

1st Reading: 2 Samuel 5:1-3

David has always been viewed within Jewish tradition as the ideal King- one, who comes from the people, loves God completely, and cares for his people like a shepherd cares for his flock. This notion of the 'perfect' King transfers readily to Jesus the Messiah, but in a spiritual as well an earthly sense.

2nd Reading: Colossians 1:12-20

As followers of Christ, God has 'transferred us to the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.' This 'kingdom' is our inheritance, and it is being formed inside and outside of time by Jesus. Jesus was in the beginning, and Jesus will be in the end. And we, as children of His light, will be with Him always.

Gospel Reading: Luke 23:35-43


Jesus recognized the faith of the thief and, as only Jesus can, promised that he would be in paradise that very day. In many ways the thief serves as a model for all of us: he contritely recognized his sins, acknowledged Jesus as savior, and asks for forgiveness and grace. In a fashion, the thief could be thought of as receiving one of the first sacraments of reconciliation. Christ's kingship extends to sinners in this time-bound world and saints in the world eternal. As an interesting aside, Jesus promises the thief immediate transition into Paradise (presumably) without baptism, without Purgatory, and without any of the other 'religious' requirements for experiencing life after death. This does not say that the Church is irrelevant, far from it. What it does say is that God's grace is not constrained by human understanding; Jesus is God and we are not.


