1st Reading: Jeremiah 32:31-34

Jeremiah is speaking here to the Jewish leadership exiled in Babylon with the message of God's upcoming release from captivity when the Law would be so dear to them that it would be written on their hearts. The early Church viewed this as a foreshadowing of Christ's gift that released all humankind from sin and mortality; the Law then becomes the Holy Spirit dwelling within the hearts of all believers.

^{2nd} Reading: Hebrews 5:7-9

This is a difficult reading to understand, not because it isn't clear but because it implies that Jesus was imperfect. The 'perfection' spoken of refers to Christ's completion of His human mission, that is, His crucifixion, death, and resurrection which resulted in salvation for humankind. Christ was not imperfect in the common sense, but He did suffer as all humans suffer.

Gospel Reading: John12:20-33

John's gospel, very much unlike the other three, is concerned with the meaning behind Christ's words and acts over anything else. In this case, the author is focused on Christ's death and resurrection: death that must precede a new birth and resurrection then bringing all humankind (including Gentiles like the Greeks) into Himself. The message about God honoring those who serve the Son is probably directed at the Greeks waiting in the wings, so to speak, to 'see' Jesus. After the resurrection, all will recognize who Jesus is including those 'waiting to see'. It is the same today: *those who serve Jesus will be honored by God*.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.



LENTEN GIVING

Food and other products can be donated to the Trehab Food Bank by bringing them to the church. Place them in the box in the crying room next to the bathroom. Please check the expiration dates as they cannot give out expired products.

If you are shopping and see a great sale and perhaps you do not need the item for yourself, get a few extra to help out someone in the county who is not as fortunate. Perhaps you could drop a few items in the box each week. The need is ongoing.

These are some of the things they can most use: peanut butter, jelly, crackers, canned tuna, boxed macaroni and cheese, soup, pasta, sauce, beef stew, hash, canned fruit or vegetables, baby food, cereal. They can also accept fresh fruits and vegetables but these should be brought right to Trehab on Route 29, 1½ miles south of Montrose on the left. If you garden, perhaps you could even plant a few extra items for them.

The Food Bank can also use items that cannot be bought with food stamps such as: cleaning products, bath soap, shampoo, laundry detergent, baby wipes, disposable diapers, toilet paper, trash bags, toothpaste, toothbrushes, dog and cat food.
