This is the first instance noted in scripture where the 'devil' is synonymous with the serpent, as mentioned in Genesis. This personification of evil makes placing the blame for 'death' on someone (or thing) other than God, and it perhaps reflects a Greek influence. But the focus should be on God's intention: For God formed man to be imperishable; in the image of his own nature he made him. Humans were (are) created in God's image and as such are at base 'good'. We are inclined to drift away from God, and that is sin- whether or not the tempta-

tion comes from our own hearts or from some outside source.

This is an example of how the Apostle Paul raised money; in this instance from the Corinthian church. His approach involved not only tying in theological comparisons (Christ becoming poor so that we might become rich), but also practical appeal to equaling out the wealth somewhat. Of course, he was raising money so that Christians wouldn't starve and the gospel might be preached; his church was the Body of Christ, not a building in Corinth. That probably helped.

Gospel Reading: Mark 5:21-43

The message here is twofold: faith in Jesus precedes forgiving (or healing) of sin and Jesus grants 'life' even after death. Both of these, as related in Mark's gospel, happen in the flesh but, more importantly, fore-shadow Christ's great salvation gift that would come to all humanity after his death and resurrection. When Jesus instructs the witnesses to the raising of Jairus' daughter not to say anything about the miracle, it may be because he knew that it couldn't be fully understood until after his resurrection. Of course, Christ's for-giving of sin and granting of life becomes one in the same through grace, baptism, and faith. As in the first reading passage from Wisdom, God has always intended humans to be 'imperishable', and in Jesus Christ the intention is fulfilled.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.

Pastoral Note

The Sacrament of Marriage within our faith is a beautiful, fruitful way for us to serve Christ. By example, the parents can teach their children what Christian marriage means. As Catholics we are given matrimony as a sacrament that is fundamental to our happiness as man and woman becoming one, living together during good times and bad, but always together in Christ. (C1621-1632)

Please know that anyone who is hospitalized locally, or has a relative who is, is encouraged to contact the rectory for *Anointing of the Sick*. If you are away from the Parish, contact a Catholic Church in that area. This is an important sacrament and all Catholic Priests will be happy to help. (C1499-1525)

Additionally, our faith walk in this life begins with the sacrament of Baptism and ultimately finishes with a funeral Mass and Christian Burial. These are both critically important events for every Roman Catholic. The Christian who dies as a Child of God is fulfilling his/her faith within the Christ's *Paschal mystery*. In the Funeral Mass we celebrate this union that leads to God's Kingdom. (C1680-1690)

Finally, our Sacraments are loving gifts given to us by Jesus Christ. These gifts are treasures that we can both celebrate joyfully and cling to with humility. Our Lord knows us and loves us. The sacraments ensure it.
