Dogs Eating Cicadas: Tasty Treat or Trouble?

Sometime this spring, when the soil temperature reaches 64 degrees, your dog may suddenly start digging up the yard. He can hear something you can't yet hear – juvenile cicadas tunneling through the ground getting ready to emerge.

Most of the more than 3,000 types of cicadas appear every 2-to-5 years, and their cycles can vary. But the periodical cicadas spend exactly 13 or 17 years underground, and when they appear – trillions surface, blanketing the ground, cars, trees, and houses. According to entomologists, densities can be as great as 1.5 million cicadas per acre.

This time the big brood is coming. After a 17-year hibernation, trillions of cicadas are due to emerge in Delaware, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Maryland, Michigan, North Carolina, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia and Washington, D.C.

Cicadas Can Cause Stomach Upset

Cicadas don't bite or sting, so no problem – right? Wrong. If you have a dog who likes to munch on whatever can be found on the ground, you need to prepare to stop him from devouring this plentiful treat.

"In most cases, your dog will be fine after eating a few cicadas," says Dr. Jerry Klein, AKC chief veterinary officer. "However, dogs that gorge on the large, crunchy insects will find the exoskeleton difficult to digest and can suffer serious consequences."

According to Dr. Klein, aftereffects can include severe stomach upset and abdominal pain, vomiting, and bloody diarrhea. Some dogs may require intravenous fluids, pain medications, gastroprotectants, or anti-nausea drugs.

Dogs Overindulging in Cicadas Can:

- Experience mild to serious GI upset.
- Choke on the stiff wings or hard exoskeleton.
- Suffer an allergic reaction.
- Consume unhealthy amounts of pesticides.

How Long Will the Threat Last?

Cicadas live underground for most of their lives, where they drink from plant roots and develop into adults. They emerge from the ground to sing, mate, and lay eggs. The songs, sung mostly by males, can reach 100 decibels. Females lay fertilized eggs in the branches of plants, where they hatch and burrow underground. The adult cicadas die, and the world becomes a little bit quieter.

The cicada cycle will last about 6 weeks, so those emerging in mid-May should be gone by late June, depending on the weather. Then the babies or nymphs will dig into the ground to suck tree roots for another 17 years.

Of course, those tasty exoskeletons that adult cicadas shed will still be all over the ground. So you'll need to be vigilant with your dog for a while longer.

Bottom line: Preventing your dog from eating cicadas is the safest choice. Get ahead of the game and teach the "leave it" command. And if you have a pup who likes to act like an anteater, you may need to be constant companions when he goes outside for a couple of months.

Many roads and Interstates lead to Great Falls and I have traveled all of them in MT. So if I can give you some things to see or do or suggested routes and backroads in my fair state, I'd be happy to pass along that information if you like. I've included my e mail so please feel free to test my knowledge of the Treasure State. Safe travels and happy trails until we meet in Great Falls!

1. The Great Falls of the Missouri River. Pretty spectacular start to an amazing river. Best view of the Great Falls is from Ryan Island Park. (PS these are the Great Falls in Montana; do not take a wrong turn and end up at the Great Falls National Park in MD) [Visit Great Falls Montana - The Falls - Visit Great Falls Montana - Adventure Awaits in Montana's Basecamp for Art & Adventure](#)
2. Giant Springs State Park. Along the Missouri and downstream from the Falls is Giant Springs Park, an oasis in the high plains. Its location is noted in the above link. [Giant Springs State Park | Montana FWP \(mt.gov\)](#)
3. Lewis and Clark Trail Interpretative Center. Everything you need to know about the explorers Lewis and Clark as they traveled through the west on their way to the Pacific Ocean 1803-1806. If you go you'll be able to tell me the name of the reputed to be a Newfie dog that accompanied the Party on their journey. [Helena-Lewis and Clark National Forest - Lewis and Clark Interpretive Center \(usda.gov\)](#). (Because Lewis and Clark travels took them through many present day National Forests, the US Forest Service was chosen to be the lead agency to host the interpretative center. Check out which National Forests Lewis and Clark visited so you can visit them as well)
4. CM Russell Museum. You'll find many fine examples of Charlie Russell's artwork depicting the west and its people before and after the turn of the 19th century. [C.M. Russell Museum \(cmrussell.org\)](#)
5. River's Edge Trail System. The city of Great Falls has a network of walking and bicycling trails along the Missouri River. Take your Buhund for a walk- be aware- the Great Falls area is rattlesnake country. All the more reason to keep your canine family on a leash. [Trail Map - River's Edge Trail \(thetrail.org\)](#)
6. Bonus! A couple restaurants with unique character and good food.

NBCA Bylaws Pertaining to Nominations and Elections

ARTICLE IV THE CLUB YEAR, VOTING, NOMINATIONS, AND ELECTIONS

SECTION 1: Club Year - The Club's fiscal year shall begin on the first day of January and end on the last day of December. The Club's official year shall begin immediately at the conclusion of the election and shall continue through the next election. The elected officers and directors shall take office on the first day of the month following the election and each retiring officer shall turn over to his successor in office all properties and records relating to that office within 30 days after the election.

SECTION 2: Voting. At the annual meeting or at a special meeting of the Club, voting shall be limited to those members in good standing who are present at the meeting, except for the annual election of officers, the delegate and directors, and for amendments to the constitution and bylaws and the breed standard, which shall be decided by written ballot cast by mail. Voting by proxy shall not be permitted. The Board may decide to submit other specific questions for decision of the members by written ballot cast by mail.

SECTION 3: Annual Election - The election of officers and delegate to The American Kennel Club (who may but need not be a director or officer of the Club) shall be conducted by secret ballot. Voting for candidates, if necessary, shall take place in September. The Secretary or an independent firm should send, receive and count ballots. The nominated candidate receiving the greatest number of votes for each office shall be declared elected. The results of the mail-in balloting shall be announced in the next Quarterly Newsletter.

SECTION 4: Nominations and Ballots - No person may be a candidate in a Club election who has not been nominated in accordance with these bylaws. A Nominating Committee shall be chosen by the Board before March 15. The Committee shall consist of three members from different areas of the U.S.A. and two alternates, all members in good standing, no more than one of whom may be a member of the current Board. The Board shall name a chairman of the committee. The Nominating Committee may conduct its business by mail.

- a) The Committee shall nominate from among the eligible members of the Club, one candidate for each open office, and for each open position on the Board and for the delegate to The American Kennel Club, and shall procure the acceptance of each nominee so chosen. The Committee should consider geographical representation of the membership of the Board. The Committee shall then submit its slate of candidates to the Secretary, who shall mail the list, including the full name of each candidate and the state in which he resides, to each member of the Club on or before August 1 so that additional nominations may be made by the members if they so desire.
- b) Additional nominations of eligible members may be made by written petition addressed to the Secretary and postmarked on or before August 24. The petition shall be signed by five members and accompanied

by the written acceptance of each additional nominee signifying his willingness to be a candidate. Except for the position of delegate, no person shall be a candidate for more than one position.

- c) If no valid additional nominations are received postmarked on or before August 24, the Nominating Committee's slate shall be declared elected and no balloting will be required.
- d) If one or more additional nominations are received by the Secretary postmarked on or before August 24 the Secretary or an independent firm shall mail to each member in good standing a ballot listing all nominees for each contested position in alphabetical order with names of states in which they reside together with a blank envelope and a return envelope addressed to the Secretary or the independent firm marked "Ballot" and bearing the name of the member to which it was sent. So that the ballots may remain secret, each voter, after marking his ballot, shall seal it in the blank envelope, which in turn shall be placed in the second envelope addressed to the Secretary or the independent firm, who shall check the returns against the list of members whose dues are paid for the current year prior to opening the outer envelopes and removing the blank envelopes, and shall certify the eligibility of the voters as well as the results of the voting. The membership shall be notified of the election results in the next Quarterly Newsletter.
- e) Nominations cannot be made at the Annual Meeting or in any manner other than as provided above.
