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1st Reading: Isaiah 43:16-21

This passage refers to the imminent return to Judah from exile in Babylon. The people are encouraged to look to the future when God will release them from captivity much as he freed their ancestors from captivity in Egypt. It is important for them to focus not on the past but what lies in store for them in the present.

2nd Reading: Philippians 3:8-14

Paul is explaining to all who might think that they have been saved through baptism, once and forever, that living in the present with hope in the resurrection is where all Christians should be. The crucifixion and resurrection of Christ is how Paul lives, not as one who has already been perfected but as one who strives for perfection. We live out the crucifixion and find our eternal joy in the promise of resurrection.

Gospel Reading: John 8:1-11

Jesus wants all to know that God forgives sin, and in this story, he makes his point to those who would judge rather than forgive: if God forgives, who are we to condemn? He also recognizes that sin is a reality in human life and, when the crowd of self-righteous folks has left, instructs the woman to go and sin no more. One RC commentator suggests that when Jesus addresses the 'adulterer' as 'woman', he is extending dignity to her, and this fits perfectly with the tone of the story. When Jesus obliquely and quietly accuses the self-righteous crowd of also being sinners, he is extending some measure of dignity to them as well. God is not interested in humiliating or publicly accusing us of our sins; God is interested in forgiving us first and then encouraging us to get on with our lives *without continuing to sin*.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at <u>www.com-</u>

pass.state.pa.us/cwis. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.
