answered than leave a message for the specific staffer in charge of your topic).
- B) Give them your zip code. They won't always ask for it, but make sure you give it to them, so they can mark it down. Extra points if you live in a zip code that traditionally votes for them, since they'll want to make sure they get/keep your vote.
- C) If you can make it personal, make it personal. "I voted for you in the last election and I'm worried/happy/whatever" or "I'm a teacher, and I am appalled by Betsy DeVos," or "as a single mother" or "as a white, middle class woman," or whatever.

## **DWCUP** Call your representatives

- D) Pick 1-2 specific things per day to focus on. Don't rattle off everything you're concerned about they're figuring out what 1-2 topics to mark you down for on their lists. So, focus on 1-2 per day. Ideally something that will be voted on/taken up in the next few days, but it doesn't really matter even if there's no vote coming up in the next week, call anyway. It's important that they keep getting calls.
- E) **Be clear on what you want** "I'm disappointed that the Senator..." or "I want to thank the Senator for their vote on... " or "I want the Senator to know that voting in \_\_\_\_\_ way is the wrong decision for our state because... " Don't leave any ambiguity.
- F) They may get to know your voice/get sick of you it doesn't matter. The people answering the phones generally turn over every 6 weeks, so even if they're really sick of you, they'll be gone in 6 weeks.

**Please keep in mind**: If you don't like calling and feel awkward, that is ok, many feel that way and there are scripts online (Indivisible has some). However, after a few phone calls, it starts to feel a lot more natural. Afterall, we are their employers and we are merely calling to speak to them about issues and asking them to do their jobs.

#### **Helpful step:**

Put the 6 numbers in your phone (all under P – Politician.)

The Clerk of the House maintains addresses and phone numbers of all House members and Committees, or you may call (202) 224-3121 for the U.S. House switchboard operator. You will hear a recorded message asking which Congressional member OR Senator you want to reach.

### **DWCUP Legislative Report**

As Legislative Liaison to the Democratic Women's Club of Florida (dwcf.org) my task is to attend weekly Zoom meetings, report to you what the positions are on the bills, and pass on any alerts asking for us to contact our senators and representatives. These meetings have not started yet.

To support the liaison task, I have written a program to scrape the websites and create a spreadsheet of the bills. These are the websites: <a href="flsenate.gov">flsenate.gov</a> flhouse.gov</a>

I have prioritized and commented on many of the bills on my own, currently without DWCF input. I would appreciate any comments you might have. I can relay any concerns you may have during the DWCF zoom meetings. DWCF can make our voices heard!

2025 Florida Legislative session runs March 4 through May 2. There have been two special sessions - 2025 A, and 2025 B. These are also captured in the spreadsheet.

2025 A was held for a single day. It covered immigration, the petition process, and denying in-state tuition to dreamers. The legislature closed the session without passing any bill.

2025 B was then held, covering immigration. A bill passed, with an appropriation of over half a billion dollars. It makes the Commissioner of Agriculture the immigration head, funds bonuses for local law enforcement who participate in detentions, creates a new law enforcement division under the Department of Agriculture, transfers authority from other departments to Agriculture department including authority to declare immigration emergency. It punishes unauthorized alien voters and anybody who aids them. It punishes unauthorized alien criminals more harshly, including capital punishment. All detention facilities must report inmate immigration status. No sanctuary cities. Deny in-state tuition to dreamers. Provide physical assets to help the federal government address illegal immigration.

# 373 bills have been filed for the regular 2025 session: Democrat:

Guns - safe storage, background checks, licensed dealer requirements with respect to sales/transfers, no undetectable or unserialized firearms, no 3D printing guns, expand list of sensitive areas, more severe punishment for using machine guns

Elections - elect President by National Vote, prohibit spending money advertising against ballot initiatives

State Preemption - local control of crane regulation (Lindsay Cross - relates to St. Pete crane hurricane event). Repeal gun regulation preemption.

Insurance - resolving disputed property insurance claims, have citizens provide windstorm coverage and private insurance provide fire, etc. (similar to what Carl Zimmerman presented to us), spread risk nationally to lower our insurance

### **DWCUP** Legislative Report

Rights - require one physician not two for abortion, and if needed to preserve fertility. ERA ratification. Incarcerated has right to request pregnancy test.

Education - free school breakfast and lunch

Criminal Justice - Youth conflict resolution program, criminal rehabilitation, inmate education

Workers - heat illness prevention measures

#### Republican:

Guns - lower the age to 18. Repeal prohibition on bump stocks.

Culture War - government entities can't display political flags (but can display neutral flags? - vague). Expedite claims related to adverse reactions to vaccines, ban weather control.

State Preemption - state regulates Presidential Library

State Park Preservation

Affordable Housing - incentivize ADUs

Consumer Protection - improve unlicensed vendor regulation

Education - local control of school start times

## DWCUP Who We Are

The DWCUP is one of 66 Democratic Women's Clubs of Florida, begun by women in Pinellas County on September 9, 1940, forming the Democratic Club of Upper Pinellas County. Today, DWCUP carries on their goals.

The Democratic Women's Club of Florida, Inc. (DWCF, Inc.) began in 1956, on May 24, the day chosen by First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt as Democratic Women's Day, with the aim to unite all Democratic Women's Clubs in Florida by providing a forum for discussion of public matters, supporting qualified candidates for public office, and encouraging qualified Democratic women to seek elected positions. In the 1980's, DWCF became a full member of the National Federation of Democratic Women (NFDW). DWCF is a separate entity from the Florida Democratic Party but DWCF is recognized as the Florida Democratic Women's Caucus because DWCF maintains full membership in the NFDW.

DWCF members and clubs support campaign activities. The DWCF recruits women to run for political offices. The DWCF Political Committee which disseminates money to DWCF-endorsed candidates. The Legislative Chair and Legislative Liaisons of the DWCF, Inc. serve as the grassroots legislative advocacy arm of the DWCF, to monitor and lobby for or against legislation that has a dramatic impact on the lives of the citizens of Florida.
