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1st Reading: Jonah 3:1-5, 10

This book was written after the exile during a period of strict Torah fundamentalism. The author was probably trying to deliver a message to his Jewish audience: *God is a universal God, who welcomes all*. Very much like Jesus, preaching the Kingdom of God, Jonah preaches to the Ninevites God's love and mercy. It is telling that Jonah is reluctant to do God's bidding, and is surprised (even upset) that the Ninevites, Gentiles, actually listen. Changing one's opinion, particularly about others, is hard.

2nd Reading: 1 Corinthians 7:29-31

Paul here is no doubt anticipating an immediate return of Christ, and hence cautions against worldly pursuits. But despite the fact that Christ has yet to return the advice at its core is still valid because *no one of us* can know when the end of life will come. Nothing is permanent, everything changes, and no life is immortal.

Gospel Reading: Mark 1:14-20

Jesus here is announcing his purpose: *to preach the Kingdom of God*. Included in this, Mark emphasizes the place that Jesus has in the story, that is, Jesus is the fulfillment of God's promise. The gospel is good news for all of humankind and in order to *get it*, change is required. That change, or 'repentance', includes loving God faithfully and believing in the Kingdom. When Jesus preaches it is literally the Word of God, the divine Logos become flesh. As we hear Jesus we can be transformed, changed, and our lives can be swept up in the mystical reality of the Kingdom. It's all about faith.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at <u>www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis</u>. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.
