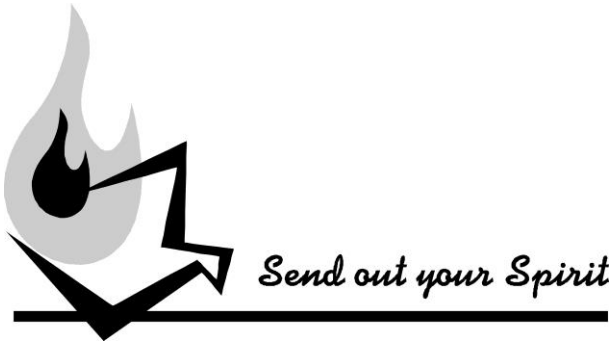

1st Reading: Acts 2:1-11

In the early days, before Abraham, people raised the Tower of Babel, thinking in their arrogance that they could reach God. As a result, their punishment was to be separated by misunderstanding and by differing language, so that they would never be able to cooperate in such an enterprise again. In the courtyard told of in today's reading, the Holy Spirit filled the people with an understanding of each other's language, and what was separating people before was effectively eliminated by God. Through Jesus Christ all people could reach God *through the Spirit*.

2nd Reading: 1 Corinthians: 12:3b-7, 12-13

We are all brothers and sisters of Jesus Christ, and we are all equal within the Spirit; we are not the same, but we are all equal. The gifts of the Spirit, through faith in Jesus Christ, are given by God to further the great Gospel mission, and to build up Christ's Body: the Church. Within the Body we are truly free to be what God has intended that we should be according to His salvation plan.

Gospel Reading: John 20:19-23

This is that moment when, traditionally understood within our Roman Church, Jesus empowered the apostles with the sacramental faculty of reconciliation. It is also possible that the passage refers to the forgiveness associated with baptism and, if so, then the empowerment is one of recognizing that baptism follows faith in Jesus Christ and is to be administered by the apostles. Either way, or both ways, Jesus has initiated the succession of apostolic empowerment to administer these sacraments. What this passage shows is foundational structure of the Church: Jesus to the apostles through the Holy Spirit and then to all who would be evangelized and bound by God's grace as found within the Church. And our Roman tradition finds its roots expressed within scripture.

Dear Parishioner,

At their November 2021 General Assembly meeting, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops voted to move forward with plans for a National Eucharistic Revival to renew the Church by enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. The multi-year Eucharistic Revival begins on Sunday, June 19, 2022, the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi), and culminates with the National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis, July 17-21, 2024.

The Diocese of Scranton will begin its local observance of the National Eucharistic Revival with a **Mass followed by a Eucharistic Procession on Sunday, June 19, 2022 at 12:15 P.M. at the Cathedral of Saint Peter**, located at 315 Wyoming Avenue, Scranton where I will serve as principal celebrant. Because of your strong devotion to the Sacrament of the Eucharist and service to the parish, I invite you to participate in this Mass.
