

Origins of Father's Day

The campaign to celebrate the nation's fathers did not meet with the same enthusiasm-perhaps because, as one florist explained, "Fathers haven't the same sentimental appeal that mothers have." On July 5, 1908, a West Virginia church sponsored the nation's first event explicitly in honor of fathers, a Sunday sermon in memory of 362 men who had died in the previous December's explosions at the Fairmont Coal Company mines in Monongah, but it was a one-time commemoration and not an annual holiday.

The next year, a Spokane, Washington, woman named Sonora Smart Dodd, one of six children raised by a widower, tried to establish an official equivalent to Mother's Day for male parents. She went to local churches, the YMCA, shopkeepers and government officials to drum up support for her idea, and she was successful: Washington State celebrated the nation's first statewide Father's Day on June 19, 1910.

Many men, however, continued to disdain the day. As one historian wrote, "Men scoffed at the holiday's sentimental attempts to domesticate manliness with flowers and gift-giving, or they derided the proliferation of such holidays as a commercial gimmick to sell more products-often paid for by the father himself."



When World War II began, advertisers began to argue that celebrating Father's Day was a way to honor American troops and support the war effort. By the end of the war, Father's Day may not have been a federal holiday, but it was a national institution. In 1972, in the middle of a hardfought presidential re-election campaign, Richard Nixon signed a proclamation making Father's Day a federal holiday at last. Today, economists estimate that Americans spend more than \$1 billion each year on Father's Day gifts. This year's Father's Day will be Sunday, June 16.

Pro-life 'Baby Olivia Act' signed into Tennessee law



Tennessee Gov. Bill Lee signed a new law requiring public schools to show students video representation of fetal development as a part of its family life curriculum.

Lee signed HB 2435/SB 2767, otherwise known as the Baby Olivia Act after the Live Action video that inspired it, on April 23. The legislation will take effect in the next 2024-2025 school year.

The Act specifies that schools must include "the presentation of a

high-quality, computer-generated animation or high-definition ultrasound of at least three (3) minutes in duration .. such as 'Meet Baby Olivia,' a high-quality, computer-generated animation developed by Live Action."

In a press release following the decision, Founder President of Live Action Lila Rose called the state legislature's decision to pass the Act "a crucial step educating toward students about the incredible process of human development in the womb."

'I applaud the Tennessee state legisla-ture," she stated in the release, adding: "By ensuring that all students in Tennessee are provided with accurate information about human development, we are empowering future genera-tions to understand and respect human life."

Rose noted that the state's decision sets a precedent for other states to follow, potentially setting the ball rolling for setting new education standards across the US. Tennessee joins North Dakota in its decision to mandate a more comprehensive approach to education on human development.


"This is just the beginning of ensuring every American student has access to accurate information on when human life begins and how it develops," she said. "I encourage our other 48 states to follow the forward-thinking lead of Tennessee and North Dakota."

Planned Parenthood Performed More Abortions Than Ever Last Year And Got Another Raise from Taxpayers



Planned Parenthood's just-released annual report reveals that the industry giant performed a record number of abortions last year: 392,715.

And while the organization's leaders bemoan that, since the Supreme Court's ruling, "More than 20 states have banned some or all abortions." The report also reveals that the group received a hefty raise from American taxpayers.

Taxpayer funding via government grants, contracts, and Medicaid reimbursements reached \$699.3 million, as indicated in the most current report, up from \$633.4 million in 2022, and an amount that is 34% of Planned Parenthood's overall revenue.

"There's not enough outrage to force the federal government to stop sub-sidizing abortion," Catholic Vote Di-rector of Government Affairs Tom McClusky said about the abortion giant's increase in taxpayer funding. Planned Parenthood has also touted that it is now the second-largest provider of transgender hormone drugs in the nation, and its current report boasts that 45 of its affiliates are now offering so-called "gender-af-firming care" hormone drug treat-

Pregnant with Conjoined Twins, Woman Finds Powerful Strength In Her Faith

Nicole Duque, 23, has always desired to become a mother. From the day she got married at the age of 22, she and her husband, Austin LeBlanc, began trying to conceive, praying novenas for their wish to come true. After months of waiting, she finally took a pregnancy test, which came back positive.

Six weeks into her pregnancy, Duque began to experience severé nausea and lost 10 pounds. Concerned about her condition, she visited a doctor who conducted an ultrasound, which revealed she was carrying twins. However, only one heartbeat was detected during the initial test, prompting

Duque to seek a second opinion. For Duque and her husband, hearing the heartbeat at seven weeks was exciting, despite knowing there could

be complications.

At 10 weeks, Duque was rushed to the hospital with severe abdominal pain. There, doctors made the difficult diagnosis that she was carrying conjoined twins, daughters joined from the chest to the navel. The diagnosis was painful: The twins shared a heart, liver, diaphragm, intestines and umbilical cord, which significantly increased the risk neither child would survive.

In the subsequent weeks, Duque faced tough challenges when some doctors questioned her about the possibility of an abortion. Despite the pressure, she never considered terminating her pregnancy.

Even though the twins were still very small, and she couldn't feel them moving, yet the idea of abortion nev-

er crossed her mind. "I saw them both on the screen, with

their heart beating and jumping at the same time. How could I kill my babies? They were made with love; how could I kill love?"

Duque, Pro-life childhood. seeks to honor the lives of her babies and raise awareness among young Hispanic women who find themselves in similar situations, as these topics are not openly diścussed. Her' goál

is for her story to reach many women who are considering abortion and touch their hearts. Although she is realistic about her babies condition, she believes in God as the Lord of miracles and has witnessed miracles in the past during her father's illness.

One of their daughters is named Maria Teresa in honor of Mary, St. Teresa of Avila, to whom Nicole is devoted, and St. Therese of Lisieux, who was revered by her late father. Her other baby is named Rachel Clare, a more American name due to her husband's origin and inspired by Rachel, the mother of Joseph the Dreamer, and St. Clare of Assisi. Duque finds it emotional to think about Rachel because both are mothers of children destined for great things, and for her babies to also have a special mission.

Duque is currently in her 24th week of pregnancy, and the doctors have estimated that her twins may reach

week 35, when she will have a cesarean section.


The duration of Maria Teresa and Rachel Clare's life is uncertain, but baptizing their daughters at the time of the cesarean section is of great importance to Duque and her husband. As a result, during the operation, her husband, mother, and a

priest will be present.
Throughout this painful experience,
God has been with Duque every step of the way. She was grateful to have the opportunity to speak with a Mexican mother who lives in Texas and is going through the exact same situation, and whose daughters are about to turn 7 months old.

"Hearing the cries of her babies in the background during our conversa-tion has filled me with strength and hope," shared Nicole. "I continue to pray for the miracle of being able to have my daughters for as long as God allows and according to His will.

6 Fascinating Facts About Jonathan Roumie, The Catholic Actor Who Plays Jesus in 'The Chosen'



Jonathan Roumie is a devout Catholic actor best known for his role as Jesus in the hit series "The Chosen." The 49-year-old's popularity has spread like wildfire as the show has over 500 million views worldwide.

1. He was baptized Greek Orthodox.

Born in New York City, Roumie was baptized Greek Orthodox. After his family moved from the city to the suburbs of Long Island, his family struggled to find a Greek Orthodox church.

His father, who was born and raised in Egypt, attended Catholic school there and was familiar with the Catholic faith. His mother is a Roman Catholic from Ireland. Therefore, when they could no longer find a Greek Orthodox church, the family felt it natural to attend the local Catholic Church down the street. There Roumie made his first Communion and confirmation as a Catholic. 2. He had a powerful conversion.

While Roumie grew up Catholic, he has spoken openly about the deeper conversion he experienced. He explains that he began growing in his faith five and

a half years ago.
Roumie had been an active member at his parish and participated in several ministries such as being a sponsor in RCIA, a Eucharistic minister, and a lector. But he admits that he was not letting God take part in his career.

It wasn't until he was brought to the brink of poverty that he finally let God take complete control of his life.

Roumie shares that he woke up one day in May 2018 and was overdrawn on his bank account, had \$20 in his wallet, had enough food for the day, had rent and bills arriving, and had not worked in three weeks. He got on his knees in front of his crucifix and poured his heart out to God. Roumie expressed that he felt an overwhelming sense of peace that everything would be okay. Later that day, he received four checks in the mail. It was then that he truly surrendered his career to God.

3. "The Chosen" is not the first time he has played Jesus. Although the dynamic duo is most well-known for their recent work on "The Chosen," Roumie's and director Dallas Jenkins' relationship goes back several

The two first worked together when Jenkins, an evangelical Christian, was the media director for his church. He cast Roumie to play Jesus for a short film he made for his church called "The Two Thieves." The film told the story of the two other men who were crucified with Jesus. Soon after, Jenkins made the short film entitled "The Shepherd," which became the pilot for what became "The Chosen." Several months after its release, Jenkins called Roumie to ask if he would be interested in playing Jesus again in this new series.

4. He is outspoken in urging Christian actors in Hollywood to stand firm in their

beliefs.

He discussed how the culture is at odds with faith and reminded Christian actors to look at the kind of roles they are offered and if they compromise their spirituality. He added that there are certain shows he cannot watch anymore because his spirit rejects them.

Roumie advised Christian actors to try to find Christ in each role and emphasized the importance of prayer and discernment. Roumie also shared that others in Hollywood have told him to "downplay" his faith. "I've had people say, 'you might want to downplay your faith a little bit because it's not really that's going to win you over to people in casting films and TV shows, "" he said.

"I think in Hollywood especially, people are kind of nervous about talking about their faith in a business setting," Roumie added.

"I never was. I'm happy to talk about it to anyone who wants to talk about it but getting that kind of advice was a little strange and disappointing."

5. He has a partnership with a Catholic charity helping children in need. Roumie first began sponsoring with Unbound in 2019, financially supporting and writing letters to a child in Tanzania. Unbound is a Catholic agency that uses a network of thousands of sponsors to deliver personalized support to children, elders, and their families living in poverty in Latin America, Asia, and Africa.

In November 2023, Unbound announced that Roumie partnered with them to sponsor their one-millionth impoverished child entering the program.

6. He spoke at the 2023 March for Life in Washington, D.C., in front of thousands of pro-lifers at the National Mall in Washington D.C., about his pro-life views at the annual March for Life. He focused primarily on the spiritual battle that is taking place in United States society over abortion. He cautioned the crowd to take their faith seriously in the face of resistance, including from popular culture and the

"Just as God is real, Satan is also real," Roumie warned. "He pushes you to doubt when you know in your heart the right thing to do."

What Are Marian Apparitions And How Does the Church Decide If They Are True?

Down through the centuries, there have been numerous reports of appearances or apparitions of Mary. Some of these apparitions have been accepted as worthy of belief by church authority, most especially the apparitions at Guadalupe, Mexico (1531); Lourdes, France (1858); and Fatima, Portugal (1917).

Marian apparitions are considered to

be private revelations according to what is taught in the Catechism of the Catholic Church. They don't "improve or complete Christ's definitive Revelation but help to live more fully by it in a certain period of history."

Marian apparitions can be investigated and approved by the local bishop, but in some cases, the Holy See takes over the inquiry. In 1978,

Pope St. Paul VI approved a document of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith that lays out norms for discerning apparitions.

Among the criteria used are the harmony of the messages with Catholic doctrine, the docility of the visionaries to church authority, and the signs of the supernatural.

Famous Catholics, Social Media Stars Express Wholehearted Support for Harrison Butker After Graduation Speech



Three-time Super Bowl Champion Harrison Butker made headlines for his commencement address at Benedictine College on May 11, 2024. Butker, a devout traditional Latin Mass Catholic attendee, husband, father, and entrepreneur, took to the stage in a somewhat untraditional

speech.
"I know that my message today had a little less fluff than is expected for these speeches, but I believe that this audience and this venue is the best place to speak openly and hon-

estly about who we are and where we all want to go, which is Heaven."
He touched on the beauty of marriage, the role of husbands and wives, gender ideology, the dignity of life, and truly living out the Catholic faith. He also chastised "Catholic" President Joe Biden for his outspoken pro-choice stance as well as members of the clergy he believes care more about political talking points and gaining popularity than leading their flock.

Former Notre Dame football coach and Hall of Famer Lou Holtz posted a note of praise, stating "Thank you for standing strong in your faith values. Your commencement speech at Benedictine College showed courage and conviction and I admire that. Don't give in."

Catholic Fox News Host Rachel Campos Duffy posted, "Outrageous. I heard the entire speech by Harrison Butker. It was 100% Catholic in its worldview. Is the NFL saying they have no place for Catholics in their organization? Why does tolerance only go one way in America? So sick of it."

Catholic actress Patricia Heaton from "Everybody Loves Raymond" said, "Harrison gave a commence-ment speech. The audience applauded twice during the speech and gave him a standing ovation at the end, so clearly they enjoyed what he was saying. He is espousing his own opinions and Catholic doctrine. So what?" Heaton said. "He's not a monster for stating what he believes."

Bill Maher also defended Butker on his talk show. He stated, "I don't see what the big crime is, I really don't." He also noted the irony of college leftists enraged over Butker while simultaneously demonstrating for Hamas.

'My name is Liz Wheeler. I have a

high-powered career that I love, and I totally agree with Harrison Butk-er."

Notable Catholic clergy also came to Burker's defense, including San Fran-cisco Archbishop Salvatore Cordileone and Bishop Joseph Strickland of

Encouraging people to read Butker's speech, Archbishop Cordelione shared Harrison's call for "...young Catholic men to put their vocations as husbands and fathers first. Surely we spiritual fathers can ponder his call to us too. Faithfulness is the way."

Bishop Strickland stated, "Thank you Harrison for speaking truth. It is no surprise that some are reacting with extreme negativity. Too many today hate the truth & merely want their version of truth which is not truth at

all. You are in my prayers." Senator Josh Hawley posted a photo with Butker, stating, "Never more proud to call Harrison Butker my

Congressman Keith Stelf of Texas also shared a photo with the Chief's kicker and said, "I stand with Harrison.

Shawn Carney, CEO of 40 Days for Life, said, "The NFL has had rapists, the NFL has had people that have beaten women and we're going to attack a guy who teared up about the day that he met his future bride in middle school? Who challenges men to be good husbands and good fathers? This is who we are attacking?"

85 CHURCHES BURNED DUE TO CANADIAN MASS GRAVE HOAX

According to the Department of Crown-Indigenous Relations in Canada, no human remains have been discovered at the site of an alleged "mass grave" at the Indian Residential School in Kamloops in British Columbia.

On May 27, 2021, the Tk'emlúps te Secwepemc First Nation claimed they had discovered the "heartbreaking truth" regarding the Catholic-run residential school after a ground-penetrating radar allegedly uncovered a mass grave of 215 children.

Three years, \$7.9 million, and at least 85 destroyed historic Catholic churches later, no human remains have been discovered, according to a May 9 report from Western Standard.

Department spokesperson Carolane

Gratton stated in the report that the department had allocated the \$7.9 million to uncovering the bodies and confirmed that no progress had been made.

Davidson further noted that the alleged mass graves were not mass graves, as "the outraged left said they were," but rather, individual graves located in cemeteries. The graves, which also contained the bodies of priests and nuns, Davidson wrote, were unmarked because the government had refused to pay for headstones.

"So there was no cover-up and no mass graves, just a complicated and nuanced history. But it's a history Canada's ruling political and media elite aren't interested in exploring honestly,'

Davidson concluded.

Irish Medical Council Strips Directive Banning Deliberate Killing of Patients

The Irish Medical Council has stripped a prohibition against the deliberate killing of patients.

The Medical Council said it regulates medical doctors in Ireland by way of promoting and better ensuring high standards of professional conduct, education, training, and competence among doctors.

Part of its regulation includes its Guide to Professional Conduct and Ethics for Registered Medical Practitioners, which it reissues with up-dates periodically. The council said the guide sets out the principles of professional practice that all doctors registered with the council are expected to follow.

In the seventh edition of that document, published in 2009, the council explicitly directed that doctors may not participate in the deliberate killing of a patient by active means. The ninth edition, dated this year, however, has removed that prohibition on the deliberate killing of patients. The council said the revised guidelines were developed by an ethics committee chaired by its Medical Council President

In its ninth edition, similar to previous revisions, the council says that doctors play an important role in sup-porting patients, families, and the community to deal with death. "One should be sensitive in discuss-

ing end-of-life options, including palliative care, and make sure that patients and their families have a clear understanding of what can and can-not be achieved," the guide says. In Ireland several years ago, lawmak-

ers considered what was dubbed the "Dying with Dignity Bill," a piece of legislation that if passed would have "[made] provision for assistance in achieving a dignified and peaceful end of life to qualifying persons.'

That bill ultimately stalled in Parliament. At the time, the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference said the bill was fundamentally flawed and at odds with the common good. "We believe that every life has an inherent value, which should be endorsed by society," the bishops said. "This bill, if passed, would be a sad reflection of the unwillingness of society to accompany people with terminal illness. It would reflect a failure of compassion," they said. The Royal College of Physicians of

Ireland — the largest doctor's group in the country — likewise came out against assisted suicide there, with a group representative saying the practice was contrary to best medical practice and that "the potential harms outweigh the arguments that can be made in favor" of it.

A British poll last year found a majority of Britons are in favor of making assisted suicide legal. The U.K. Parliament throughout 2023 held an inquiry into assisted dying/assisted suicide in which lawmakers explored the controversial practice.

A handful of U.S. states allow assisted suicide, meanwhile, with several more considering legislation on the

Vandal Shatters Historic Marian Statue outside Catholic Church in Oklahoma

Police are investigating an incident of vandalism that took place last week in Oklahoma, where a suspect forcibly toppled and broke a historic statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary and a statue of the Holy Family outside of a Catholic church.

The vandalism took place at St. Joseph Catholic Church in Muskogee, Oklahoma. Upon discovering the toppled statues, the parish reported the vandalism, which was caught on security cameras, to local police.

Three people were seen on camera when the vandalism took place, but only one of them is reportedly seen damaging the statues.

Associate pastor Fr. Robert Dye told a local news outlet, "It looks like



someone came up to both statues and pushed them over. One of them, you can see him pushing hard. It took some effort since it was bolted down."

The statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary, which parish members said was more than 100 years old, was found shattered on the sidewalk by the

church.
"I just remember how beautiful had the most beautiful face ever," a parishioner said, describing the historic Marian statue.

"It's just breaking my heart."

The other toppled statue, which depicted Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, was knocked into a flower bed. According to Muskogee Phoenix, the statue of the Holy Family, installed only a few months ago, was "mostly intact."

The statue of the Holy Family is valued at \$1,200, and the historic statue of the Blessed Virgin is valued up to \$10,000. Neither statue had any graffiti on them, Fr. Dye noted.
