

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1st Reading: Malachi 14b-2:2b, 8-10

In this reading, which dates after the exile, the prophet is criticizing the religious leaders for not fulfilling their roles properly. However, the key here has to do with his question in the last part: 'Have we not all the one father? Has not the one God created us?' It can be understood as pointing to God as the 'Father' of all, not just Jews, not just priests, and perhaps even by extension, not just Christians. All labels are meaningless without doing what God expects of us.

2nd Reading: Thessalonians 2:7b-9, 13

Paul is teaching here about (the business of) teaching. He makes it clear that when he and his fellow Christians preach the gospel, they are planting the Word of God, not just the words of Paul. The value of preaching lies not in the charisma of the preacher, but in the investment of God in the hearing. Some preachers (homilists) are eloquent and some plain, but the gospel is always from God.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 23:1-12

Self-importance is certainly not uncommon and most of us have experienced it- in others and, if we are being honest, also within ourselves. The human ego swells with position and power, money and accomplishment, and sometimes even with religiosity. It's just the way we humans are. Jesus here is saying that we, those who worship and (by extension) receive the sacraments, should follow the directions given by the religious leaders (rabbis, priests) because they teach what was given by God to Moses (and presumably by Christ to His disciples), but that the human failings that plague the religious leaders should not be followed. When religiosity becomes more important than God, we should pay attention to God.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor


It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church describes purgatory this way:

All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven. (Catechism, 1030) Purgatory is a state of purification for those who have died without mortal sin but still need to be purified from venial sins. The reason for this is that "nothing unholy can stand before God" (Rev. 21:27) and we need to be completely purified of sin before we can experience the Beatific Vision.

PLEASE NOTE: Prior to the Divine Mercy Sunday, on 4/8, it is strongly suggested you make a confession on Saturday, on 4/7. There are many graces offered by participating in the masses for the weekend, but only if a good confession is made.
