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### 1st Reading: Acts 4:32-35

The emphasis here is on community. As Catholics, community has always been stressed: *in the sacraments, in the liturgy, in our sense of what it means to be a Christian.* In fact, we believe that our faith community forms us and without it we are lacking in the essential ingredients that make us true to our understanding of Christ and of our calling. The earliest expression of what it means to be a Christian is reflected here in this passage. Our faith is not found in a collection of individuals, but in community. There is a difference.

### <sup>2nd</sup> Reading: 1 John 5:1-6

John here is focusing on baptism and crucifixion as the basis for, and expression of, our belief. And it is through these two that we can confidently overcome any secular notions of our faith as superstition or blind obedience to antiquated religion. Jesus overcame the world, and we as children of God overcome the world with him.

### Gospel Reading: John 20:19-21

Thomas believed in Jesus, otherwise he wouldn't have been sharing quarters with his fellow disciples of Jesus. His problem was that he didn't trust what his friends told him about what they saw; *he didn't trust his friends, his companions, or his community.* Not a single person since the ascension has seen Jesus- not even Paul who only heard Jesus on the road to Damascus- and yet Christianity still flourishes around the world. The legacy, the truth, of Jesus Christ has been entrusted to the Church, and it is through the community of believers that we first learn of and then trust in Jesus Christ. When Jesus blesses those who have 'not seen yet believe', he is recognizing and blessing the community that holds Christ's sacred trust of Faith, Hope, and Love for all generations to come. The Body of Christ is the Church and we are its members. Faith isn't just about belief in Jesus; it is about believing what our friends- our Church- teaches us.

#### Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.




Religious Education Classes are held in person in the Parish Center beginning at 10:00AM, after the 9:00AM Mass.

## **Divine Mercy Sunday**

In the Jubilee Year 2000, **Pope John Paul II** proclaimed that from that year forward the Second Sunday of Easter would be celebrated as Divine Mercy Sunday. This was proclaimed at the Canonization Mass of St. Faustina Kawalska, who worked throughout her life to make all aware of the merciful love of God. St. Faustina (1905–1938) was born and raised in Poland. Following a vocation to religious life, she was accepted by the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy. As a member of the Congregation, she worked as a cook, gardener, and porter. In her spiritual life, her contemplation on the Mercy of God led her to develop a childlike trust in God and deep love for her neighbor.

#### Learn more about St. Faustina:

In her years in the convent, St. Faustina heard a call from God to make God's mercy known to the world so that the world may more fully receive God's healing grace. St. Faustina promoted the Chaplet of Divine Mercy which consists of the recitation of prayers to the Eternal Father with the use of the rosary for the sake of Christ's sorrowful passion.

#### The Chaplet is prayed as follows:

1. Begin with the Sign of the Cross, one Our Father, one Hail Mary, and the Apostles' Creed.

2. On the Our Father beads, recite the following:

*"Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of your dearly beloved Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world."* 3. On the ten Hail Mary beads, say the following:

*"For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world."* 4. Repeat step two and three for all five decades.

5. Conclude by reciting three times:

"Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world."
