1st Reading: Isaiah 62:1-5

Third Isaiah (chapters 56-66) is thought to have been written by one of the prophet's scribes after the exile, but before Jerusalem had been rebuilt. This passage poetically envisions a time when the city is fully restored and, as all good things are measured, it pleases God. When accomplished, Jerusalem will be like a bride to God and He will love her and adorn her accordingly.

2nd Reading: 1 Corinthians 12:4-11

The focus here is on a breakdown of God's gifts to the Church: those intended for spiritual development, for service to the community, and for growing the Body of Christ. Paul emphasizes that no gift is given for an individual's benefit or glory, but for the glory of God *through the Church*. During Paul's time, the church of Corinth was influenced by Gnosticism, a heresy that held knowledge of the cosmos to be more important than grace from God, and Paul here is making certain that the Corinthian Christians understand the difference.

Gospel Reading: John 2:1-11

This familiar story has been unpacked for centuries and there is very little to say about it that hasn't been said before. What does seem particularly important during these uncertain times is the symbol of water being turned into wine, the old into the new. The wedding was a Jewish ceremony that resulted in a sort of human synthesis of two people and two families into something new and different, just like water becoming wine; the result of this joining is the hopeful creation of new life. The transformation of water into wine foreshadows the hopeful creation of the Church as 'new' life brought into being by the death of Jesus. The connection is undeniable. If so, then Mary's instruction to Jesus becomes much more than a premature introduction of a minor miracle: it becomes recognition (and acceptance) of the crucifixion. And once again Mary's wisdom in these matters becomes a beacon for us to follow.

The effect that the COVID-19 pandemic had on the daily lives of our Holy Name of Mary parish community continued to be with us in 2021. Despite these uncertain times, the spirit of holiness – the ability to do what needs to be done when it needs to be done – was manifested by our faith and our love for Jesus.

On behalf of the Kiwanis Club of Montrose Area and Interfaith's Susquehanna County Christmas Bureau, I would personally like to extend a gracious and heartfelt "THANK YOU" for helping make the Christmas Season of 2021 a blessing to the less fortunate children and families in our area. Because of your benevolence and charity, you truly helped to make a difference in their lives.

Our parish donated an extremely generous total of \$3,010.00 (\$2680 last year). Many parishioners increased their donations in anticipation that the need would be greater this year than it was last year. All of this money was used to purchase new toys and gifts.

The Jesse Tree had 25 toy and gift tags and all of these were taken by parishioners. All of the tags were returned with the purchased toy or gift and given to Interfaith for distribution. Many other individuals, organizations, and churches throughout Susquehanna County also participated by donating toys and gifts and/or money.

As expected, there was a big need to help all the families that applied for assistance. The final results were that over 360 families with 978 children woke up on Christmas morning to the joy of having presents under their Christmas tree. A total of over 3,400 new toys and gifts were donated and distributed. In addition, many senior adults were provided food baskets and gifts. All total, 1806 children, parents, and seniors were served and helped this year. May the Love of Jesus bless you and you families for caring and sharing through your many acts of kindness!!
