1st Reading: Exodus 17:3-7

In the Hebrew Scriptures the symbols of water, mountain, and desert are used consistently to precede or establish an important event and/or lesson. In this instance Moses follows God's direction and shows the people that they needn't worry, God is in charge. This message, a message as basic as providing water to the thirsty, is delivered over and over again. It seems that, as readers of scripture, we should always note the mention of these three symbols and pay attention.

2nd Reading: Romans 5:1-2, 5-8

Paul here seems to be saying that through our faith in Jesus Christ, the hope we share for the promise of being with God eternally is witnessed by the indwelling Spirit and the peace and love that follow. Actually, it helps to make this case by also reading the missing verses:

Not only that, but we even boast of our afflictions, knowing that affliction produces endurance, and endurance, proven character, and proven character, hope (Romans 5:3-4)

This seems to suggest that 'hope' is forged in the struggles that we endure in life, and this makes a little more practical sense out of Paul's argument.

Gospel Reading: John 4:5-42

Although this story can seemingly be mined of meaningful material almost indefinitely, the most obvious understanding of it is probably the best fit for the other two readings this week. Jesus extricates 'sin' from the morass of legalism and defines it properly as: being unreconciled with God. Jesus is the savior and trumps all that came before it, including both Samaritan & Jewish beliefs (and their forms of worship); he is the Way, the 'true' water of Life. He also, to both the Samaritans who were 'evangelized' by the woman, and his own disciples, reveals the Truth of his mission in that it is not of this earth but by (and for) the will of God.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.
