1. Starting with the end in mind: What did God hope to accomplish by the birth of his Son? John 3:16

2. How does recalling the events that led up to Jesus' birth change the way we celebrate this time before Christmas?

3. How does recalling the prophecies that foretold the coming of the Messiah change the way we celebrate this time of preparation? 2 Sam 7:12-17; Isaiah; 7:14; Micah 5:1

4. How does recalling the Angel Gabriel's visit to Mary change the way we celebrate this time before Christmas? Luke 1: 26-38

5. How can Mary show us how to spend our time preparing for the celebration of the Incarnation?

6. How does recalling the Angel's visit to Joseph change the way we celebrate this time before Christmas? Matthew: 1:18-25

7. How can Joseph show us how to spend our time preparing for the celebration of the Incarnation?

8. Today we celebrate the Feast of the Immaculate Conception when Mary was conceived in Saint Ann's womb. Mary's birth was a part of God's plan. How often do we reflect on how our birth is also a part of God's plan?

9. How has the "over commercialization and secularization" of Christmas challenged your preparations?

10. For Mary & Joseph, the Great Adventure of raising Jesus began--not ended--after his birth. What are God's expectations for us on December 26?

11. A day lasts 24 hours. Events can go on and on. The Nativity of the Lord is both a day and an event. How will our lives be different when we see the Feast of the Incarnation as an event and not just a day?

12. On our birthday we usually receive cards and presents, on December 25 why are we receiving cards and presents?

13. The Gospel for the Feast of the Epiphany or "Little Christmas" is the story of the Magi; what can they teach us about giving gifts? Matthew: 2:1-12

14. Before presenting their gifts, what did the Magi do first? Matthew 2:11

15. In the first century, the royal protocol was to kneel before Kings, prostration was reserved only for deity. By their prostration what were the Magi proclaiming?

16. We may no longer be able to physically prostrate. If you can occasionally, it's a wonderful act of humility towards God, but if you can't, prostrate with your heart. How can you incorporate physical or spiritual prostration into your prayer time?

Bishop Defends St. Michael's Prayer at Mass

The end of Mass sends participants out on a positive mission, bidding them to expand God's kingdom through evangelization.

St. Michael is known as the captain of the guardian angels and we should, by all means, ask for his help. But believers should accept the Lord's presence in the Eucharist as their primary protection against the wickedness and snares of the devil - and respond to his call to enhance God's kingdom, where the devil has no influence.

The liturgy ends when the celebrant says, "Go forth, the Mass is ended," and the people reply, "Thanks be to God." The prayer, then, is recited af-ter Mass, which the priest and people are free to do. It isn't a private devotion when prayed publicly. The prayer is as follows:

St. Michael the Archangel, defend us in battle. Be our protection against the wickedness and snares of the devil. May God rebuke him, we humbly pray; and do thou, O Prince of the



Heavenly Host, by the divine power of God, cast into hell Satan and all the evil spirits who prowl about the world seeking the ruin of souls. Amen. The prayer to St. Michael was a regular feature of the Mass until the

Vatican II era, though Pope John Paul II in 1994 urged Catholics to make the prayer a regular part of their lives. Devotion to St. Michael is still widely promoted today, including by Pope Francis.

Dying Teen Miraculously Survives after Nurse Prays Rosary with Jonathan Roumie

Alex Jones, CEO and co-founder of the popular Catholic app Hollow, took to X to explain a story he was told.

"I was approached by a woman, a nurse, who told me this story in tears" he said.

The nurse was in an operating room. There was a 17-year-old boy brought in with multiple gunshot wounds. The medical team scrambled to save his life as his mom stood in the waiting room.

The nurse asked if she could say a rosary with Jonathan Roumie. The doctor said the boy needed all the prayers he could get. They did everything they could: chest compressions. everything. but the young man flatlined.

Ultimately, the doctor stepped back and announced the time of death: 7:24 p.m.

The doctor then went to inform the mom.

Jonathan's rosary was just finishing the final prayers. "In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Amen."

Just then, they heard a beep on the machine. The doctor looked at the nurse and asked, "What did you do?"

The nurse just shook her head and pointed to the sky.

The boy's heart had restarted on it's own.

He is still alive today.

Law Enabling Advance Requests for Assisted Suicide Goes into Effect in Quebec

As of October 30, 2024, patients in Quebec, Canada, who meet certain criteria no longer need to confirm that they want to undergo physicianassisted'suicide immediately before they die. The patient can now request and provide consent for the assisted-suicide in advance, if he or she has been diagnosed with an illness such as dementia.

Anti-euthanasia and assisted suicide activists are speaking out against the advance requests.

On October 29, 2024, Amanda Acht-

man, a Canadian Catholic activist, speaker, and journalist, said that "socalled advance requests will drastically increase the premature deaths of those with dementia."

The Alzheimer Society of Canada has estimated that from 2020 to 2050, the number of Canadians who have developed dementia will have in-

creased by 187%. It is also inherently enabling to deem some lives less valúable than others. "We know that doctors consistently rate the quality of life of person's

with disabilities as lower than those with disabilities evaluate their own lives. This shows that some lives seen as less worthwhile than others."

It is dehumanizing, plain and simple. All of these decisions have a social cost; they do not exclusively concern those opting to be euthanized but are actually affecting our entire social fabric by sending the message that, without the capacity to consent, your

life is over, you do not really exist. Research indicates people are often more afraid of a dementia diagnosis than a cancer diagnosis. The growing temptation toward euthanasia for those who have dementia happens because we struggle to see the value and sense of life in the midst of dependency and vulnerability.

'A recent Vatican document states that to assist in a suffering person's suicide is a violation of the person's dignity. The Catholic Church holds that suicide, assisted suicide, and euthanasia are grave evils.

Suffering does not cause the sick to lose their dignity, which is intrinsi-cally and inalienably their own.

Nobody should be euthanized because they are complicated or difficult to care for; every person sum-mons courage from us. Though it is a mystery why we suffer, the redemp-tion of suffering consists in the drama of suffering being transformed into a drama of love."

4. "For me, prayer is a surge of the heart; it is a simple look toward heaven; it is a cry of recognition and love; embracing both trial and joy."


5. "Jesus, help me to simplify my life by learning what you want me to be and becoming that person."

According to the Catechism, the Church teaches that salvation comes through Christ and His Church. However, salvation is

possible for non-Catholics under certain conditions.

"Those who, through no fault of their own, do not know the Gospel of Christ or His Church, but who nevertheless

seek God with a sincere heart and

seek God with a sincere heart and moved by grace, try in their actions to do His will as they know it through the dictates of their conscience— those too may achieve salvation. Knowingly turning away from Christ and His Church is different from those who have never had the oppor-tunity to know Him. Sincere seekers of God may attain salvation, even if they are not part of the Church This they are not part of the Church. This comes from the concept of 'invincible ignorance' of Christ.

Even though God can save whomever He wants, the Church still has the command and the right to evangelize all people because this is the truth—

this is the Church founded on Peter. While God's mercy is boundless, it doesn't diminish the Church's obliga-tion to guide others toward salvation through the Sacraments. The Church also teaches that evan-gelization plays a big part in salva-tion

1. She was a young French peasant born in 1412.

2. Joan of Arc was not a knight or a trained soldier, and she could not read or write. She didn't even know how to wield a sword before she began her mission!

3. At one point, she took the name "Jehanne la Pucelle," meaning "Joan the Maid," claiming she did not know her last name.

4. She reportedly heard the voices of Saint Michael the Archangel, Saint Margaret of Antioch, and Saint Catherine of Alexandria. They informed her of a special mission from God to crown the rightful king of France.

5. Encouraged receiving confession before battle and committed her life to contemplation and prayer. She is considered a heroine of the Hundred Years' War between France and Eng-land. Her life and journey are welldocumented.

6. She was burned at the stake in 1431 after a corrupt Church tri-al found her guilty of heresy. The Church later nullified the trial! 7. Pope Benedict XV declared Saint Joan of Arc a saint in 1920.

She is the patroness of soldiers and of France.

Infant Honored after Being Discovered at a Recyling Center



The community of Sioux Falls, South Dakota, gathered at a funeral home and chapel to pay tribute to Gabri-el James Doe, an infant discovered dead at Millennium Recycling center earlier that month.

Around 180 people attended the funeral, which was also streamed online, for Gabriel at Miller Funeral Home. Approximately 200 commu-nity members came to the preceding wake, which was held the day before. The report also shared that tearful attendees wearing company T-shirts of Millennium Recycling were present at the service but chose not to comment. However, a bouquet of wildflowers from the recycling cent-er's staff carried the message, "We found you, and we loved you."

The service was co-led by local Chris-tian pastors and Rev. John Helmueller of the Catholic Diocese of Sioux Falls.

The report highlighted the commu-nity's strong support for the service, noting donations of flowers, a hand-

made outfit for Gabriel, and Sioux Falls police officers who carried the small casket from the ceremony to the hearse for burial.

Jessica Remme, founder of the Oaklyn Foundation, which supports families dealing with infant loss, contributed to the funeral expenses. The foundation was established in mem-ory of her baby daughter, who died in 2018.

The funeral director had asked Jes-sica and her husband Travis to name the baby. Jessica stated, "Travis and I sat down and read some scripture, and Gabriel James spoke to us, and it was an absolute honor being able to give him a name."

The Sioux Falls Police Department is still investigating the circumstances surrounding Gabriel's death.

The Boy Who Was Miraculously Cured After Touching Carlo Acutis' Relic

Young Matheus Vianna, who suffered from a rare disease called annular pancreas, was completely cured after touching a Carlo Acutis relic in a church in Mato Grosso do Sul, Brazil. Eleven years after the miracle, Matheus lives with his mother and brother on a farm. The boy's grandmother, Solange Lins Vianna, said he is "a nor-mal teenager who likes to eat, play games, and be on his cell phone." She also said he prefers to live a more reserved life.

Vianna said Matheus, now 14, goes to Mass with her and keeps a painting of the future saint with him. She says

that Matheus' mother also lives a life of seclusion, only to pray. Vianna also said that when he was younger, Matheus liked to play Mass, and even asked for a cassock as a birthday present.

The miracle after touching Carlo Acutis' relic.

Every October 12th, during the feast of Our Lady of Aparecida and on the anniversary of Carlo's death, a blessing of his relic is offered in a solemn Mass.

On October 12, 2013, in the chapel of Our Lady of Aparecida in our parish, during the blessing of the relic, a boy, who was with his grandfather and suffered from annular pancreas, approached.

This rare condition caused constant vomiting, leaving the child debilitated, as everything he consumed, including liquids, would come back up. He always carried a small towel due to the severity of his condition. While waiting for the blessing, the boy asked his grandfather what he should ask for, and he replied, "to stop vomitina"

When it was his turn, the boy touched Carlo's Relic and firmly asked, "Stop vomiting." Since then, he has not vomiteď again!

In February 2014, the family under-went new tests and confirmed that the boy had completely recovered.

This miracle was sent to the Sacred Congregation of Saints, and the Vatican established an Ecclesiastical Tribunal in the Archdiocese to investigate the case, collecting testimonies and medical evidence. Af-ter the process was completed, the documents were sent to Rome, where they were analyzed by a team of Vatican experts.



The miracle was officially recognized on November 14, 2019, thus completing the beatification cycle."

The priest also mentioned that "Carlo Acutis has a special affection for Brazil. His mother, Dona Antonia Acutis, cannot explain this; although Carlo has never been to Brazil, 90 percent of the miracles attributed to him occurred here."

In October 2020, the parish inaugurated an altar dedicated to Blessed Carlo Acutis and the enthronement of his relic.

Michigan Man Builds a Catholic Church, One Lego at a Time



John Kraemer knows that what he does is unusual. In fact, he relishes the improbable path that God has set him on for the past quarter-century. Every year, Kraemer assembles some 30,000 Lego bricks into a painstakingly intricate model of a Catholic church. Though often inspired by the designs of real churches he has visited, each one

is a unique creation. Kaemer's Lego Church Project, now in its 25th year, blends crea-tivity, his Catholic faith, and disability advocacy — a subject near and dear to Kraemer's heart who is a disabled person himself

"I am thankful to God that I have a purpose in my life that goes be-

yond myself. Without God in my life, without the Church, I would not have anything meaningful to do with my life," Kraemer, who lives in east-central Michigan," Kaemer said. He then added, "God has given me this unique mission to share the faith creatively, to talk about issues related to disability, to show people what it means to live the faith and have a disability or challenges. I know that there are a lot of people out there who have their own struggles. So if I can bring some insight into how I deal with it, it may give them some wisdom on how

to navigate their own issues that they may be facing." Every year, Kraemer builds his Lego church, displays it at a number of parishes in the Saginaw, Michigan, area around the holiday season, and then tears it down and starts over again.

Alarming Abortion Pill Report Warns of Online Dangers

Online predators have a new name and practice, and unlike the nefari-ous online predators of the past, whose actions result in indeterminate consequences, the actions of these predators will result in death. What is the abortion pill?

The abortion pill regimen consists of two drugs—mifepristone and misoprostol. The mother will first take the mifepristone, which stops her body



from making progesterone, a hormone the baby needs to grow. This results in his death by starvation. Up to 48 hours later, she then takes the misoprostol to expel the dead baby. This protocol has become the most popular type of abortion for mothers whose préborn baby is up to 10 weeks gestation, though many places and people are stretching this limit.

In fact, the pill regimen is so popular that a spring 2024 report from


the Guttmacher Institute—the research arm of Planned Parenthood stated that "medication abortion accounted for 63% of all U.S. abortions in 2023—an increase from 53% in 2020." In actual numbers, that

amounts to 642,700 dead babies. This is one of the most suppressed problems facing women in crisis pregnancies today.

Now, at 15, he is building a 20-foot sculpture of Saint Augustine.

The sculpture is located in the city of Guacara in Carabobo State in Venezuela. It is made of fiberglass-reinforced resin. It also has an in-

ternal metal structure to give the sculpture stability. To achieve this great feat, Figuer-oa needed the tireless work of at

least 10 people. "Blacksmiths are needed to create the metal structure precisely because it has to support the weight

cause it has to support the weight of the clay to model and mount the clay on the structure so that I can do the modeling," Figueroa said. "Imagine how proud and happy I feel that just a few years ago I was making clay dolls, and today this 20-foot sculpture of Augustine of Hippo that I made is installed. It's incredible what practice, dedica-tion and discipline can do. Anyone who tries can achieve anything," he said.

said. "Today I present to you the larg-est sculpture of Saint Augustine of Hippo in the world and the largest sculpture made by a 15-year-old boy.

"For those who don't know, Augustine of Hippo was an extremely important theologian, one of the most important for the Catholic Church, for the Christian Church, and the Church in general, and it is one of the most impressive stories of redemption that there has ever been."
