1st Reading: Genesis 9: 8-15

This was the first covenant made between God and humanity. Unlike the Old Testament covenants to follow, which were ostensibly made between God and the Chosen People, this was intended as a pledge to all humankind *as well as* all other living creatures. It is no coincidence that God's first covenant is non-specific regarding the human family and the last covenant, salvation through Jesus Christ, also embraces all humankind. It is also interesting to consider that God included *all life forms*, not just humans, in the covenant.

2nd Reading: 1 Peter 3: 18-22

Peter (or perhaps a later scribe) connects up the symbol of water flooding the world with baptism. It is likely that this was understood as the water buoying up the eight humans on the surface of destruction much as the waters of baptism lift humans up sacramentally to salvation. The author makes it clear that the water of baptism does not wash away physical 'dirt', but the spiritual sort. To recognize that Christ's salvation has taken away sin is the message.

Gospel Reading: Mark 1:2-15

Mark's version of Christ's desert experience seems very short and almost terse when compared to Matthew and Luke. But, curiously, Mark suggests something that the other two do not: *He was among wild beasts, and the angels ministered to him.* Mark also says nothing about Jesus fasting for the forty days. Some commentators believe that this was intended to suggest that the angels fed Jesus during the forty days, much the way the Israelites were fed manna during their forty years in the desert. Whatever the reason for this difference, the result was the same: Jesus was symbolically prepared during His desert experience for the ministry to follow; as God prepared the Israelites for the Promised Land, Jesus was prepared for announcing the Kingdom of God to all humankind.

10,501 families were served in Catholic Social Services food pantries from March to July, 2020.





Lenten Reminders

Lent is a time for sacrifice and for spiritual renewal as we reflect upon our baptism and the call given to each of us to walk as disciples of the Lord.

As faithful followers of Jesus, we are traditionally encouraged to honor the sacred season of Lent by embracing the three pillars of Lenten observance:

1. **Almsgiving** – generously giving to those in need
2. **Fasting** – practicing self-discipline and self-denial
3. **Prayer** – reading, hearing and reflecting on the Word of God

Lent is also a penitential season. It is a time to seek forgiveness, to look inward, and to admit our shortcomings and failures. It is a time to regroup and to prepare. How can you spend your time during Lent?

1. By **“giving up”** things you hunger after, such as sweets or alcohol; or activities you desire, such as vacations, concerts or movies.
2. By **“doing”** things to help others, such as offering an extra donation to the poor or helping those in need by providing food or clothing.
3. By **“adding”** to our normal routine, such as going to daily Mass, praying the Stations of the Cross and going to confession.

Lenten Reconciliation

One of the greatest opportunities given by the Church to assist us in our response to the Lord’s invitation to conversion is found in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Once again, the Diocese of Scranton is participating in **“The Light Is On for You.”**




Little Black Books for daily meditation during Lent are available in the back of the church for you to take.
