1st Reading: Acts 9:26-31

Saul was a Pharisee prior to becoming convinced of the truth of Jesus Christ, and he persecuted many of the followers in the name of orthodoxy; it is no wonder the disciples would suspect his intentions! But God is bigger than Saul and his righteousness, bigger than the fears of the original disciples, and when Barnabas introduces him to the disciples they immediately accept him. Actually, as an interesting side-note, Barnabas is a nickname given to one of the first 'new' followers, Joseph. The nickname 'Barnabas' means: *Son of Encouragement* (Acts 4:37)

^{2nd} Reading: 1 John 3:18-24

This passage compresses several Christian teachings, but the one that fits best with the general theme this week is that: *God is greater than our hearts and knows everything*. In the early church, when all was new and being formed as events unfolded, remaining true to Christ's teachings was more than devotion- it meant survival. Trusting God to show the 'way' is how the church was formed; out of a simple seed came the glory of Christendom.

Gospel Reading: John 15:1-8

Connectedness to Jesus, to God, is how the 'fruit' of God's plan grows. Some scholars believe that the branch taken away refers to Judas and that the pruning refers to persecution of the apostles later; but whatever the writer originally meant, the metaphor still works. The church cannot grow, cannot survive, without taking spiritual nour-ishment from Jesus. When a branch is removed from the vine, though the young grapes may seem fine at first, they will never mature. This is a very effective lesson for instructing us to remain within the community: to continue receiving the wisdom, the encouragement, and even the pruning that our Church always provides. From Jesus to Peter, from Peter down the centuries to Francis, from Francis to Joseph, and then to all of us, the vine is not broken.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.
