Wyoming Children's Trust Fund celebrates 2021 with two full-time staff, Executive Director Sara Serelson, and Business Office Coordinator Nicole Neider.

- In 2021, Sara and Nicole facilitated 15 Parent Cafe Meetings with parents across Wyoming and two Spanish-speaking parent meetings.
- In 2021, Sara and Nicole managed prevention grants for 19 organizations in Wyoming providing \$115,000 to Wyoming communities for child abuse prevention.
- In 2021, Sara and Nicole provided training to over 500 Wyoming parents, professionals, and community members.

PROBLEM:

Adverse Childhood Experiences impact lifelong health and opportunities.

Adverse childhood experiences, or ACEs, are potentially traumatic events that occur in childhood (0-17 years).

ACEs are preventable.

Six Strategies for Preventing Adverse Childhood Experiences

Strengthen economic supports for families

Promote social norms that protect against violence and adversity

Ensure a strong start for children

Enhance skills to help parents and youth handle stress, manage emotions, and tackle everyday challenges

Connect youth to caring adults and activities

Intervene to lessen immediate and long-term harms
