

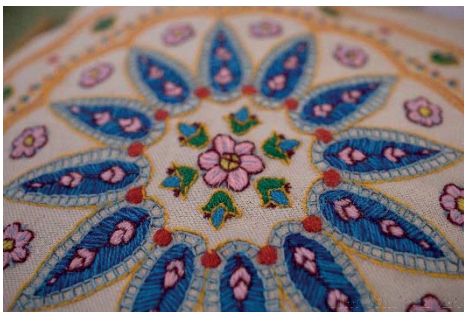

We experienced the wet, the cold and very dry spells but you, our members, managed to produce an excellent selection of flowers and vegetables for both our Spring and Autumn shows. Well done.

At the Spring show we had our plant sale again that was very successful, and at both shows we had our Seed Swap which now seems very popular. Please keep saving your seeds so that we can continue to offer a good selection.

Our membership has been steady during the year with 121 memberships. Seed Swap – Free Seeds

Come along to the shows and choose from a large variety of free seeds:

- If you have seeds you no longer want, bring them along to donate or swap. If you don't have any seeds to bring, you are welcome to just take seeds - we just want to encourage you to get growing!
- With home grown seeds, if possible, label with the common name, colour, growth habit and any other helpful detail.
- Opened seed packets are fine, as long as the seeds are in or near date and the packet is safely resealed.
- All seeds are welcome - except home grown seeds from the cucurbit family as the produce can be bitter and toxic.
- We also accept unwanted garden tools, books and other garden related paraphernalia, that is swappable !
- A voluntary donation box will be available

Conduct of Shows

1. Except where they do not apply under this schedule, shows will be in accordance with the rules and standards giving in the RHS Show Handbook (a copy of the Handbook is held by the Show Committee).

Entries and Eligibility

2. **Entries must be sent in by the dates given on entry forms or by email**
3. Late entries: No entries for Floral Art will be accepted on the Show Day. Entries may be accepted for other classes until 9.30 am on the Show Day, at the discretion of the Show Committee.
4. The Committee reserves the right to refuse entries without disclosing the reason.
5. Classes are open to members and non-members alike unless stated otherwise in the Schedule.
6. A novice is defined as someone new to entering. Once 2 shows have been entered, the entrant is no longer considered a novice.
7. **Only single entrants will be accepted in all classes except Fun classes.**

Exhibits and Staging

8. **Exhibits are to be staged on Show days between 8.00 am and 10.30 am.**
8. No exhibit may be cleared before 4.30 pm; however, they must be removed from the hall by 5.15 pm.
9. Flowers may be bought for the use in Floral Art classes.
10. In Horticultural classes, exhibits must have been grown by the exhibitors. Pot plants must have been in their personal possession for at least 3 months.
11. In classes for Home Produce, Handicrafts and the fun / classes, exhibits must have been made by the exhibitors within the last year. Please state in the Handicrafts if the exhibit is made from a kit.
12. Exhibitors may only enter one exhibit per class, including the fun / classes.
13. Exhibitors should use their own vases and plates for their displays.
14. Stems of cut flowers/shrubs must reach the water in the vases.
15. The names of blooms, plants, vegetables and fruits, should be given where possible.

Judging and Awards

16. Judges are invited to attend our shows and assess exhibits based on their impartiality and knowledge. The following manuals are used as reference:

RHS Horticultural Show handbook

NAFAS Competitions Manual 2015 (third edition) NFWI 'On with the Show' 2012

17. The Judge's decision on the relative merits of exhibits is final
18. The Society reserves the right to withdraw or modify awards if the exhibits are not up to standard.
19. Protests must be submitted to the Show Committee from 3.00pm, accompanied by £1 which will be returned if the claim is upheld.
20. After judging, no exhibits may be altered or removed until the end of the Show.

Prizegiving and Prizes

21. The points value of prizes, other than for collections, which will count as double points are 1st: 4 points; 2nd: 3 points; 3rd: 2 points; 4th/HC: 1 point
22. Floral exhibits will be judged under the NAFAS Competitions Manual 3rd Edition 2015 and on the titles alone.

Loss or Breakage

23. The Society cannot be held responsible for losses, breakages or damage.

Presentation

These notes are only a guide so please do not be put off by the supposed formality of showing. In our village show there are few rules, and these are contained in the schedule. However, as these entries are judged, some suggestions of presentation might give you the edge over another exhibit.

Overall, our judges look for general condition, form, uniformity, size and cleanliness. These qualities mean different things for different produce. But good staging and preparation can make all the difference. Some examples....

Carrots, Parsnips and Beetroot

Free from dirt, ideally uniform in shape and size. Foliage cut to about 4" and tied with string or raffia. Do not trim roots, except those small wispy ones that grow on the sides.

Potatoes

Clean and uniform in size and shape. Do not peel!

Runner Beans and French Beans

Can be picked in advance wrapped in a damp cloth and kept in a cool dark place. Can be straightened (carefully) whilst damp. Leave a short length of stalk.

Onions

Towards the end of July take off any unsightly skin BUT be careful not to damage the sound skin which will need final ripening. Ease from the ground about 1 week beforehand allowing them to harden off and finally ripen. Place them in the sun for a day or two once lifted.

Onions and Shallots should have their roots removed and their tops should be trimmed and tied neatly with plain string or raffia.

Tomatoes

Uniformity is important. Leave on the calyces (stalks) and do not polish.

Leeks

Leave the roots on but cleaned. Tip from our judge, comb the roots! Leave the flags (foliage) intact but tied neatly.

Courgettes

Courgette flowers can be left on or removed. If they are really fresh they are very attractive and might catch the judge's eye.

Herbs

Herbs should be displayed in a clean, clear container with a narrow neck to support the stems. All foliage below the water level must be removed, and the entry must be clearly labeled with the (common) name

Collection of Vegetables

This class can include vegetables which are in the schedule or others which are not.

Any other vegetable

Anything from a single pumpkin to a set of 12 pea pods. The more interesting and unusual the better!

Fruit

All fruits (except apricots, nectarines, peaches) should be shown with stalks intact.

Apricots, nectarines and peaches are shown without stalks. The same general notes apply for condition, uniformity, etc. Do not polish fruit.

Flowers

Desirable merits and defects vary considerably between varieties and types however some general common hints are - Freshness, cleanliness and condition, form and uniformity, trueness of colour, size of blooms in balance with stems, stems clean and free from defect.

Art

Please consider these definitions from the Tate Gallery before you choose your class:

Abstract art is art that does not attempt to represent an accurate depiction of a visual reality but instead uses shapes, colours, forms and gestural marks to achieve its effect.

Mixed media is a term used to describe artworks composed from a combination of different media or materials.

Collage describes both the technique and the resulting work of art in which pieces of paper, photographs, fabric and other ephemera are arranged and stuck down onto a supporting surface.

Please note: the judge may move your work from the category entered to a more appropriate class, if it is deemed to be entered incorrectly. The judge also has the option to disqualify an item they consider does not meet the rules stated in this schedule.

SET RECIPE-SPRING

Ginger Loaf



Ingredients

225 g Plain Flour
50 g Golden caster Sugar
1/2 Teaspoon Bicarbonate of Soda
2 Teaspoons Ground Ginger
1 Teaspoon Ground Cinnamon
250 g Golden Syrup
125 g Butter
1 egg
75 ml milk

Icing:

4-5 teaspoons Lemon juice
Grated zest of 1 lemon
75g Icing Sugar

METHOD

Preheat your oven to 150C fan /300F / Gas 2

1. Grease and line a 2lb loaf tin or use a loaf liner
2. Mix your dry ingredients together in a bowl: flour, sugar, Bicarb of Soda, ginger and cinnamon
3. Melt your butter with your golden syrup in a bowl over a pan of hot water. Once your butter has melted in the syrup, add half of this mix to your flour and mix well. Then add the beaten egg, followed by the remainder of the butter syrup mix. Stir it really well. Finally add your milk and mix.
4. Pour your mix into your lined or greased loaf tin and bake in the centre of your oven for approx 60 minutes. Once golden brown and firm to touch remove from the oven and tin and cool on a cooling rack.
5. When your loaf is cold, simply mix your icing sugar with lemon juice using a spoon stir until smooth. Pour the icing over the cake, use a teaspoon to spread a little. Finally sprinkle with your grated lemon zest

SET RECIPE - AUTUMN

Spiced Apple Cake



Ingredients

Oil, for spraying	750g Bramley cooking apples
1 tsp ground mixed spice	1 tsp ground cinnamon
1 tbsp fresh lemon juice	2 large eggs
Finely grated zest of ½ lemon	100g demerara sugar, plus 2 tbsp
250g self-raising flour	200ml semi-skimmed milk
1 tsp baking powder	100ml sunflower oil
	½ tsp sifted icing sugar

Method:

Preheat the oven to 190°C/Fan 170°C/Gas 4. Line a 23cm spring-clip cake tin with baking parchment. Mist the base and sides with oil.

Peel the apples and cut them into quarters. Remove the cores and cut the apples into thin slices – you'll need about 500g prepared weight. Put the apple slices in a bowl and toss with the lemon juice and zest.

Mix the flour, baking powder, cinnamon and spice in a large mixing bowl. Whisk the eggs with the 100g of sugar, the milk and sunflower oil in a separate medium bowl using a large metal whisk. Then pour the wet ingredients into the dry ingredients, stirring lightly until combined – use the whisk to break up any stubborn lumps. Toss the lemony apples through the cake batter until evenly mixed and pour the mixture into the prepared tin.

Sprinkle the 2 tablespoons of sugar evenly over the top and bake the cake in the centre of the oven for 1 hour until it is well risen and golden on top. Test the cake by inserting a skewer into the centre – it should slide easily through the apples in the middle and come out clean.

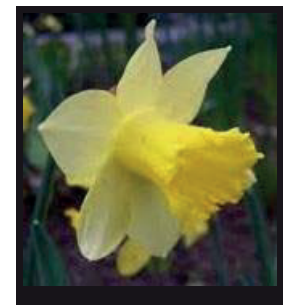
Leave the cake to cool for 10 minutes before removing it from the tin and carefully peeling off the baking parchment. Dust with sifted icing sugar and serve warm or cold with a little single cream or half-fat crème fraîche.

Definition of Flower Categories

DAFFODILS / NARCISSI

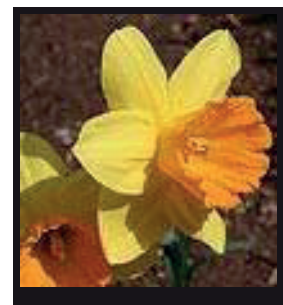
Trumpet:

Trumpet is as long as, or longer, than the petals



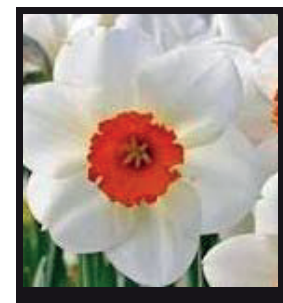
Large Cupped:

Cup more than one third, but less than or equal to, the length of the petals.



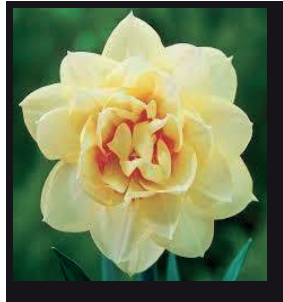
Small Cupped:

Cup not more than one third of the length of the petals.

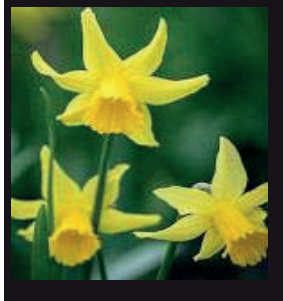


Double:

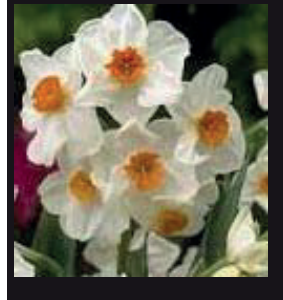
As the name suggests, consists of fully double flowers and sometimes a double corona only. These can be one-stemmed or have multiple flowers on one stem.

**Cyclamineus:**

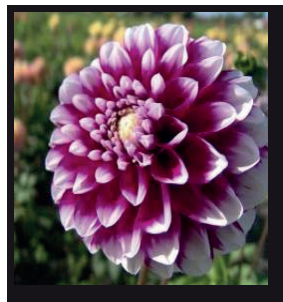
Dwarf daffodils with reflexed petals like cyclamen.

**Polyanthus:**

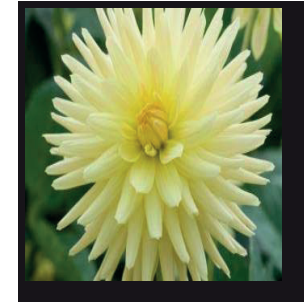
More than one flower head (usually three) per stem.

**DAHLIAS****Decorative**

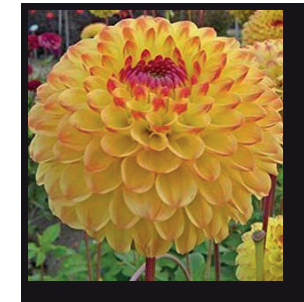
Flowers fully double, show no central disc, with ray-florets that are broad, generally flat or slightly incurved at their margins. Sometimes slightly twisted and usually with blunt points.

**Cactus**

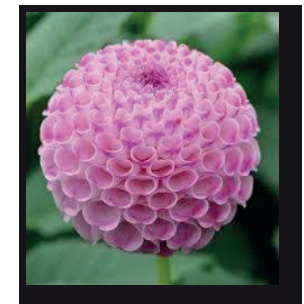
Flowers fully double with long narrow pointed ray-florets, strongly re-curved for more than half their length, either straight or curling towards the centre of the bloom

**Ball dahlias**

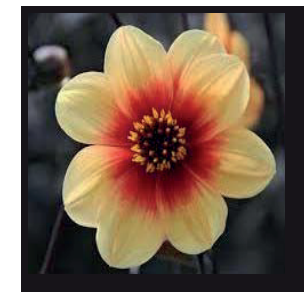
Flowers are fully double, spherical or slightly flat at the top. Ray-florets are spirally arranged, incurved for more than half their length, blunt or rounded at the tips

**Pom-pom**

Similar to the ball dahlia, but even more spherical, with florets incurved for the whole of their length

**Single dahlia**

Single row of petals surrounding the disk - any size



Additional Hints and Tips for Beginners

This section provides information to help you exhibit well in the various classes. Entering the show should be fun and informative. If you would like any further advice, please contact a member of the Show Committee.

HOME PRODUCE

Advice on presentation

1. Read the schedule carefully to make sure you exhibit the correct size and number of items.
2. Plain white paper plates should be used for presenting items except bread, which should be on a board and rolls in a basket. Doilies may be used for sweet items.
3. Savoury tarts, quiches and flans should be removed from baking tins.
4. Fluted cutters should be used for sweet items e.g. jam tarts/fruit scones and plain cutters for savouries e.g. cheese scones/oatcakes.
5. A small garnish can improve the look of an item.
6. All preserves should be presented in sterilised jars and sterilised plain lids and labelled with the variety and full date it was made.
7. Jars and lids with trade names will not be accepted for judging as they contravene the Trade Description Act. This includes previously printed dates.
8. When potting, jars should be filled to the brim to allow for shrinkage when cold. Lids or waxed discs (shiny side down) should be applied while preserve is hot.
9. Wax discs and cellophane can be used for fruit curds as they have a short shelf life (3-4 weeks).
10. Vinegar preserves must be covered with non-corrosive lids and indicate pungency of contents (Hot/mild/spicy etc.) on the label. The flavours of pickles and chutneys develop as they mature. Items should be at least 2 months old before exhibiting.

HANDICRAFTS

Photographs: Can only be judged if within the correct size limit. Photos must have been taken within the last 12 months.

FLORAL ART

Note for beginners

1. Accessories are decorative items to enhance your design and make it easier to interpret the title. If used, they must be included within the overall size of the exhibit.
2. A base under the exhibit or a drape behind it do not count as accessories so their dimensions are not relevant
3. All stems of the plant material should be in water or floral foam to prevent wilting
4. Unless otherwise specified in the class title, do not use artificial lower material as this will result in disqualification
5. Check the measurements allowed but note that there is no height restriction. Apart from petites and miniatures, the dimensions given are the spaces allocated for your arrangements. Make sure your exhibit does not touch the sides and back of the alcove or you risk being disqualified.
6. The background colour of the alcove or 'niche' is painted white. This may be a consideration when choosing the colour (s) for your arrangement. The floral art show bench is covered with green cloth.
7. Petite (maximum dimensions 10" / 25cms) and miniature (maximum dimensions 4" / 10cms) arrangements are not given individual spaces, but placed together in a group. This is called open-tabling and implies that the judge will assess exhibits from all sides.
8. Definition of "Novice" is a beginner or someone with limited experience. Once you have entered 2 Shows you are no longer eligible as a "Novice".

Rules for Granting a Banksian Medal

The Banksian medal should be the premier award in the Autumn Show, and should be in addition to the prizes won, and not a prize by itself. It should be offered to the winner of the largest total amount of points in the whole of the Horticultural classes at the Show. Prizes won for non-horticultural entries should not count towards the Banksian medal.

A competitor who has won the medal is not eligible to win again for a further 2 years, this rule also applies to anyone sharing a garden or allotment with a winning competitor. Affiliated societies alone may apply to the RHS for the granting of a Banksian medal.
