

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1st Reading: Malachi 3:19-20a

This Old Testament reading combines the recurring prophetic theme: those who ignore the Lord's will are destined for punishment, while those who obey will be rewarded. It is obviously selected today to accompany the Gospel reading, and from a larger Christian perspective, it foretells the end times.

2nd Reading: 2 Thessalonians 3:7-12

Some people within the community at Thessalonica were fixated on the end times, thinking that Jesus would be returning immediately (or that he had already returned), and were more concerned with the world to come than they were in living within the present world. Because of this, they were disinclined to become involved in the daily drudgery of supporting the community. Paul is simply trying in this letter to bring them back in line.

Gospel Reading: Luke 21:5-19

This is written primarily in *apocalyptic* style, which means that it uses descriptive terms that seem to foreshadow the end times. However, it was generally used to describe events that had already occurred, or were about to occur. The intention of this style is to heighten the importance of the event and make it memorable through overstatement. Many scholars believe that much of the end times predictions found in this Luke passage were not those of Jesus, but were added later for emphasis. Predicting the destruction of the Temple (in 70 CE) is also found in Mark's gospel (as well as Luke's), and is more likely to have come from Jesus. The message for today might be found in verse 8:

"See that you not be deceived, for many will come in my name, saying, 'I am he,' and 'the time has come.' Do not follow them!"

Every generation seems to spawn doomsday prophets who are certain that 'the end is near', but as Paul wrote to the Thessalonians:

"Such people we instruct and urge in the Lord Jesus Christ to work quietly and to eat their own food."




Our 2022 Sponsorhank ship Drive has been a success! We have reached our goal of \$25,000.
