
from our candidate for US Congress, District 13, Whitney Fox. She won a tough



# Florida amendments in 2024: Besides marijuana and abortion, what else will voters see?

The general election will be on Tuesday, Nov. 5, 2024, and each amendment must get at least 60% of the vote to pass. Here's what you need to know.

## Amendment 1 - Partisan School Board Members

"PARTISAN ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF DISTRICT SCHOOL BOARDS — Proposing amendments to the State Constitution to require members of a district school board to be elected in a partisan election rather than a nonpartisan election and to specify that the amendment only applies to elections held on or after the November 2026 general election. However, partisan primary elections may occur before the 2026 general election for purposes of nominating political party candidates to that ofice for general election ballot."

Voting yes on this amendment (HJR 31) would make district school board elections partisan again, the way they were before voters decided to make them nonpartisan in 1998.

Candidates' political parties would be listed with their names on ballots.

Voting no would leave the races nonpartisan.

Supporters say these races — often highly politically contentious these last few years over controversial issues such as COVID mitigation and book banning, with Gov. DeSantis e v e n we i g h i n g i races — are already becoming partisan and this would add more transparency. Critics say this would just increase the partisanship.

## Amendment 2 - Right to Fish and Hunt

# Amendment 3 - Recreational marijuana

"ADULT PERSONAL USE OF a n dMARIJUANA. i—rAltopys adults 21 years or older to possess, purchase, or use marijuana products and marijuana accessories for non-medical a npersorval condumption by the sanotking gnindgensteron, or otherwise; allows Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers, and other state licensed entities, to acquire, cultivate, process, manufacture, sell, and distribute such products and accessories. Applies to Florida law; does not s h i n gchange, or imemuneze violations a of, federal law. Establishes possession limits for personal s h i n gusea Attows comsistent legislation.

Voting yes means anyone 21 years old and older would be able to use and possess up to 3

ounces of marijuana with not more than 5 grams in a concentrated form (with assorted restrictions). Pot could be sold through marijuana dispensaries without the need for a medical marijuana card.

Voting no keeps recreational marijuana illegal.

Smart & Safe Florida proposed this amendment and nearly \$55 million from the state's largest medical marijuana operator Trulieve launched it. Attorney John Morgan, who was instrumental in getting medical marijuana legalized, has endorsed the amendment. If it passes, Florida would become the 25th state to legalize marijuana for fun rather than just medical use.

In a recent survey of likely Florida voters from the University of North Florida's Public Opinion Research Lab. 64% were in favor of recreational marijuana. But Gov. Ron DeSantis, other GOP leaders, police groups around the state a n d Association all oppose it. DeSantis launched Florida Freedom Fund, a group partly devoted to funding opposition to Amendment 3, chaired by the governor's chief Uthmeier.

Supporters say making it legal would remove some of the power of Central American drug cartels, decrease gang violence, ease the workloads and expense

of law enforcement and the justice system, ensure that marijuana users have a safe, regulated product, and bring in potentially hundreds of millions in tax revenue for the state.

Critics say it would increase criminal activi accidents, homelessness and hospitalizations. DeSantis has said the measure would be "bad for quality of life" because "this state will start to smell like marijuana in our cities and towns."

## Amendment 4 - Abortion Access

"AMENDMENT TO LIMIT GOVERNMENT INTERFERENCE WITH ABORTION: No law shall prohibit, penalize, delay, or restrict abortion before viability or when necessary to protect the patient's health, as determined by the patient's healthcare provider. This amendment does not change the Legislature's constitutional authority to uire noti guardian before a minor has an the abolition." ida Sherifs

amendment would void that law.

Voting yes would make abortion legal until fetal viability, which is generally considered to be around 23-24 weeks. It would also allow abortions when necessary to protect a patient's health, as determined by a health care provider.

Voting no would leave abortions illegal in Florida after 6 weeks a c t i v i t y , unless twofphysicians are willing to state that the pregnant person would die without one.

DeSantis, Florida Republicans and anti-abortion groups are strongly against this amendment, claiming it is too vague and will lead to an unregulated abortion industry. Supporters say it will put control over the pregnant person's body back where it belongs, with the person and their healthcare provider.

In the UNF poll, 69% of those surveyed said they'd vote yes compared to only 23% saying no.

The group behind the amendment, Floridians catioProtecting Fraedopnalorstean t challenge this week to the state's nancial i mpact attached to the amendment which warns of increased nabostions and fewerllive birthso and says the total impact is indeterminate. The group rckailmed shat Senatter Præsident of Kathleen Passidomo and House Speaker Paul Renner did not have the authority to reconvene the panel to write another statement, but the Floria Supreme Court turned it down.

#### **Amendment 5 - Homestead**

Ζ С "ANNUAL ADJUSTMENT TO HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION VALUE: Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution to require an annual ustment for value of current or future homestead exemptions that apply solely to levies other than school district levies and for which every person who has legal or equitable title to real estate and maintains thereon the permanent residence of the owner, or another person legally or naturally dependent upon the owner is eligible. This a me n d me n t t a e s 1, 2025."

This one, HJR 7017, came from the Florida Legislature and would tie a portion of homestead property tax exemptions to i n at i on rates.

Voting yes could mean savings for homeowners who apply for homestead exemptions.

Voting no would leave homestead exemption rates as they are now.

Supporters say that tying the homestead exemption to

in ation rates c homeowners money. Critics say that this could seriously hurt local government revenues by draining non-school government property taxes by nearly \$23 million in the 2025-2 scalin aadt\$112 million within affew years, according to a legislative analysis.

# Amendment 6 - Public Campaign Financing

amount themselves — \$150,000

c o ufdr gbversnor and \$100,000 for cabinet positions — from state residents. They must also abide by state campaign as well as certain contribution limits.

Supporters say the amendment

would save taxpayer money and help fund other government services. Critics say this amendment from the Florida
Legislature would wealthy candidates and candidates getting big-donor cash by keeping other candidates from competing on a more equal level.

Florida voters added public

constitutional amendment that
tried to repeal
2010 failed, getting less than
53% of the vote.



#### THE REPUBLICAN PLAN TO STEAL THE ELECTION

Kamala Harris is moving quickly toward defeating Donald Trump. My concern is that winning the most votes of the people in the General election (the total of all the votes if the people), is subject to the rules for the Certification of Presidential elections.

Most of us know, but have forgotten, that when we vote for President of the United States, we actually vote for an "Elector" who represents the candidate we voted for. Electors are appointed by the Parties. These are positions with historically little to do. Through all the elections prior to Donald Trump's arrival on the political horizon, the named Electors have been appointed in recognition of their good work for their political party. They are honored to be chosen. The task of the Electors is to receive the ballots, verify that all ballots cast have been accounted for and to Certify those ballots. They then pass the ballots on to their State for the next step - State Certification. That is all they do!

Once an election is held, it is subject to being filtered through the Electoral College based on each state's census of their Representatives in the House and Senate - two votes for Senators and one vote for each representative. The fact that the political Party chooses the Electors is very important to the Republican plan. The first task for the Certification of the Election is the Certification of the ballots by the Counties, then the States, and finally at the joint meeting of the House and Senate at the Capitol (which last took place on January 6, 2020.)

If the Ballots are not Certified by the Counties, they cannot be passed off to the State. As a result, refusal at the State level stops the Certification of the ballots by the State and the Congress. (It would have been easier if we could simply vote our choice of Candidates. It has not been a concern until Trump made his appearance as a candidate.)

For 2024 the illegal Republican plan can stop the Certification to choose the President. The plan is then to use the chaos resulting in the refusal to Certify the election results to put the Election into chaos and work to destroy the system. Right now, the very basis of the Elector system is being put into the hands of criminals who are willing to destroy the American system of elections in order to allow Trump to become President again.

If they succeed, it will be next to impossible to return to what has made this country strong. More important, the Republicans are working in the background to weaken the system followed by a plan for the destruction of the system and American Democracy. The ultimate plan is to put in place Project 2025. They have been planning what they now call Project 2025 for years and have found their criminal Candidate.

Mark Elias is the attorney whose firm, Democracy Docket, was responsible for fighting this Republican plan in 2020 and 2022. He and his group of attorneys won all 60 cases regarding Donald Trump's invalid electors attempting to stop the election system in its tracks in 2020. But that was when there were just 60 cases. We can expect many more. Many cases against fraudulent electors cannot be decided in the time allotted if the Republicans succeed with their plan.

Fortunately, Mark's firm is not working alone in 2024. Many Democratic states realize the threat and are planning to use the Legislatures to stop the Republicans from their plan to destroy the Electoral College. Some states have passed or are passing rules that do not allow an Elector to refuse to Certify an Election. Many have included prison time for any Elector found guilty. Obviously, Republican states are not going to cooperate.

We need to talk about this and make sure everyone knows what Republicans are doing. We can send letters to the Editor; find out where and when Electors will meet; attend the meeting; and ask questions. We need to do our best to stop the Republicans from undermining the election results. It is important that we act now and continue through until we win. The fate of the future of this country is in the hands of those who fight for a system that has been in place for centuries. Democracy must continue to prevail in the United States of America.
