1st Reading: Acts 13:14, 43-52

Paul's general approach when entering a new town was to attend Sabbath at the local synagogue. For Paul, and all of the apostles at this time, worship meant attending a synagogue because they were Jews; they thought of themselves as Jews who followed Jesus, and certainly not as Christians. The mission to Pisidian Antioch was part of Paul's first missionary journey, and is chronicled here by Luke as one more example of how the Jewish leadership rejected Paul's teachings, while the gentiles seemed receptive. Perhaps of more spiritual importance is the tireless evangelism of Paul to everyone he encountered. The light of the Spirit wouldn't be extinguished.

2nd Reading: Revelation 7:9, 14b-17

John is envisioning the Church triumphant having survived the persecutions of Nero and Domitian. He includes Paschal themes ('the Lamb' and 'the blood of the Lamb'), probably intending to evoke images of the martyrs connecting with Christ's own death at the hands of the Romans. The book of Revelation was written in the mid-90s, thirty years after Luke wrote the Acts of the Apostles. It is interesting to note how (and why) the villains changed.

Gospel Reading: John 10:27-30

John's gospel, unlike the three earlier versions, tends to have a Greek flavor. John's themes are less historic sounding and more philosophic; he deals with the complexities of belief rather than simple formulas. But in this case, John has Jesus delivering a simple message that, in its direct way, states the Good Shepherd's mission: 'My sheep hear my voice; I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish. No one can take them out of my hand.' This message is so fundamental, and so critical (especially during the Roman persecutions when written), that it needs to be stated as clearly as possible. Note that John tacks a bit of theology on the end: 'The Father and I are one.' Was this a reference to the Father and Son being of one mind in the matter, or the two being 'One?'

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Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis.

To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.

his Faith life by bringing him to classes and the reception of the sacrament. May God bless and protect Collin and his family in the years ahead!


Honoring Mothers: A Catholic Tradition

The fourth Sunday of Lent, or Laetare Sunday, traditionally was a time to return to your mother church (home parish) and leave an offering.

Also known as <u>Mothering Sunday</u>, it naturally evolved into honoring your mother as well. And devotion to Mary, the mother of God and our spiritual mother, in the month of May gives this holiday depth for Catholics that goes far beyond giving flowers or candy on Mother's Day.
