



CLUB TO REORGANIZE

The convention is over and we can be proud of what we did. However, the preparation for the convention took away from our club something we need to begin workinson: Organization. We had to spend so much time in setting up the May event that we could not work on making our club strong. The following ideas are what I feel need to be done to make us a more unified and enjoyable group:

The newsletter needs help. We've got money now and one of the things we could use badly is some sort of duplicating machine whereby our newsletter can be run off by the club. Or we could do what we did on this newsletter and have

it run off professionally which doesn't cost too much.

Club responsibilities will be more evenly distributed throughout the membership. This is to insure that all members are a working part of the club and no single person will be over-burdened and become "burned out". I believe that at the end of every year the officers should receive some sort of plaque recognizing them as a past officer of this club. It doesn't have to be big but it should be done. They do not get paid for their services and this is one way the membership can show its appreciation. (You people have already given me a fantastic plaque so don't count me in this year.) Last year we gave a member of the year award and this should be done also every year. It should be based on the member's atitude toward the club (not just Corvairs) and toward his participation with the club which can be set up on a points system (one point for attending meetings, etc.) Officers will not be competing for this award. They as officers have an obligation to the club. The ones we are looking to award are those who do not hold an office but who support the club in everyway.

Richard Stolzmann will be the awards chairman for this 1975 term. It will be up to him to organize all awards for the year and to set up a points system. James Ray as 2nd V.P. is in charge of membership. Any questions concerning this should be directed to him. Any new people wishing info on the club should be forwarded to him. Kathy Miller as treasurer will be the person that all money goes to. She will be announcing her committee which is being set up to decide what to do about membership dues. As a member-chapter of CORSA we will be collecting all dues (national & local) here in Birmingham. The problem is when and how. David Bibby as 1st V.P. is in charge of activities. He is the man that will be responsible for programs at the meetings and all other parties, events, etc. If you would like to hold an event (and I hope you do) for the club call him. A list will be set up by him whereby each month a member or members will be responsible for either the program at a meeting, some sort of an event, or a party. Alyce Godfrey as secretary will be in charge of all minutes of the club. She will eventually have all correspondance that is connected with this club. Anyone who writes a letter concerning the club should send her a copy. She will also be in charge of the newsletter and will select a committee to run this newsletter. The newsletter is our voice to the people and should always be maintained in a first class manner. Later she will announce a schedule of when the newsletter will be mailed out and what date every month articles must be turned in.

TIPS FOR THE ECONOMY RUN

The following are some viewpoints of John Bolender, a member of CORSA Northwest who recently won as economy run up there. He says that the most important aspect of stingy driving is to develop an attitude of patience. Then you're willing to drive a little slower--40-50 mph. Take time to accellerate after an unavoidable stop. Keep carburetors as close to idle flow as possible. First gear is almost completely forgotten; second gear is used just briefly to get into motion. When doing this however you must listen carefully for any inclination to knock and be ready to ease up. Ten seconds of hard knock can permanently damage the engine. When you don't need engine thrust (down hill, stopping, tailwind etc.) you coast. And on an economy run this means engine OFF! A clutch start at the end of a coast seems to make best use of the fuel. It is also important to drive ahead of yourself. Try to anticipate traffic, hills and stops with smooth changes. The energy going out through the brakes come originally from the tank. As hot as it might get, running with windows up does help.

Maybe with this info you can grab yourself a trophy. John Bolender did, at 38.5mg



David Bibby should have the tool order on the way by next meeting.


