Our DWCF" with speakers Phillip Miner and Yolanda Russell on August 6th, and "Understanding Senate Bill 7050 Confirmation" on August 20 with speaker Brad Ashwell. I getthe notices in an email, but anyone can attend these by signing up on <u>dwcf.org</u> so keep an eye out for webinars of interest.

# DE&I - Understanding How Florida's Demographic Changes Influence Our DWCF

Phillip cited many statistics based on data on the Office of Economic & Demographic Research website <u>http://edr.state.fl.us/Content/</u>. Did you know that 49 percent of women Democrats did not vote last year! 67 percent Hispanic, 55 percent Black, and 42 percent White did not vote. Florida population growth is due to people moving into Florida more so than the birthrate. Black and Hispanic cultures are not monolithic - don't assume minority groups will always vote Democratic. We must engage minority groups to persuade them to vote Democratic. We must also strive to increase the diversity of our clubs.

Yolanda talked about looking for recruitment opportunities by approaching people by caring. Let them know we care. Develop a community resources flyer to help new people moving in. Find out what the minority-owned businesses are and frequent them. Provide material for minority newspapers as well as for local neighborhood papers. Participate at food drives and other volunteer events. Make ourselves known!

### LEGISLATIVE REPORT (con't) Jean Greenawalt, 8/28/23

#### **Understanding Senate Bill 7050**

Brad addressed two main areas of concern: Voter Registration and Vote by Mail (VBM). The law has made it difficult for 3rd party voter registration groups (3PVRO) to handle voter registrations as many of us have been made aware of in previous DW-CUP meetings.

Collectors can no longer fill out forms, they must fill out receipts, certain convicts or non-US citizens cannot handle the forms, tightened timelines, exorbitant fines, etc. Not being able to copy filled out forms and not allowing non-US people to handle the forms are currently "enjoined", meaning blocked, while being legally challenged. Bottom line - inform and engage voters to send registrations themselves, without even being part of a 3PVRO.

The law has shortened timelines for Vote By Mail requests and rejects multiple ballots returned in one envelope. Voters must either vote, update their records, or request a mail ballot within the last two federal elections. Public notices of names removed from the voter rolls is to be put on the elections website and not published in newspapers. (I didn't see anything on <u>votepinellas.com</u>). Most important point - requests for VBMs is abysmal! We need to inform and engage voters who may be thinking they will get a VBM but they won't.

Rene also spoke about the importance of getting voters registered and getting them to the Polls.She mentioned how she and the other County Commissioners were meeting frequently in regards to Hurricane Idalia.

Jarine Dotson presented Petitions for Clean Water and to put Abortion on the ballot.

Beth Davis presented a slide show describing the numbers of Democrats, Republican and Independent voters in Pinellas County. She passed out Postcards for our Postcard Project and 18 members signed up.
