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1st Reading: Malachi 3:1-4

Some scholars consider the messenger to be Malachi, while others believe it refers to an angel of the Lord; most early Christian interpretations see the messenger as John the Baptist. All interpretations view the messenger as a figure who calls for a purification of the priestly rites of sacrifice and a return to the Torah, or the Laws of God. 2^{nd} Reading: Hebrews 2:14-18

This passage clearly recognizes Christ in his role as High Priest, who through his own human death becomes the sacrifice for all humanity, and through his own divinity serves as the translator of that sacrifice into life eternal for that same reborn humanity. This is where the ancient Jewish rites of Temple sacrifice become complete. **Gospel Reading: Luke 2:22-40**

Jesus' is being presented at the Temple in order to fulfill the Law, i.e., circumcision. This can be understood in two fundamental ways. First, Jesus is raised in and meets all the traditional requirements of his people before God; he is obedient to the strictures of God's Law. Secondly, and more importantly, his presentation foreshad-ows a greater obedience, a greater fulfillment, as the completion of God's Law before humankind. Symbolically, Simeon recognizes Jesus as Messiah and submits to the Truth of it by giving himself over to the inevitability of death, but with the sure knowledge of Life for all, Jews and gentiles alike. Simeon, at least within scriptural chronology, is the first to accept Christ in this formulaic way. Anna, as prophet, provides not just confirmation of the Messiah's presence, but lends authenticity to his arrival (as a prayerful fixture within the Temple itself). It is almost as if Simeon and Anna become spiritual surrogate parents within the Temple announcing his Lawful role within God's plan.


Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.
