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1st Reading: Nehemiah 8:2-4a, 5-6, 8-10

When Ezra read the Torah before the people, then explained it clearly, he was instituting a pattern that would be followed (later) in synagogues until this day. But the timing of this event followed the return to Judah from Babylon and was a reinstitution of return to obeying the Torah, as fundamental to Judaism as temple worship. Actually, the pattern of reading, explanation, and worship are at the heart of our liturgy today in the Christian church.

2nd Reading: 1 Corinthians 12:12-30

When Paul says: 'Now you are Christ's body, and individually parts of it', he is identifying Christ as the Church and all of us in the Spirit as being within the body. When Paul compares parts of the human body to each other and then to the entire body, he is speaking figuratively. The message is pretty clear as a result: when we humans who make up the Church operate together as one body we are what Christ wants us to be within the Body, the Church. Each of us has a role to play and no single role is more important than the other; easy to understand, but oftentimes difficult to accept.

Gospel Reading: Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-21

The first thing to note here is that the reading skips two entire chapters, and includes only the first four verses of the first chapter. The first chapter verses introduce the gospel as Luke's (presumed objective) version, and the fourth chapter verses give a sort of mini version of the beginning of Christ's ministry. Luke emphasizes a couple of important points here: that Jesus ministered under the influence of the Spirit, and that He was the fulfillment of messianic teaching. So putting the two parts together suggests that what we are reading is an accurate account of what happened both chronologically and spiritually. Luke was writing for a primarily Greek audience so the intention is to teach, rather than preach and to approach Christ's life in a logical, objective sort of way.


