

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1st Reading: Isaiah 60:1-6

In the Hebrew Scriptures, Jerusalem has been the center of all worship, the Temple of God. As such, the early Church interpreted this passage as the fulfillment of God's promise in Jesus Christ, the light that shines on all humanity. The secondary meaning is that it points to God's universal gift, as exemplified by the visit of the Magi.

2nd Reading: Ephesians 3:2-3a, 5-6

Jesus Christ is revealed to all humankind through the evangelization of St. Paul and his followers. When Paul died, the Church was made up of both gentiles and Jews, worshipping together and taking the strengths and gifts of both cultures forward into the future.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 2:1-12

Traditionally, the Magi were thought to be gentiles, and though Matthew doesn't say this specifically, today's OT reading refers to emissaries from *Midian*, *Ephah*, and *Sheba*, all gentile nations. This is important because it symbolizes the recognition by all nations of Christ's sovereignty. There is great supernatural majesty in this story, with Magi (astrologers, perhaps, who draw meaning from the movement of the stars) following one bright, mystical star with hope and trust to the birthplace of Jesus- from the line of David in the City of David. They give their kingly gifts to this baby, fulfilling prophecies spoken eons before, bowing down to him gratefully and humbly. And, perhaps unknowingly, they thwart the evil machinations of a great, jealous king by obeying the message given them in a dream. There is such magic in this story that God seems to leap out of the words

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Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement.

If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-Hour Child Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or at www.compss.state.pa.us/cwis and should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.

RECEIVING COMMUNION

As Catholics, we fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when we receive Holy Communion. We are encouraged to receive Communion devoutly and frequently. In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, participants should not be conscious of grave sin and normally should have fasted for one hour. A person who is conscious of grave sin is not to receive the Body and Blood of the Lord without prior sacramental confession except for a grave reason where there is no opportunity for confession. In this case, the person is to be mindful of the obligation to make an act of perfect contrition, including the intention of confessing as soon as possible (canon 916). A frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance is encouraged for all.

"WHAT GOES UP, MUST COME DOWN"



The Holy Father Addresses Young People

"Dear friends, we are not made for a life where everything is taken for granted and fixed, but for an existence that is constantly regenerated in giving, in love. And so we continually aspire to something more that no created reality can give us," he added, "we feel a great and burning thirst, so great that no drink of this world can quench it. Faced with this thirst, let us not deceive our hearts by trying to quench it with ineffective substitutes! Let us listen to it, instead! Let us make it a stool on which we can climb, so that we can look out, like children, on tiptoe, at the window of our encounter with God. We will find ourselves before Him. who awaits us, or rather, who knocks gently on the window of our soul (cf. Rev 3:20). And it is beautiful, even at 20 years of age, to open our hearts wide to Him, to allow Him to enter, and then to venture forth with Him, toward the eternal spaces of infinity."
