These are not changes that affect the function or the temperament or look of the breed. These are changes that put in writing for the judges exactly what is allowed and what is not allowed as far as grooming goes when showing. We have been working with the AKC to get the wording correct, this has taken time and as soon as we hear back from the AKC with their final approval that we have the wording the way they want it, we will then put it to a vote of the membership for approval. Remember: this breed is to be shown natural - that means no trimming the whiskers, which have a function, no sculpting, and no chalking your dog. We like to call these guys Wash and GO.

General appearance : Moderate angulation .
Upper thigh : Powerful ; well muscled.

COAT

HAIR : Outer coat : Thick, rich and hard, but rather smooth-lying.

On head and front of legs comparatively short, on neck, chest, back of thighs and tail longer. Soft and dense undercoat.

COLOUR :

- Wheaten (biscuit) : Ranging from rather light to yellowish red.

With or without dark tipped hairs, but must not influence the main colour. Mask permitted. Clean and bright colour preferred.

As little white as possible.

- Black : Preferably self coloured (without too much bronzing). As

little white as possible.

SIZE AND WEIGHT :

Height at the withers : Males

Bitches

: 43-47 cm.

: 41-45 cm.

WEIGHT : Dogs

: approximately 14-18 kg.

Bitches : approximately 12-16 kg.

FAULTS : Any departure from the foregoing points should be considered a fault and the seriousness with which the fault should be regarded should be in exact proportion to its degree and its effect upon the health and welfare of the dog.

- General appearance too fine or too coarse, lack of elegance.

- Liver or pink coloured nose.

- Pincer bite.

- Light eyes; protruding eyes.

- Poorly curled tail. Hanging tail. Feathering unwanted..

- Overbuilt hindquarters.

- Paddling in front. Short, ineffective step.

- Wavy or too long coat.

- Nervous dog.

DISQUALIFYING FAULTS :

- Aggressive or overly shy dogs.

- Any dog clearly showing physical or behavioural abnormalities shall be disqualified.

- Over-or undershot mouth.

- Not erect ears.

- Any colour but the ones mentioned above.

- Dogs more than 1 cm under or 2 cm above the height at withers mentioned above.

N.B.:

- Male animals should have two apparently normal testicles fully descended into the scrotum.

- Only functionally and clinically healthy dogs, with breed typical

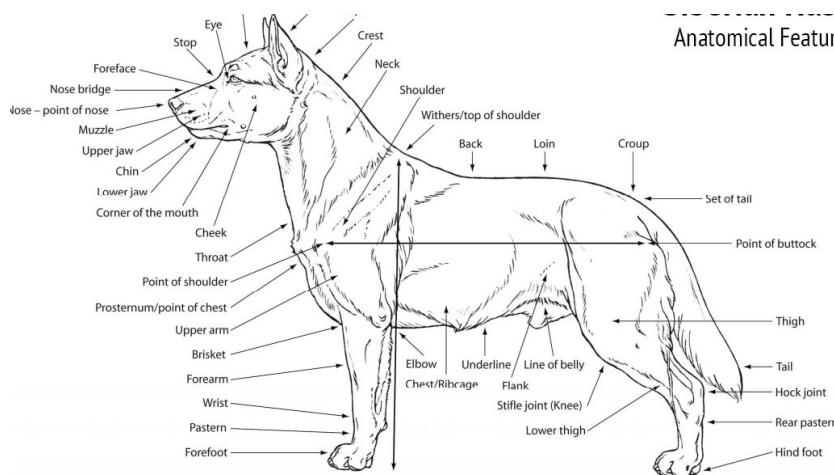
conformation should be used for breeding.

AKC Rule Change for Championship Points:

At the December Delegates meeting a change was approved to *Rules Applying to Dog Shows* Chapter 16, Section 1 in how Best of Winners points can be calculated. As always, the dog or bitch awarded Best of Winners will receive the higher number of points awarded to the Winners Dog or Winners Bitch. The change that has been approved applies to when there are no points available to either the Winners Dog or Winners Bitch. In those instances, the number of regular class dogs in both sexes are added together. When compared to the point schedule, if the total sum of regular class dogs and bitches meets or exceeds the number of competitors needed for one point in its sex, the Best of Winners will receive one championship point.

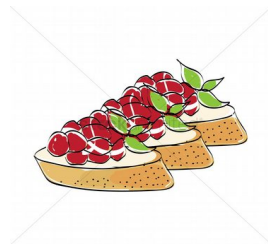

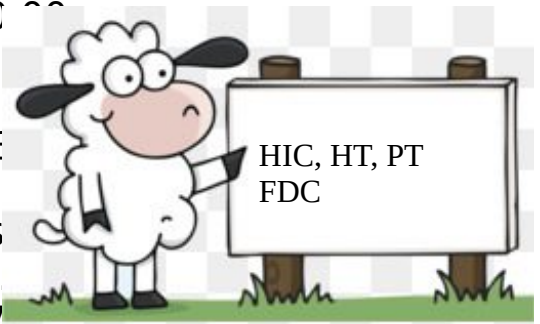

WE have requested changes to the standard - that once AKC we will have to have the membership vote on. We want to be informed of these changes and why they What is in red are the proposed changes.

Official Standard of the Norwegian Buhund

General Appearance: The Norwegian Buhund is a herding dog. It is a typical northern breed, a little under medium size and squarely built, with a tightly curled tail carried over the back. The head is wedge-shaped and not too heavy, with prick ears. As it is extremely intelligent by nature, consistent training is needed from early puppyhood. The Buhund has a lot of energy, strength and stamina. This self-appointed watchdog is also content lying at your feet at the end of the day. Broken teeth, **broken whiskers** and honorable scars incurred in the line of herding/**working** duty are acceptable. **The breed is**

to be shown in a natural state. Any chalking, shaving or trimming, including of whiskers, is to be severely penalized.

Size, Proportion, Substance: **Size** - Height at the highest point of the shoulder blade in dogs, 17 to 18 inches; in bitches, 16 to 17 inches. Disqualifying faults - more than a inch under, or 1 inch over the height at the highest point of the shoulder blade. **Weight** - For dogs 31 to 40 pounds; for bitches, 26 to 35 pounds. **Proportion** - Square in profile. The height, measured vertically from the ground to the highest point of the shoulder blade, equals the length, measured horizontally from the prosternum to the rear projection of the upper thigh. **Substance** - Substance and bone is in proportion to the overall dog.

Head: The size of the **head** should be in proportion to the body and not too heavy. The **skull** is wedge-shaped, almost flat, and parallel with the bridge of the nose. The **muzzle** is about the same length as the skull, with a stop that is well defined but not too pronounced. The nasal bridge is straight and well filled out under the eyes. The lips should be black and tightly closed. The teeth should meet in a scissors **bite**, with complete dentition. Disqualifying fault - overshot or undershot mouth. **Whiskers serve a function purpose and removal of facial whiskers is not preferred but permitted.** **Eyes** - Oval shaped, color as dark as possible, black eye rims. **Ears** - Medium sized, prick ears with pointed tips, carried strongly erect yet very mobile. When relaxed or showing affection the ears go back, and the dog should not be penalized for doing this during the judge's examination. **Nose** - Black.

Neck, Topline, Body: **Neck** - Of medium length, is well set on, with no loose skin on the throat. **Topline** - The back is level; croup with as little slope as possible. **Body** - Chest deep, ribs well-sprung; tail set high, tightly curled and carried over the center line of the back.

Forequarters: Shoulders moderately sloping, elbows well set, turned neither in nor out; legs substantial but not coarse in bone, legs seen from the front appear straight and parallel; pastern seen from the side moderately sloping; feet oval in shape with tightly closed toes, feet turned neither in nor out.

Hindquarters: Moderate angulation at stifle and hock, upper thigh powerful, well muscled; lower thigh well muscled, seen from behind legs are straight and strong, feet same as above. **On the rear feet, dewclaws may be removed.**

Coat: Outer coat is thick and hard, but rather smooth lying. The under coat is soft and dense. The coat on the head and front of the legs is comparatively short. The coat on the neck, chest and back of thighs is longer. **The coat should not be trimmed except for the trimming of feet. Shaving, sculpting, removal of outer coat, texturing (hair piece inserts) should be so severely penalized as to eliminate from competition.**

Color: **Wheaten** - Any shade from pale cream to bright orange, with or without dark tipped hairs; as little white as possible; black mask acceptable. **Black** - Preferably without too much bronzing; with as

little white as possible. Areas where white is permissible: a narrow white ring around the neck, a narrow blaze on the face, a small patch of white hairs on the chest, white feet and tip of the tail.

Gait: The action is free and effortless. The topline remains level while moving. Sound movement is essential for working ability.

Temperament: Self-confident, alert, lively, and very affectionate with people.

Faults: The foregoing description is that of the ideal Norwegian Buhund. Any deviation from the above described dog is to be penalized to the extent of the deviation.

Disqualifying Faults: *More than ½ inch under or 1 inch over the height at the highest point of the shoulder blade. Over shot or under shot mouth.*

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Why revise a Breed Standard?

A breed standard is a detailed word description of what the breed should look like and their temperament. Breed clubs work hard at preserving their breeds as true to the standard as possible. Every five years, a breed club can suggest changes to the standard, if they chose to. NBCA is at that point. NBCA is making a few minor revisions to the standard. Some may ask why? We know people love their dogs whether it is pet, a show dog or a working dog. We are making these revisions to ensure we preserve our wonderful breed. Unfortunately, some of us that show dogs have noticed that a couple of handlers (owner/professional) are grooming dogs beyond what the current standard allows. It is a need to address this issue to ensure buhunds are shown natural and not artificially altered. We are not making any changes to the buhund structure or character. All the proposed changes are with regards to grooming.

Those of us that show dogs know what really goes on behind the scenes of a dog show. I will share some of those things with you. Hopefully, it will be clear to everyone why we revise the standard. There is a lot of grooming going on. Handlers (owner/professional) sometimes groom dog to hide dog's fault and make dog flashier. We want to ensure buhunds are shown natural and do not end up like some of the other breeds, which requires hours of grooming.

Some of the things we see in the show world:

We will start with beagles. Beagle standard states "A beagle looks like a miniature foxhound, solid, and big for his inches, with the wear-and-tear look of the hound that can last in the chase and follow his quarry to the death".

I don't know many show beagles that fit that description. Show beagles have their whiskers removed and often have their neck and chest to look smooth and very light coated. Both whiskers and coat serve a purpose for the dog. Beagles are not the only breed that have their whiskers removed. I've seen a person even shaving part of the belly on a buhund to give the dog a cleaner look.

Whiskers serve a purpose for dogs. Whiskers are very sensitive. You can compare the dog's whiskers to your fingertips. Whiskers help the dog to understand and move through their environment. Whiskers aid the dog's vision as well. It is fascinating to see how a dog uses it's whiskers. Think about it. How would you feel without fingertips? Is it fair to remove the fingertips for humans? It's not. Why is it OK to remove the whiskers on a dog? Dogs need their whiskers.

Coats protect the beagle when it chases his quarry through dense brush or for herding dogs, protect them from mud, ice snow and small pieces of debris that may be kicked up from the ground when they work livestock. Coat helps the dog regulate its body temperature and protects from sunburns. Compare the dog's coat to your own protective clothing. Would you like to run in dense brush without protective

pants? I've volunteered at field trial, marshal for the judges. I can promise you the brush can be hard on your legs. I am happy I had good protective pants or chaps when running in the brush.

How about the bearded collie? According to their standard "Covered head to tail in a shaggy double coat". I don't think I have ever seen a Beardie in the show ring with that description. Everyone that I see have had soft fluid flowing coat. Coat has blown dry and straighten and often chalked and brushed to the point that is fluid flowing. That shaggy coat helps protect the dogs from debris when working livestock. The dirt and debris can easily work its way into the fluid flowing coat and irritate the skin. West Highland White Terrier, according to their standard "Bred to hunt rats and other underground rodents. The all-white double coat is hard to the touch, not soft and fluffy." This breed is heavily chalked and with lots of mousse and hair spray to make them look snow white and to give them the buffont hairdo that we see so often in the show ring. Last time I touched a Westie at a dog show, my hands were covered in chalk and I had to wash my hands afterwards. Do you think these dogs will go underground and hunt for rats with all those products in the coat? Also, essentially every breed standard states dog should be shown natural.

Have you seen a dog missing pigmentation on the nose? I witnessed a person using a Sharpie on the dog's nose to fill in the areas that had missing pigmentation. That day was not the person's good day in the ring. Judge put his hand on the dog's nose and Sharpie came off. Dog did get disqualified and the person was suspended.

There are very few breeds that are truly shown natural today. We want to keep the buhunds natural in the show ring and with bare minimal grooming.

We are making some minor additions to the buhund standard. Dog must have whiskers and no artificial altering of dog's appearance by trimming or adding products to the coat.
