1st Reading: Jeremiah 23:1-6

Jeremiah is preaching about the poor leadership of the Jewish kings who allowed Judah and Israel to be captured by both the Assyrians and then the Babylonians. He recognizes a merciful God who would bring his people back together after the exile. The successor to David’s throne, as understood by Jeremiah, was simply a ruler who would obey the Law, but the Christian church sees this as a foreshadowing of Christ’s Kingdom.

2nd Reading: Ephesians 2:13-18

The author here continues to break open the teaching of the cross: *all are justified through Jesus Christ, not through adherence to the Law*. After Christ’s sacrifice all- Jews and Gentiles alike- follow the savior, the Christ, who has become the embodiment of the Law. To put a point on it: *loving God and loving others is the moral exercise of all Christians and it is synonymous with obeying the Law*.

Gospel Reading: Mark 6:30-34

This passage suggests that the apostles were overwhelmed by their followers and that Jesus took them away for a restful teaching session. When they meet the crowd at the presumed resting spot, *Jesus is moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd*. Some scholars believe that this piece was added later in order to emphasize Christ’s ‘shepherding’ nature; whether this is true or not, Christ as shepherd of his human flock isn’t in dispute today. But what is interesting about this passage *today* is the notion that Jesus felt compassion for the twelve, his disciples, because they were under so much continuous pressure from the eager followers who just wouldn’t give them any time to themselves. Priests, bishops, religious have always been susceptible to this sort of stress and Jesus encourages them to ‘get away and rest’. This ‘alone time’ is when Jesus can teach his disciples and encourage them. It applies to all of us as we turn to Him in prayer.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-Hour Child Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.

APPRECIATION DINNER

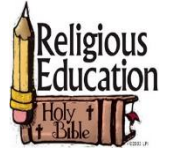
Please join us for an appreciation dinner on Sunday, August 4th at 11:00AM on the church grounds.
