1st Reading: Isaiah 50:4-7

The prophet here is suffering derision from the people in exile who ridicule his message of deliverance. It is curious that before the exile, the leadership of Jerusalem rejected Isaiah's prediction of punishment for straying from Torah, and now the same people reject his message of good tidings and forgiveness. Whatever the case, the man of God speaks as he is instructed to speak despite the unpopularity of the message.

2nd Reading: Philippians 2:6-11

In this reading Christ is first recognized as divine, then descending to human mortality, followed by an acceptance of death, and finally is lauded as the savior of all creation reflecting the glory that is God. Many scholars believe that this was actually an ancient hymn and was used by Paul (and perhaps edited somewhat by Paul) to state the case for Christ's mission in poetic fashion.

Gospel Reading: Luke 22:14-23:56

The Passion, in any of the four gospel versions, speaks for itself and doesn't require any sort of commentary. But it is worth noting that the Church has always maintained the earliest tradition of expressing the entire story from Passover meal to death without pause; this is out of a profound sense of reverence. The poet Goethe is quoted in the Catholic Encyclopedia: *"We draw a veil over the sufferings of Christ, simply because we revere them so deeply. We hold it to be reprehensible presumption to play, and trifle with, and embellish those profound mysteries in which the Divine depths of suffering lie hidden, never to rest until even the noblest seems mean and tasteless"*. And so, it is. Our place is to kneel and acknowledge.

**Notice Regarding Reporting
Sexual Abuse of a Minor**

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-Hour Child Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.com-pass.state.pa.us/cwis. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.

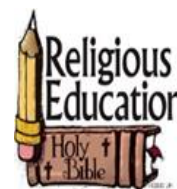
