1st Reading: Genesis 18:20-32

This early Abraham story makes the point that God is just, only condemning those who are truly sinful, and not taking the innocent with them. In this case, the people of Sodom are so guilty of transgressing God's laws that not even ten innocent people could be found. Although the story may be somewhat fanciful, it does show God's inclination to be merciful, as well as His willingness to listen to human petitions for mercy.

2nd Reading: Colossians2:12-14

The idea that Christ's death on the cross has 'taken away' our sin- both the sin of Adam and our personal sin- is so fundamental to Christian faith that no true believer could ever question it. The 'mechanics' of atonement have been debated for centuries, but the simple fact of it seems to be part of our deepest, almost unconscious, understanding of what the Christ event is all about. God's mercy knows no bounds.

Gospel Reading: Luke 11:1-13

When Jesus gives to his disciples the Our Father, he is teaching them not only *how* to pray, but in effect encouraging them *to* pray. He emphasizes and illustrates this in verses 5-13, finishing with the promise of receiving the Holy Spirit. All prayer involves a contract of sorts between God who is merciful, and humans who are sinful yet repentant. As salvation history unfolds, Abraham's simple prayerful petitions for the people of Sodom reach their symbolic zenith in Christ's prayer given to his disciples. The fruit of all prayer is Christ's sacrifice, God's response to the cries of dying humanity. In our secular world it is easy to lose sight of this, but within God's creation, within our deepest thoughts and desires, we hunger for God. The path to being with God is Jesus Christ, and prayer is how we find the path.






Things still needed for the Potluck Dinner:

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement.

If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-Hour Child Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compss.state.pa.us/cwis and should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.

Have You Ever Considered A Vocation to the Priesthood?

Those living in the world today know many things: despair, anxiety, doubt, confusion. To say we are living in a time of great hope doesn't seem like the obvious description, and yet, as Christians, we know this to be true – for hope requires "placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit" (CCC 1817).

As Catholics around the world continue to celebrate the Jubilee Year of Hope, our local Church in the Diocese of Scranton also rejoices in hope as more of our young people decide to answer the Lord's call. This year, Bishop Joseph Bambera accepted five new seminarians from three different countries, four different countries, and five different parishes.

The increasing number of seminarians for the Diocese of Scranton correlates to national trends noted in the 2025 CARA Report, which surveyed more than 300 men preparing for priestly ordination across the United States.

God has given you a vocation to serve him in a way that no one else can. This vocation may be to serve him as a diocesan priest. If you place your trust in the Lord, you too can discover the hope found in loving and serving God and then share that hope with a world that is all too familiar with despair.

- Have you ever felt called to follow a plan greater than your own?
- When you hear God's word, are you filled with a desire to share it?
- Do you want to lay down your life to minister to God's people?
- Are you drawn to the diocesan priesthood?

If you answered "yes" to one or more of these questions, God may be calling you to serve his people as a priest. Where do you go from here?

• First and foremost, listen to God's voice in prayer. As the Catechism tells us, "Hope is expressed and nourished in prayer, especially in the Our Father, the summary of everything that hope leads us to desire" (CCC 1820).
