

1st Reading: 1 Kings 19:19a, 11-13a

This is a very simple, almost childlike story that draws on primal symbols of God's presence: the power of nature, of God's creation. But, as Elijah discovers, God reveals Himself to those seekers who look beyond the natural, beyond the obvious. Elijah learns that God is much closer, more intimate than noisy demonstrations permit. He learns that God is like a whisper at the entrance of the cave- the cave where he is sheltering from the storms of life.

2nd Reading: Romans 9:1-5

Paul here is lamenting the sad fact that certain of his people have 'officially' rejected Jesus as (being) the Messiah. He recognizes that God has worked out His plan through the lives and culture of the Jewish people, but he can't understand how that blessed, chosen people could then reject the fruits of their storied history. Note that Paul doesn't blame anyone, nor does he declare the rejection inconsequential, he simply anguishes over it; he is too wise to judge. As in the first reading, God's presence is found in the unexpected.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 14:22-33

Jesus walking on the water has become one of those clichés that makes most of us uncomfortable- not because of the supposed improbability of it, but because it has become a sort of joke to secular nonbelievers. But what is really going on here? Like Elijah finding God whispering to him apart from the storm, the disciples find Jesus walking to them in the midst of the storm. The message here isn't that Jesus can walk on water, but that Jesus is present to us no matter how dire the circumstances, and no matter where we find ourselves. And, not coincidentally, the message isn't that Peter lacked faith, but that Jesus was there to lift him up when his own fear prevented him from trusting his Lord. We are all stranded in the same boat, threatened by the same storms, and Jesus will always come to us where we are.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at <u>www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis</u>. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.
