1st Reading: Job 7:1-4, 6-7

Job was a wealthy, contented man, and more importantly, he is an innocent man who deserves no 'divine' punishment. He is challenged by misfortune and learns that life can very easily turn from happiness to suffering despite his innocence. (In the end of the book, Job realizes and accepts that God alone makes up the rules; both joy and misery are part of God's domain. Suffering, then, has no humanly understandable explanation. Earning grace, so to speak, is not possible. Job accepts that it is enough to be alive in God's mystery.)

^{2nd} Reading: 1 Corinthians 9:16-19, 22-23

Paul here explains that his mission has been initiated by God, is defined by God, and is for God alone. He makes it clear that those who hear him speak hear him because he tailors the gospel message for their ears; he effectively takes himself out of the picture. Paul was the greatest evangelist of all time in large part for that reason. Paul serves as God's conduit rather than as an important man of God.

Gospel Reading: Mark 1:29-39

Jesus saves people. This passage simply and directly chronicles a series of healings and exorcisms that, through his actions, define Christ's mission. Jesus was not a philosopher, nor was he a founder of some new religion. He was not an inscrutable teller of tales, nor a teacher of oracles. Jesus was not what everyone thought he was, and probably is not what we think he is today. But we can be certain that he was, is, and always will be the *Savior of the World*. We can learn about Jesus and we can study his historical presence, we can paint his picture, sing him songs, pray him prayers, but in the end we can only know Jesus by encountering Him and, in the words of Job:

I know that you can do all things, and that no purpose of yours can be hindered. By hearsay I had heard of you, but now my eye has seen you. Therefore, I disown what I have said, and repent in dust and ashes. (Job 42:2-6)

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.

ASH WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 14TH, MARKS THE BEGINNING OF LENT

The following fast and abstinence regulations are observed:

- 1. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fasting and abstinence.
- 2. Fridays during Lent are days of abstinence.
- 3. *All Catholics who have reached their 14th birthday* are to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and on all Fridays during Lent.
- 4. All Catholics over 18 years of age to the beginning of their 60th year are bound to the obligation of fasting. Those bound by this rule may take only one full meal and 2 smaller meals unless dispensed or excused.

Lenten Reminders

Lent is a time for sacrifice and for spiritual renewal as we reflect upon our baptism and the call given to each of us to walk as disciples of the Lord. As faithful followers of Jesus, we are traditionally encouraged to honor the sacred season of Lent by embracing the three pillars of Lenten observance:

- 1. *Almsgiving* generously giving to those in need
- 2. Fasting practicing self-discipline and self-denial
- 3. **Prayer** reading, hearing and reflecting on the Word of God

Lent is also a penitential season. It is a time to seek forgiveness, to look inward, and to admit our shortcomings and failures. It is a time to regroup and to prepare. How can you spend your time during Lent?

- 1. By "giving up" things you hunger after, such as sweets or alcohol; or activities you desire, such as vacations, concerts or movies.
- 2. By "doing" things to help others, such as offering an extra donation to the poor or helping those in need by providing food or clothing.
- 3. By "adding" to our normal routine, such as going to daily Mass, praying the Stations of the Cross and going to confession.
