1st Reading: Deuteronomy 6:2-6

This passage contains the daily prayer, the *Shema* that is still prayed today by all observant Jews. To love God is to do so completely, without reservation of body, mind, or spirit; to give God everything. This devotion is not an intellectual exercise, or a group activity- it is a way of life.

2nd Reading: Hebrews 7:23-28

Jesus as eternal high priest, superior to the Levites, is developed here in all possible ways. It helps to understand that these comparisons are being made to a largely Jewish church in Rome, and the specifics are clear reminders of Jesus role as divine extension, figuratively, of the Levitical line. This is important for first century Jews whose frame of reference would necessarily include Temple sacrifice.

Gospel Reading: Mark 12:28b-34

To love God completely without reservation is the heart of the Law, and to love neighbor as oneself is the earthly enactment of loving God. Loving God without loving others is a denial of self; loving others without loving God is doomed to disillusion and suffering. Another way of looking at it is to consider Jesus as both human and divine: by loving the divine side of Jesus we are fulfilling the first part of the commandment, and by loving the fully human side of Jesus is to comply with the second part. By loving Jesus as human we understand God in the world, and by loving Jesus as God we recognize what is most precious about our humanity. Jesus is God. Jesus is human. We are His brothers and sisters.




This year Interfaith has asked Holy Name of Mary to collect cans of cranberry sauce to assist them with

Also, we are limiting our offerings to the **homemade wreaths and Christmas items**. We will also have our customary paper raffle of a few select items.


There will be no food served nor baked goods for sale. We will not have the basket raffle nor the white elephant sale.

STATEMENT ON ARREST OF DIOCESAN PRIEST

On October 22, 2021, the Diocese of Scranton learned that Father Gregory F. Loughney, pastor, Most Holy Trinity Parish, Cresco, was arrested by members of the Pocono Mountain Regional Police Department. Four criminal charges – all connected to alleged inappropriate contact with a minor – were filed against Father Loughney on Saturday, October 23, 2021.

Under its longstanding zero-tolerance policy, the Diocese of Scranton immediately removed Father Loughney from active ministry pending the outcome of the investigation. The Diocese of Scranton will cooperate fully with law enforcement officials in their investigation. Father Loughney will need to retain his own legal counsel, at his own expense.

Anyone who might have relevant information is urged to call the Pocono Mountain Regional Police Department at (570) 895-2400, the Monroe County District Attorney’s Office at (570) 517-3052, or any local law enforcement agency. Information regarding any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor can also be reported to the Diocese of Scranton’s Victim Assistance Coordinator, Mary Beth Pacuska, at (570) 862-7551.
