Paleographic Highlights

Curator/Paleographer Patrick Scally is now working to finish the St. George Town Council meeting records from the 1930's. During this period in our history, the town acquired fire hydrants, street lights, & other projects courtesy of the Federal Emergency Relief Administration (F.E.R.A.). F.E.R.A. was created in 1933 by President

Franklin Delano Roosevelt to alleviate household unemployment by creating new unskilled jobs in local and state governments. Mr. Scally is also working on a number of old, hard-to-decipher (because of faded writing) documents from the Holleman collection.

Featuring a Museum Acquisition



The museum acquisition featured in this volume of 'Heritage Highlights' has traveled throughout the state of South

Carolina, and possibly beyond, for more than half a century! The bell from the old St. George Grammar School (1908 - 1952) was rescued from a trash pile in 1958 (est.) as the old grammar school was being torn down. Dr. William Tim Brown was able to salvage her from the top of a large demolition mass by simply making an inquiry as to the fate of the historic pile. He was then the Principal (1956 – 1964) of the St. George Elementary School and saw the historic significance of the bell and wanted to save it from the landfill. Although he admitted he

never truly understood why he carried this sturdy summoner from place to place throughout a half century, his invaluable stewardship and its home became evident in 2017 when a plaque was dedicated upon the old site of the prior grammar school in St. George and Dr. Brown reached out to DCA&HC wishing to bring her home. See if you can find out where she silently tolls next time you visit the museum!

Highlighting a Hero

This volume highlights the bravery &

great sacrifice of Major Samuel Richard Vaughan (known locally as Dickie Vaughan). Dickie was born on October 15, 1945 in St. George, SC, the second of five children. After graduating from St. George High School in 1963 he attended Clemson University where he obtained his bachelor's degree in 1967. He taught high school mathematics for two years & then enlisted in the U.S. Air Force Reserve on September 25, 1969. He entered Officer Training School at Lackland AFB, Texas, on December 4, 1969 & was commissioned a 2nd Lt. in the U.S. Air Force on April 2, 1970. Next, Lt. Vaughan completed Undergraduate Navigator Training & was awarded his navigator wings at Mather AFB, CA, in January, 1971. After navigation school he was assigned to George AFB, CA for Weapon Systems Operator (WSO) training in a F4 fighter-bomber from January 1971 - September 1971. On October 10, 1971 he arrived at Udorn AB, Thailand & was assigned to the 555th Tactical Fighter Squadron as WSO. On December 18, 1971, while flying his 48th escort mission near the Laotian-Vietnamese border, his

aircraft was hit by an air-to-air missile. During ejection, Dickie incurred upper & lower back damage from compressed vertebrae, but both he & his aircraft commander, Major Ken Johnson, ejected safely. Both were also captured by the enemy & imprisoned in camps in Hanoi. Unlike some, he was not tortured throughout the course of his detainment, but endured physical abuse during interrogations. Dickie was imprisoned for 467 days when he was ultimately released on March 28, 1973 during Operation Homecoming. He returned stateside & was briefly hospitalized at Maxwell AFB, Alabama, to recover from his injuries. Not one to be easily dissuaded, in the fall of that same vear Mr. Vaughan entered Undergraduate Pilot Training at Moody AFB, Georgia, & earned his pilot wings in July 1975. Capt. Vaughan next served as a CT-39 Sabreliner pilot with Detachment 1 of the 1402nd Military Airlift Squadron at Langley AFB, Virginia, from July 1975 to June 1978, followed by service as an A -10 Thunderbolt II pilot with the 354th Tactical Fighter Wing at Myrtle Beach AFB, SC, from June 1978 to December 1980. Maj. Vaughan served as a T-38 Talon instructor pilot with the 88th Flying Training Squadron at Sheppard AFB, Texas, from December 1980 to November 1983, & then as an F-16 Fighting Falcon pilot and as Chief of Safety with the 50th Tactical Fighter Wing at Hahn AB, West Germany, from November 1983 to December 1986. His final assignment was with the 507th Tactical

Air Control Wing at Shaw AFB, SC, from December 1986 until his retirement from the Air Force on September 1, 1991.

Samuel R. "Dickie" Vaughan is a highly decorated veteran and the last surviving POW of Dorchester County. DCA&HC has his POW bracelets on display. He was also awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross (with Valor), the Bronze Star Medal (with Valor), Purple Heart, Meritorious Service Medal with 1 Oak Leaf Cluster, Air Medal with 3 Oak Leaf Clusters, Air Force Commendation Medal with 1 Oak Leaf Cluster, Air Force Outstanding Unit with 1 silver & 3 bronze Oak Leaf Clusters, the Prisoner of War Medal, National Defense Service Medal with 1 Bronze Star, the Vietnam Service Medal with 3 Bronze Stars, Humanitarian Service Medal, Air Force Overseas Ribbon - Short Tour with 1 Oak Leaf Cluster, Air Force Overseas Ribbon - Long Tour, the Air Force Longevity Service Award with 4 Oak Leaf Clusters, Small Arms Expert Marksmanship Ribbon with 1 Bronze Star, Air Force Training Ribbon, Republic Of Vietnam Gallantry Cross With Palm Ribbon and Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal. Reflecting on his time away from home and family, he says he took long hours re-evaluating his priorities in life. His advice: "take time to enjoy the little things in life." He also said, "the worst day of freedom is better than best day as POW."

Currently, we have several years from the 20s, 30s, and 40s of old Eagle Records, the Moorer-Murray collection, some maps, several photo collections, Council minutes from various county towns and more!
