#### 1st Reading: Isaiah35:1-6a, 10

As with all prophecy, the meaning may not be fully understandable until much later. The words of Isaiah refer to Judah's restoration after the exile, but God's full meaning can only be understood with the advent of Jesus Christ. The signs of the Messiah are: '*Then will the eyes of the blind be opened, the ears of the deaf be cleared; then will the lame leap like a stag, then the tongue of the mute will sing.* 'And, of course, we now understand Isaiah's words more fully.

#### 2<sup>nd</sup> Reading: James 5:7-10

Jesus Christ entered human history 2000 years ago, and He will complete human history upon His return. The entire Christ event is marked by Advent, from nativity to final judgment, and the beginning and the end can't be separated. Christmas is not just a marker for Christ's birth, but it also marks Christ's entire purpose. We must be patient, because Christ will be returning. Advent is the reminder.

### Gospel Reading: Matthew 11:2-11

In prison John seems to be questioning what he already knows is true: that Jesus is the Messiah. I suspect that from the prison cell (in which we all find ourselves at one time or another), each of us asks the same question. And Jesus' answer for each of us is the same as it is for John: *the signs have been posted, the Word has been spoken, and anyone who accepts me is blessed*. Doubts follow us from one crisis to the next, and they will never go away. But Jesus has fulfilled the promise, and the promise breathes New Life into us from moment to moment; we need only listen to the gentle whisper within.
