1st Reading: Exodus 20:1-17

The Decalogue was the first code of human and social behavior given to the Chosen People, and it is just as valid for us today as it was then. Granted, it isn't the only formalized Code developed and it isn't the oldest, but it is the basis upon which God communicated His plan in its earliest stages. The fulfillment of God's plan, and of God's Law, is Jesus Christ. With Christ comes a maturation of the Code, an internalization of the Law. Christ came *before* the Law, Christ *fulfills* the Law, and Christ *becomes* the Law for those who believe in Him.

^{2nd} Reading: 1 Corinthians 1:22-25

Not only Jews look for signs and not only Greeks look for wisdom; Paul is simply addressing the two largest groups in Corinth who doubted Christ's message in predictable ways. He recognized that many humans need something other than faith and it is certainly no less so for us in this 21st century. The technology-driven world of today comfortably discounts anything that can't be proven empirically, or can't be logically theorized. Supernatural explanations for the legitimacy of 'faith, hope, and love' as a basis for human behavior are laughed at, and yet in Jesus Christ we still find hope, and we still find reason to believe, and we still manage to love others. Maybe the foolishness of God really is wiser.

Gospel Reading: John 2:13-25

Aside from the familiar themes of Jesus chasing out the money lenders and establishing Himself as the ecclesial replacement for the Temple, there is also the short and almost cynical ending in verses 23-25. Jesus is characterized by the author as not trusting his new followers in Jerusalem because he understood *human nature* too well. This could be a simple wry commentary on the rabble that would choose Barabbas over him before Pilot, but maybe not. Maybe it is directed at folks who, as in the previous reading, are dazzled by signs or by Jesus' ability to reason so convincingly; folks who lose interest when the entertainment value is gone. We humans are all too often distracted by the flashy things of this world, and as surely bored with those things that endure but are taken for granted. Jesus got their attention with miracles, but lost them with all that 'do unto others' stuff. What continues to be amazing is that Jesus loved us so much that he died for us, despite our *human nature*.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis . To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.
