TENANT SPOTLIGHT Saman



"I know what it's like to be without a home, and I feel deeply for those who still face that struggle."

Saman was born in Tehran, Iran, in December 1991, during a time of great political and social turmoil. Growing up in a family marked by contrasting backgrounds—his mother from a wealthy family, his father from a poor, educated background—he experienced a childhood filled with both love and tension. The war-torn country, once vibrant, had fallen into disarray, and Saman felt trapped in a system of fear and conflict.

"When I was a child, Iran felt like a tiger—strong and proud—but now, it's like a scared cat, stuck in fear and destruction," Saman reflects.

Seeking a better future, he left Iran, eventually arriving in New Zealand as a refugee.

The transition to New Zealand was challenging. Saman spent nearly a year in a refugee camp, struggling with homesickness, isolation, and the difficulty of adjusting to a new language and culture.

"I was locked away in a room with one window, feeling like a prisoner. But I had a social worker who helped me navigate the system and protect my rights," he recalls.

Saman's life changed dramatically when he moved into a Home in Place apartment. The affordable, secure housing provided him with the stability he had been searching for.

Fire safety reminder for all tenants

To ensure everyone's safety, please keep common areas, hallways, and walkways clear. Storing items in these spaces creates a fire hazard and can block emergency exits. Our staff will be conducting regular walkthroughs to check for any risks.

Additionally, smoke alarms must remain unobstructed and functional at all times. Covering or tampering with them is a serious safety risk and may breach your tenancy agreement, potentially leading to lease termination.

Let's work together to keep our homes safe. Thank you for your cooperation.

New Rotorua housing development

Home in Place recently showed Rotorua Lakes Council staff around an upcoming affordable housing development that will **provide secure**, **lower-cost rentals for essential workers struggling to find housing** in the region.

The wider development consists of 58 homes, with 28 designated as affordable rental properties. The project is being led by Home in Place and delivered in partnership with the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development and Watchman Capital through the Affordable Housing Fund. This marks an exciting milestone as the first set of properties purchased by Home in Place New Zealand.

Home in Place CEO Larissa Bridge shared the importance of housing solutions tailored to those who serve the community.

We understand that pets can be an important part of your life, but we ask that all tenants comply with this policy to ensure the safety and comfort of everyone in the community.

Stay safe online

Scammers are getting smarter, but you can stay ahead by knowing what to watch for.

Verify Unexpected Contacts Banks and reputable companies won't ask for sensitive info out of the blue.

Avoid Suspicious Links If a message urges you to click a link, go to the official site instead.

Protect Personal Information Never share passwords or financial details unless you're certain of the recipient.

Beware of Pressure Tactics Scammers create urgency to rush you into action. Pause and verify.

Use Strong Security Set unique passwords, enable two-factor authentication, and keep devices updated.

Seek a Second Opinion If something feels off, ask someone you trust before acting.

If you suspect a scam, report it. Staying informed is your best defence. Stay alert and stay safe!
