



This chart breaks out the green (Sailing-Net) and purple (House & Grounds and Social/Entertainment -Net) segments from the chart above. Non-dues income includes boat storage fees, sailing instruction tuition, income from the entertainment committee's social events. It DOES NOT include income from our special fundraising events. We are fortunate that our member volunteers help reduce our labor costs and keep our expenses low so that we can offer club benefits at a very reasonable price.



Carol and her husband, Joe are parents of 3 young adults – all of whom were very involved in Junior sailing. You and your children may have met their youngest daughter, Helena, who stepped in to provide much needed assistance as a sailing instructor this past season. Carol has always been ready to lend a hand in the running of our club as a Governor, the Sailing Instruction Chair as well as JYC Advisor. She was also instrumental in organizing the Christmas Craft fair that was held down at the club several years ago. After being so involved in the running of our club for so many years, Carol has decided that it is time to put down her pen and enjoy a much deserved break.

He is keeper of the Dues, payer of the bills and a resource with regard to what we've done in the past. If you have an issue with your dues or questions about the finances of the club he would be the person to ask. If you are a committee chair you see Tom to either submit your receipts or get your reimbursement checks. He is also the head manager of Point of Woods Docks– so if you've ever gassed up at the POW ferry terminal you've probably seen him. Flag Officers are the leaders of our club. The Commodore, with the input from the voting members of the Board, recruits committee chairpersons, sets an agenda and usually has a particular capital improvement project that he or she wants to oversee during his or her tenure. (Although in some cases fate has other plans ie. Sandy) The positions of Commodore, Vice and Rear Commodore are all term limited. Although voted upon each year, typically, Rear becomes Vice who becomes Commodore - each with a 2 year term. The positions of Secretary and Treasurer are not term limited but are voted upon at the Annual Meeting.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS

Nine members are elected Governor for a term of 3 years. The terms are staggered so that only 3 Governors are up for re-election at any one time. Governors represent the different constituencies of our membership and provide guidance on financial and policy issues that affect the club. Their primary obligation is to attend monthly board meetings and pass along the concerns and observations of the membership. This is a position that is great for someone who has been an active member who wants to get more involved in the decision making process of our club but may have time constraints that prevent chairing a committee. The position is term limited to 2 consecutive terms (6 years). Dave Timmony, Peter Espina and Bill Wheeler are currently at the end of their terms. A vote for new governors takes place at the annual meeting.



HURRICANE SEASON IS NOT OVER...

Fall is a beautiful time of the year to be out on the water. Breezes are fresh and the air is crystal clear. But, as you can see from the chart below - it is also time to be mindful of hurricane preparedness.

The recent coverage of Hurricane Dorian should be a reminder that damaging winds and wave can and have happened here. Below are photos from Sandy - October 2012 - < Cat 1 Storm



We rely on our member's to lend a hand in getting ready for (or helping to dig out from) the effects of a hurricane. Fortunately, several of our members have already taken steps to secure our BSYC fleet of boats. But if (god forbid) we are under a storm watch and a call goes out for help to secure the grounds - please answer it. Many hands will make short work of storm preparations and clean up.

If you are new to boating - here are some things you should consider doing should a hurricane look like its headed in our direction:

- Check your marine insurance carefully to see if you are required to take some action in order to make the claim valid. Inventory the property on your boat...with video equipment if possible.
- Once a storm is forecast for your area, remove all detachable items from your boat, such as canvas, sails, cushions, fishing rigging, radios, electronics and antennas. Lash down everything that you cannot remove, including booms, tillers, wheels, etc.
- Disconnect your boat's battery. If it is hooked shore power, be sure all power is turned off and all shore power cords are stowed securely.
- Center your boat in its slip. Double-up all dock lines and make sure they are of sufficient length to compensate for excessive high water. Eight lines should be the minimum.
- Anticipate that at least one cleat, piling or line will fail, so give each line a mate running in the same direction but attached at different places on both the boat and dock. Not more than two lines should be attached to a single cleat on the boat. To counter rising (or falling) storm tide, bypass the closest cleat or piling in favor of one farther away. Hang every fender you own.
- Lash your boat down securely if it is on a trailer. Use tie-downs to anchor the trailer to the ground, let the air out of its tires, and weigh down the frame.

A study by MIT after hurricane Gloria found that boats stored ashore were far less likely to have been wrecked than boats stored in the water. HOWEVER —- every storm is different. Don't hesitate to ask for advice. **George Michaels** is the slips and storage person and a good resource for advice.
