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1st Reading: Exodus 24:3-8

There is finality to death as understood in this sort of ritual in the sense that there can be no turning back. When God entered into this covenant with the people, and the people vowed acceptance, it was viewed as irrevocable and sacred. The agreement was sanctified by sacrificial blood and the blood represented covenantal finality. In effect, the people were committing themselves to God's Law *unto death*.

^{2nd} Reading: Hebrews 9:11-15

Christ, both human and divine, both God and mortal, is the only priest who can mediate the eternal with the mortal. Christ is both the sacrificial blood and the final acceptance on behalf of all humankind. Christ is the prism and the Light, both potentiality and action, both matter and energy, both shadow and Truth. Jesus Christ is our human apology to God for not living up to the covenant, and at the same time the Divine Love that has always forgiven us.

Gospel Reading: Mark 14:12-16, 22-26

In the darkness of human ritual, Jesus shared his divine light with his disciples. Their limited human impulses and grasping understanding followed the light, followed the illumination that drove back pain and ignorance and shadows. Jesus crafted Love from simple bread and wine so that out of the primal God could always be found for those who tried. When God crafted humanity from earth and implanted a spark of His own image within, He made a profound promise: *you are mine and I am yours for all eternity*. Jesus articulated this promise at the Passover meal and sealed it with his own blood. And today as always we continue to struggle, continue to mourn our ignorance, but within the Love of the Eucharist we can now find a promise of Divine Light that is real.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.

BIBLE STUDY OPPORTUNITY




Bill, Kathleen, Mollie, and Joni Host invite you to join them for a study on the Bible and the Church Fathers. The study will include a
