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1st Reading: Deuteronomy 18:15-20

In Jewish tradition all prophets followed Moses and were invested with God's Spirit accordingly. Early Christians see Jesus as the spiritual successor of this prophetic line, but also as the fulfillment of all prophesy since he alone will bring creation back into himself at the end of all time.

^{2nd} Reading: 1 Corinthians 7:32-35

Well, however this verse is spun, Paul still 'prefers' celibacy to marriage. It is also true that he doesn't condemn marriage, nor does he seem to 'require' it for proper service to God. The easiest way to understand this passage is to read it in context with the earlier verses in chapter 7, where Paul clearly expects Christ's imminent return. If we truly expected Christ to return next week, we might consider putting off our wedding plans.

Gospel Reading: Mark 1:21-28

The key here is that Jesus, '*unlike the scribes*', teaches '*with authority*'. Of course, the authority is from God and the people know this (perhaps from *what* he taught, though that isn't clear). Clearly Jesus is portrayed as being received by the people as a power-filled rabbi, a prophet of substance. When Jesus then miraculously casts out the demons, that authority found in his teaching is underlined. But the teaching authority is what is important; Mark seems to understand this, as he concludes the miracle story by re-emphasizing Christ's 'authority'. Two thousand years later, we may look at the miracle with some measure of modern skepticism, but Christ's *teaching with authority* is what keeps us believing. His words of teaching issue from the Word of God.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at <u>www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis</u>. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.
