New chapter plan policy

For years we have had a Chapter plan outlining what a chapter needed to do to become and stay a CORSA chapter. Part of the policy to stay a chapter is to provide a current list of the chapter's officers, the name and address of the chapter's CORSA contact and a list of all the chapter's members and their addresses, CORSA and non-CORSA members alike. The policy to remain a chapter is going to stay the same with the exception of including the name of the chapter's newsletter and a current website address of the chapter if applicable, plus the addition of a \$3 fee for each non-CORSA member. As always there will be no fee for chapters that are made up of 100% CORSA members or the three CORSA chapters in Europe. The members of the board will contact an officer of each chapter in the next few months to make sure the chapter is active and alert them to the new policy.

The most important reason for the change is to have every CORSA chapter member pay their portion of CORSA's \$1,000,000 umbrella policy. Contrary to popular belief the insurance does not cover individual members or their cars. It does however protect CORSA, all CORSA sanctioned chapters and the venues where they hold meetings or events at. In other words, every meeting or event that your chapter holds, and every home owner, business or race track where you have meetings or moving events at, is protected from legal action. In this day and age that is very important! CORSA members already pay their portion of the insurance fee as part of their yearly CORSA dues. The \$3 yearly fee paid by each chapter's non-CORSA members will help cover their portion of CORSA's liability umbrella policy that protects their chartered CORSA chapter from legal action. It will also help pay for the small fee that CORSA will incur for administration of the chapter report. This fee also puts an end to the old argument that non-CORSA members don't pay their portion of expenses. Of course CORSA would like chapters to continue promoting the benefits of being a CORSA member, but CORSA and the board members realize times are tough and we feel this is the best compromise for everyone.

The chartered CORSA chapter can add the \$3 fee to each non-CORSA member's chapter dues or pay it out of the chapter's general fund. It is totally up to the chapter how to raise the money. The total monies collected for the non-CORSA members and the chapter report will be due to the CORSA Secretary by March 1st of 2012 and every March 1st thereafter. If the report and fees are not received by March 1st a reminder notice will be sent and a one month grace period will be granted for the chapter to send the required information and fees in. If the requirements are not fulfilled after the one month grace period, the chapter will be removed as a chartered CORSA chapter and lose their insurance coverage until the requirements to remain a chartered CORSA chapter are fulfilled. The CORSA board would like to thank-you for your compliance with this policy and your continued support of your CORSA organization!

I would like to ask each VCE member to contact me by phone or email to give me the status of your CORSA membership. This information will be added to our club roster so we can keep proper books and make sure we comply with this new requirement. At this time there has been no decision made as to how this extra fee will be paid, but I will bring it up for discussion at our January meeting - Editor



Editor's Note: Billy sent this to me last month and he wrote it earlier than that. Judi's car is on the road, Warner Robbins is a pleasant memory and the last time I saw it the windshield was still intact. Way to go Billy!

Window Installation and Alignment

Judi's '67 Royal Plum convertible is almost ready for the road.

As of this writing we are doing all the "little" jobs of final assembly in hopes of being finished in time to make the Warner Robbins parade and show. Because we are at this point I thought it might be helpful to other VCE members to have detailed instructions for proper side window alignment.

Begin with everything "loosely" installed.

- 1) Adjust the clearance and fit of the vent-frame to base of the windshield pillar using the adjuster screw in the door jamb, located just above the upper hinge.
- 2) Then, adjust the top of the vent window frame fore/aft and in/out using the adjuster at the lower end of the vent frame (lower-front corner of inner door panel). Adjust the vent frame forward angle by sliding the adjuster fore/aft and adjust the in/out angle by screwing the lower-front adjustment in/out.
- 3) The horizontal track that's attached to the center of the inner door panel controls the rotation of the glass. Raise the window and loosen the horizontal track. Push the window forward so that it is seated in squarely in the backside of the long vent frame channel, and then tighten the track.
- 4) Roll the window up halfway and adjust the rear vertical channel up or down. This adjustment provides the right front-to-rear dimension for the length of the glass. Push the window forward and gently slide the channel up until it "pinches" the glass. Back off a little and tighten the up/down channel position using the bolt just above the door latch.
- 5) Next, adjust the lower end of the rear vertical channel so that it's parallel to the front vertical channel. Lower the window. Remove the nut from the lower-rear adjuster and screw the adjuster "in" several turns. Push the lower part of the rear channel and the window forward so that everything is snug to the front channel and hold it there. Now, unscrew the adjuster till it meets the inner door panel and install the retaining nut. If the window can move fully up and down without binding or developing excessive play, the tracks are parallel. (You may have to "touch-up" #4, the glass rotation, at this point).
- 6) Adjust the two upper stops to stop the glass correctly at the roof weatherstrip and to fine-tune the rotation so that the entire length of the glass lies properly in the "L" shaped pocket of the roof rail weatherstrip.
- 7) Adjust the lower stop so that the glass is flush with the top of the door when fully open. This process isn't nearly as hard as it sounds, and the whole job is pretty straightforward if you perform the adjustments in this order.

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

From the Editor:

It's hard to realize that in a little over one month from now the cruise-ins will start up again. While it has been a mild winter, I miss getting out with the top down. It's a lot more fun driving to work that way! We also seem to be stuck in a weather pattern where it is cool and rainy on the weekends. That is preventing me from taking my car over to non dues paying members to work on it. I like the weather warm when I work on the driveway.

I have been plagued with a terrible squeaking noise that I thought was coming from my steering column. I heard it from inside whenever I turned the wheel, mostly after the car had been sitting for several hours. It usually went away after turning the wheel a few times. I had the car up on jack stands for an oil change and lube and I was turning the front wheels to get to a zerk. That's when I got to hear the noise from below. It was really bad.

I finished my work, then disconnected the battery, popped the horn button off and started squirting WD-40 down the column and turning the wheel. Didn't seem to make any difference so I called Russ to see if I could bring it over to get a 'professional opinion'.

His opinion, and Pete's also, was that yes, it was a terrible noise, but it was difficult to determine where it was coming from. While we were working the wheel back and forth it eventually stopped. My theory is the WD-40 finally got to where it needed to be.

It's been about a month now and the noise is coming back. I separated the pitman arm from the steering box and moved the wheels; no noise. Then I turned the steering wheel; no noise. After removing the steering box and column for inspection and finding nothing wrong, I gave up for the evening and started picking up tools. While reaching under the car to grab a socket I grabbed the pitman arm, which was still disconnected from the steering box. IT DIDN"T MOVE! Turns out the bushing on the other end was freezing up. Another lesson learned, and don't assume anything.


experienced before me; that of being involved in a LABOR OF

The idea to call the car 'Rhapsody in Blue' came from remembering an instrumental by that name. I looked up rhapsody in the dictionary so I could see what it meant. Def. #3 was right on, but #1 started the ball rolling and #5 came into play a lot as there had been a lot of improvisation on this car!

The first order of business was to get the body blasted down to bare metal. An estimate ended that idea in a



hurry. After wearing out 3 wire brush wheels and starting on the 4th the car was down to its birthday suit and the condition of the body became very clear. After the initial shock wore off I looked upon it as a new adventure and figured I might as well enjoy the ride. now I will create my own masterpiece". Now the complete definition came into play in different ways and at different times, interrupted by spells of frustration.

FIRST: Def. #5 started to work as I took all the emblems off the rear quarter panels, front fenders, hood and trunk lid. I decided to leave off the chrome under the doors. After I had fixed all the rust damage I could, and had everything was welded up that could be fixed, it was taken to have the body and paint work done.

SECOND: There was too much bondo work to do on the front panel to make it look good so I purchased the front clip from a man in Los Lunas, NM. This turned out to be a very good decision! When the car was almost ready for paint I decided to look into getting an aftermarket front spoiler. I ordered one

from Mulholland Drive in California.

John Smyda, who did the welding, body and paint work, suggested two 6" racing stripes on the car, but I nixed the idea. After seeing the pattern of the stripes on the new spoiler I changed my mind. (Def. #5 at work again!)

THIRD: I didn't think about the rear of the car when ordering the front spoiler, then Def. #5 struck again! Not wanting to spoil all the blocking, sanding and priming done on the original hood, I decided to put the rear spoiler on an extra hood and save the original. Between the start and finish of the rear spoiler project there were many moments of frustration, but considering this was my first time I'd ever done this, it came out leaking aretty good. Also, when taking the paint off, I found the hood I was using

had damage which the spoiler covered up, so all in all the project was very gratifying.





FOURTH: While originally planning to paint the stripes on, after seeing the effect of the reflective tape on the rear spoiler I decided to make the stripes with that, plus a ¼" trim with red reflective tape. The same with the red and white stripes down the side of the car. The sole purpose was to make the car



more visible at night, but was pleased that it made a positive decorative factor in the daytime. The red, white and blue motif wasn't planned, it just worked out that way. If fact, the edging on the front and sides was not planned, Def. #5 strikes again!

FIFTH: Since I had blended the rear spoiler in with the hood, Def. #5 struck took over again. I enclosed the underside of the spoiler end that extended over the rear

fenders, and covered it with a strip of reflective tape. On my trip to California, that paid off when a tow truck driver I was waiting for almost missed me in the dark.

SIXTH: The wheels I used had fake rivets on them so they would look like split rims. I cut the rivets off,

smoothed it out and painted the center of the wheels blue, with the knock-off hub wings covered in white reflective tape with a red trim strip. To hide the brake drums discs were made to fit behind the wheels. These were covered with red reflective tape. It looks good and really stands out at night.

I was 66 when I bought the car in Oct. '09 and did most of the body work in 2010. It was finally looking halfway decent in July of '11 but had a lot of problems to work out with the



custom fuel tanks and the carbs. During this whole project, Def. #2 has been a motivating factor, with Def. #5 a constant companion. But when all is said and done Def. #3 will reign supreme, because when you take a car that has been neglected, fix it up and give it a nice paint job, there is a very gratifying feeling from turning 'trash in to treasure'. Is the paint job as good as I would like it to be? NO!. Are there still little glitches that need to be worked out to make it as good as I would like? YES!! But seeing that this is the first time in my life that I have painted a car, I feel that I can hold up my head and say that I finished what I started, and it came out looking PRETTY GOOD!

All in all it has been a rewarding, if expensive, experience, laced with a lot of frustration in between. And this may sound like bragging, but it is a true observation – there's not another CORSA like it on the planet.

I recently went on a trip from Cullman, AL to Monterey, CA and back. The only trouble I had, though expensive, turned out to be a plugged fuel filter from debris left in the custom fuel tank. Other than that the car ran great over the 5000 miles I drove in a week's time.

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



From the Editor:

When Bad Things Happen to Good Corvairs:

Let's step into my Wayback machine for a few minutes. (remember Peabody and Sherman?) http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=iU8TbLza3qY This is painful to recall, but shows the benefits of belonging to a club.

We'll go back to April 7 of this year. I had the car over to Russ' to put new strut rod bushings on. Billy was there to help and the job went well. I was on my way home that afternoon.

The following Thursday, April 12, I took it to get the wheels aligned because of the new bushings and I was taking the car to Springfest. The technician in the shop twisted off one of the camber adjustment bolts and since one of the other four was already twisted off, they wouldn't complete the job. OK, I'll fix them later in the week and I headed to the office.

I got about a mile down the road and my clutch cable snapped. Since I was closer to Russ than I was to home I limped the car over to his place, called my boss to take the day off; called the wife to bring me some work clothes and we went to work putting in a new clutch cable, repairing the twisted off bolts and replacing all the bolts on both sides. We ended up twisting off another one trying to remove it, so out came the drill and the tap and the fun began.

While pulling off the freeway on the way home, as I slowed down I heard a snapping sound coming from the back of the car. It reminded me of the '69 Chevy pickup I had when I was young when it was about to throw a U-joint. I got the car home and jacked it up the next morning to investigate. It was either the outboard u-joint or the wheel bearing, I couldn't tell which. I called Russ for advice and then headed the car back over to his garage.

I had just got on I-65 when something came loose in the back end. I haven't taken the hubs apart yet, but I'm pretty sure I spun the rear wheel bearing on the passenger side. Russ came over to look and we decided to have it towed to my house, then trailered over to his. Thanks to Pete for his assistance with the trailer and the diagnosis. It sounded like something was grinding in the differential. Since Russ needed to prepare for Springfest it was decided nothing would be done to the car until after. There would be no yellow '66 convertible at Helen this year.

Fast forward to Tuesday, April 23. I had ordered new positrack plates and had a new flywheel and some other parts I had purchased a couple of years ago. Pete also dropped a clutch disk off to get resurfaced so we could do that while we were in there. Since we were going to have the drive train out anyway, what the heck?

We still didn't know about the wheel bearing for sure because while loading it up on the tow truck and trailer, plus driving it a short distance, it made absolutely no noise and seemed to drive OK. Later, when we got the strut rods and half shafts disconnected it became apparent the bearing was bad when the hub was turned by hand. A call to Richard netted me two rebuilt rear hubs with new bearings and a rebuilt backup switch, since mine had broke when we removed the connector. Thanks to Richard for keeping rebuilt spare parts around!

Russ and I worked on the car all week. The hubs went on as did the clutch disk, flywheel and a rebuilt harmonic balancer. We had opened up the differential and drained it for a visual inspection, but didn't take it apart, thinking the wheel bearing had caused the noises we heard initially. The ring and pinion were very tight together so we adjusted them correctly, put in new gear lube and put it back together. The drive train was installed on Saturday, April 28. The test drive did not go well; you could hear noise coming from the differential. We pulled the drive train back out the next day, took the differential completely apart and started making a shopping list.

On Monday, April 30, Russ bought new bearings for the differential and I bought a NOS side gear and thrust washer, plus thrust washers for the spider gears. I also got a couple of new u-joints since the mechanic that did the initial work on my car had only replaced one side. We found out why when it took us about 4 hours to press the old ones out (after cutting the bodies away from the caps with a grinding wheel) and pressing the new ones in (after honing the yokes to remove 40+ years of rust and grime).

Evenings through the week it was over to work on the car. By Saturday, May 5 it was ready to be put back in. The installation went well and the test drive even better!

This morning, May 7, it was back to the alignment shop for the alignment I tried to get last month. And my clutch cable didn't even break when I left to go to the office!

I want to thank Russ, Richard, Pete and Billy for lending a hand. I couldn't have gone through this without being a member of a club with members who are willing to step up and help another member in need.

What do you do when you remove a door panel carefully and it still pulls the clip out of the door panel? You repair it of course.

First you peel back the vinyl to expose the foam, then take a sharp knife or razor blade to get the foam padding loose. it doesn't hurt to get a thin layer of paper up with the foam.





Next take a piece of sheet metal and drill two holes next to each other for the slot that you will make. Then take a file and file the slot to make a flat on one end.

Last glue the piece of sheet metal on the cardboard in the location where the original slot has pulled out, then glue the foam over area where the metal is, then pull the vinyl around and on to the back of the card board and glue with some good weather strip adhesive. Then you can insert the metal clip on the back into the slot making sure to catch the piece of reinforcing sheet metal.

The same procedure is used where the bottom screw has pulled through the vinyl and cardboard. Only there be sure to drill the appropriate size hole for the screw.



Be sure and remove any burrs from cutting the sheet metal, and make sure to form the sheet metal so the edges curve toward the cardboard you are gluing it to, so you don't have any edges showing through the vinyl when you are done.

Installing grease fittings on rear wheel hubs - Richard Stolzmann

In the Tech Guide Volume One under Lubrication; page six is the information you need. If your copy is as bad as mine the pictures aren't very good. Here is addition information you need and hopefully some better pictures.



At the nine o'clock or the three o'clock position 1/2 inch from the backing plate drill a 3/16 hole if you are using a grease fitting that has a dimension of 1/4 by 28 NF and tap accordingly.

If you are doing it without taking apart the bearing assembly, drill the 3/16th hole with grease on the bit and only go in 1/4 inch after you drill through. Use a 1/4 by 28 NF tap with grease on it and turn it a few turns and remove and clean the chips off and regrease.

Keep on doing this until you have completed the tapping.

Insert grease fitting and grease

until you feel some resistance; that's usually when all the air has gone and the grease has no air pocket to fill. STOP GREASING.

After a couple of days of driving, pull the wheel and check for grease coming out on the outside seal, clean it off and in a couple of days check it again.

Another note: some of my grease fittings were 1/8 by 27 NPT. That's lot bigger so use the larger drill. I have pictures included of both fittings.

For those of you that don't read the 30 or so newsletters that come to us every month, here's some information to share:

Motor Oil:

There has been some buzz about a new Quaker State formulation called Defy that has a 'proprietary zinc booster' for protection of flat tappet engines. This is synthetic oil. I spotted it at Wal Mart for less than \$5 per quart. www.quakerstate.com

Also at Wal Mart I spied an Accel brand oil advertised for cars made before 1988 in 10W30 and 10W40 that meets the old SF specification. This is a multi viscosity detergent oil. It was selling for less than \$3 per quart. I couldn't find any information about it on Wal Mart's web site or the internet in general.

Thanks to the Niagara club for the information about these oils in their newsletter. They also mentioned an SF spec motor oil at Dollar General, but I haven't investigated that one.

NAPA also sells an SF spec oil with higher levels of ZDDP. I have been unable to find it locally, but I'm sure they would order it in for you. They do have it on line. There is also Kendall GT-1 which I haven't seen locally either.

I have been using Mobil1 Turbo Diesel Truck oil, 5-40, since I took the break in oil out 30K miles ago. I have some concerns about it being high detergent oil, but haven't had any issues. The main problem is that it is getting close to \$9 per quart and oil changes are getting painful.

<u>Differential Bearings for a '66 (or late model):</u>

The SKF part numbers are M88010, M88048, LM603049 and LM603011. These are available locally and can be cross referenced if the place doesn't carry SKF.

U Joints for a '66 (or late model):

NEA 1-0153. These are also available locally and can be cross referenced.

It all started one nice afternoon in 1975.

I was at the top of my game - 16 years old, owner of a 1969 GTO convertible and Honda CL175, and a part-time employee at the County Library. Then I found something. Yes, a light blue coupe on the North side of town. The car was different though. It had full instrumentation! It wasn't a Monza, but a Corsa. What the heck was that? My research had failed me. I drove back home wondering if the car was modified.

The next day or so I drove back over to the 'Lee' side of town (I was a Sidney Lanier guy). I had decided to buy the car — whatever it was. The car was gone and I knocked on the door. I begged and begged until the man gave me the name and phone number of the buyer...a fellow on Maxwell AFB. Well, I said I would give you the short version. That car served me well for 2 years during the crazy rise of gas prices into the 70 cent range. I went to college and something had to go. I was working the summer at Mears' Garage on the Mobile Hwy in Montgomery and a stranger pulled in and asked who owned the Corvair out front. I proudly said that I did. He asked what I wanted for it and I did the math in my head and blurted out, "I'll take \$650 for it." He pulled out his wallet and popped six Franklin's and one Hamilton in my hand and took the keys. An hour later he was back and the Corvair was gone. That was 1978 and I still had a Goat, but I was sick, really sick.



Corvair Door Drainage Holes


Some pictures of a typical Corvair door, both front and back on a 2 or 4 door.



Notice the factory drainage holes are not near the end of the doors. This means that if the car is parked on a slant uphill or downhill, that an inch of water could stay in the door plus all the dirt, causing it to rust out on the edges.



I punched three places close to together on the front and rear bottom of the door then took a 1/8 drill and drilled 3 holes. I then took a Dremel tool and enlarged it to make a smooth slot. Now it will drain completely even

Body By Fisher

The original Fisher Body Company was formed in Detroit, Michigan, in 1908 by brothers Fred and Charles Fisher, who were experienced coach craftsmen of the third generation.



Their grandfather had been skilled in the art of building carriages in Germany before the family moved to America in 1835, eventually settling in the area of Norwalk, Ohio. Their father, Lawrence Fisher, was a carriage builder and trained them in the craft at his blacksmith shop, and stressed craftsmanship above all else. Their uncle, Albert A. Fisher, had become a successful carriage maker and was based in Detroit.

Uncle Albert helped finance the endeavor but soon wanted out. Fred and Charles had wild enthusiasm and ambition towards building inexpensive closed cars, which had previously been only available on luxury cars of the day, as open cars with wooden frames were common in the early days of the industry.

Eventually, they brought their other brothers (Lawrence P., William, Edward, Alfred and Howard) into the business.

The Fisher brothers also knew that these new automobiles — which put power to the ground via its rear wheels — needed an entirely different technology to deal with the greatly different stresses on the body as compared to the horse-drawn carriages which were pulled from the front. In addition, these new bodies would require suitable engineering advances to deal with the greater vibrations and higher speeds that went along with the motorized vehicles.

As Fisher's volume went up, their unit price per closed body went down, which greatly helped make these closed cars more popular with the customers.

In 1919, a deal made between William C. Durant of General Motors and Fred Fisher gave GM three-fifths interest in the thriving Fisher Body Corporation. The 300,000 shares of common stock was worth some \$27.6 million, and General Motors now could be assured that Fisher would build their car bodies in the future.

By 1920, Fisher had developed scientific insulation to reduce road noise as well as providing greater occupant comfort against the weather. In 1923, Fisher Body made one of its most important contributions to the automobile world when it pioneered the use of lacquer instead of paint and varnish for the bodies. This proved to be one of the greatest advantages toward attaining volume production, thereby helping to bring the closed car within reach of the average buyer. This new painting process meant that instead of taking four weeks to paint and trim a body finished in varnish; it now took only six hours. This new method also permitted a greater variation in color finishes, which greatly helped satisfy the growing public interest in colors. The use of a lacquer finish greatly contributed to the new possibilities in automobile styling.

Fisher adopted a Napoleonic coach as its company logo in 1923. The emblem was designed to symbolize the ultimate in hand-built craftsmanship. The design itself was a combination of two French coaches — one used at Napoleon's coronation ceremony and the other at his wedding to Marie Louise of Habsburg-Lorraine, Arch-Duchess of Austria.

In 1926, General Motors purchased the outstanding minority interest in Fisher Body, making it a division of GM.

The 1930s saw a number of "Fisher Firsts" which included "No Draft Ventilation" in 1933, which was the addition of side vent windows that utilized air currents generated by the forward movement of the vehicle to prevent inside window fogging, cool the interior in hot weather, remove smoke and to bring in fresh air. Another development came in 1935 with the one-piece Turret Top, where the roof of the car was drawn and formed from a single sheet of seamless steel.

In 1936, the first "Unisteel" Body by Fisher, created by welding the steel inner and outer panels into a permanent shock-resisting structural unit, came into being. That same year brought dual windshield wipers, front door arm rests and inside door locks as Fisher firsts.

After General Motor's involvement in Fisher Body, there was a big push in the way of national advertising of the complete line of GM automobiles with "Body by Fisher."

To anyone who has owned or ridden in a General Motors product over the years, they would have seen the oval-shaped "Body by Fisher" Napoleonic emblem that was usually mounted in the doorsill area of the vehicle, or on the sides of the seat frame.

The last of the Fisher brothers died in 1972 and the seven brothers left a legacy that will long be remembered. In 1984, someone at General Motors felt it would be best to disband the Fisher Body Division and just identify it as the General Motor's own assembly plants. By doing this, and dissolving all of the famed "Body by Fisher" legacy, a great deal of the history that was such an important part of General Motors growth from the 1920s all the way to the early 1980s could no longer be communicated.

The move came to eventually remove the "Body by Fisher" insignias on General Motors vehicles.

Muscle car era GM cars being restored today and those prior still wear the Body Fisher script.








From the Editor: A strange thing happened to me on the way back from Oklahoma. My car quit going fast. On the freeway, secondary roads and sitting at stop lights it was the same old thing; 0 mph. What could I do to make my car go fast again? A new speedometer cable!

Late Model speedometer cable installation:

- 1. Is it really broke? Look under the dash and make sure it didn't come unscrewed.
- 2. If it looks good there, pull the front driver side wheel and remove the dust cap. The most likely place for a break is the bend coming into the hub. Gently pull on the inner cable. If it's broke it will pull right out.
- 3. Now that you know it's broke and you've got the new one there, plus the new grommet, let's get busy.
- 4. Unscrew the connection under the dash. Pry out the grommet at the firewall and cut it off. Fasten a piece of stiff wire, 5 6 ft. long to the end of the cable under the dash. Electrical tape works fine for this.
- 5. There's a hook behind the fender well that can be accessed through the hole where the gas tank filler tube passes through. Remove the cable from that hook.
- 6. Take the bracket loose that holds the cable to the front hub.





attached from under the dash through the hole in the firewall. Make sure the free end of the attached wire stays under the dash. Once out, remove the other end of the wire from the old cable and attach it to the new cable at the under dash connection.

- 9. The cable follows the steering column down to the hub. NOTE: The cable passes **over** the brake line to be able to rest in the hook on the back side of the wheel well. You can see this when you look up the steering column from under the car. The wire should be following that path to assist you in pulling the new cable back over the brake line and up under the dash. Carefully pull the new cable up through the firewall and under the dash. Screw the connection to the speedometer and install the new grommet. Pull **ALL** the slack towards the front of the car.
- 10. Attach the cable to the hook on the back side of the wheel well.
- 11. Feed the end of the cable through the hub.
 - 12. Attach the bracket in the wheel well. See picture at Step 7.
 - 13. Attach the bracket at the front hub. See picture at Step 6.
 - 14. Insert the end of the cable in the hole on the dust cap and gently tap the cap back on the hub. Use the raised edge of the cap to tap on,

Now my car really goes fast and that dreary old '0' feeling is gone. I've been 30, 50, even 75 mph! It's not accurate, but a check with my GPS shows its close enough. If you want absolute accuracy in your speedo and odometer, you'll need to visit a speedometer shop for a calibration. Look in the yellow pages.



LATE MODEL BACKUP SWITCH - J. Cleveland

Last month in the web links I found a site that sold late model backup switches. While I'm not an expert on the issues surrounding the stock ones, the biggest issue to me is the difficulty of removing the connector without pulling the pins and Bakelite top out of the stock switch. This could be caused by the exposure to the elements where the switch is mounted.

The FiberFab company's web site does not list the backup switch on its page, but the link below will take you to it. Some of you may remember that FiberFab purchased the rights to the Valkyrie line of kit cars. I called the phone number listed on the web site to place my order.



The switch I got is a more modern type that uses a ball bearing to activate the switch instead of the pin in the old one. It also has a weather tight sealed connector, which should eliminate corrosion issues. The price was less than \$60. I purchased one and with shipping the total cost was \$65, payable by PayPal.

For my money the site said I'd receive:

- 1 Simple step by step instructions
- 2 The factory fabricated 10 amp switch
- 3 Factory modified watertight seal
- 4 Simple two wire circuit design
- 5 Complete hardware

What I got was the switch with the new watertight connector and a packing slip. Since the original switch is a 'simple two wire circuit design' I'm not real sure what improvements they made. There's not much you can do with two wires! The connector came with a two wire pigtail about 6 inches long to

connect to the existing wiring. One of the pins wouldn't seat in the connector so I dabbed some epoxy in the back of the socket to hold it in.

Since it is a simple switch, polarity is not an issue. Installation consisted of removing the old connector and switch, cleaning up the metal seal ring and installing it with the new switch. I stripped the tape covering the existing wiring back about a foot to make the splice.

I slipped heat shrink tubing on the wire ends and then made solder connecti heat shrink was then slipped over the bare wires and molded in to place with the heat of the soldering iron. All this was covered with two layers of electrical tape and one layer of rubber tape for protection from the elements.

The switch has been very professionally done and the new connector is far better than GMs original design. My received my order in less than 5 days.

Corvair Damper Door modification J. Cleveland

While skimming through the tech guides a few months ago I ran across an article about removing the clips that hold the thermostat rods to the damper doors and replacing them with cotter keys. It seemed like a good idea to me as it is very difficult for me to get the swivel lined up with the clip and the hole in the damper door. The last time I put my lower shrouds back on I ruined one of my thermostats from the repeated pulling with my pliers and the consequent slipping off. As most of you know, replacing a thermostat is a pricy proposition.



To make the modification remove the clip and reinstall the swivel into the hole on the damper door. Make a mark on the swivel as shown in the picture at left. I added a washer. This will show how much room you have to drill the hole for the cotter key.

Count the turns it takes to remove the swivel so you don't lose your damper door adjustment. Be careful the rod doesn't unscrew from the thermostat.

I filed a small flat place for the drill bit so it would start true in the center of the swivel. The picture at the right shows the swivel with the hole drilled.





center of the swivel. The picture at the right shows the swivel Reinstall the swivel on the rod the same number of turns as when you removed it. Slip the swivel into the hole on the damper door.

Put the washer on the swivel pin and insert the cotter key into the hole. I was able to bend the key with long nose pliers.

It used to take me over an hour to get the swivels installed with the clips. Now I can do both sides in about 15 minutes.

Here's a picture of the swivel drilled with the cotter key.
