

Twenty-five new roads have been added to the township's responsibility in 2021 (a 14% increase in lane miles) With winter weather around the corner a few things our residence can do to help us be more efficient include: keeping cars off the road overnight, making sure mailboxes are not leaning into the roadway, pruning your street trees 14' above the roadway surface and keeping portable basketball hoops or any other object away from the road. Roads are plowed based on a schedule which puts main thoroughfares as first priority followed by secondary roads and finally cul de sacs and dead ends. Please know we make it our priority to be as quick and efficient as possible.

Did you know, the township utilizes an equipment replacement program that requires each department to budget funds each year for the replacement of equipment and vehicles on a set replacement schedule. This assures that the money has already been set aside for the purchase when it is time to be replaced. Our very large trucks are cycled every 12 years while smaller vehicles are cycled every 8 years. This schedule is aimed at capitalizing on the time when the equipment is at its peak of return through sale and when they start to be needing greater maintenance therefore allowing us to maximize our return on purchase.

Holiday plants can be a beautiful addition to your decor but be aware that many can be toxic to young children and our furry friends. Ingesting Poinsettia leaves can cause nausea and

vomiting; or worse, if they have been treated with any pesticides. Holly and Mistletoe have greater toxicity levels than poinsettias and those beautiful Amaryllis top them for danger when ingested. Make sure these plants are displayed in a place that is out of reach
