Chevrolet Corvair; Economy, excitement, extinction....

DECEMBER 24, 2015 (reprint of the article written by Mike Bumbeck)

MOSTLY UNEARNED REPUTATION STOLE THE CHEVROLET CORVAIR'S PROMISE

In 1960 America, “compact car” meant a full-size car shrunken to fit on a 100-inch (or so) wheelbase. The 1960 Ford Falcon and slightly more revolutionary 1960 Plymouth Valiant, for example, both tucked the engine up front with a solid rear axle driving the rear wheels—just like their full-size Fairlane and Dodge Dart big brothers (yes, the Dart was a full-size car in 1960).

The Chevrolet Corvair was something else entirely. Hitting the road in 1959 as a 1960 model, the Corvair represented a sharp departure from domestic-automaker convention: An 80-hp, air-cooled aluminum flat-six engine ran behind a transaxle, way in the back, and the

car featured unit-body construction and swing-axle rear suspension.

The Corvair was the future, or at least it looked a lot like the future.

As “compact” was synonymous with “thrif” in 1960, Chevrolet did a lot with a little. Cost for a two-door Corvair was about \$2,000 in '60 (which adds up to a little over \$16,000, adjusted for 2015 dollars), putting the Corvair then, as now, into economy-car territory.

Chevrolet opted for a rear-engine, rear-wheel-drive design to, in part, remove the intrusion created by the transmission tunnel in a conventional front-engine/rear-drive car (something the industry’s adoption of the front-engine, front-wheel-drive configuration would also solve), and Corvair’s versatile architecture was soon spun into a coupe, sedan, wagon and even van. Sure, cost factors—along with the gnashing of accounting and engineering—resulted in a car that could have been better, but the Corvair drove into the world as it was. And at the time, it seemed to have a long, successful road ahead of it; production numbers topped 250,000 in '60.

Except for one little thing: The Corvair, like any rear-engine car, could, in fact, oversteer enough to get a driver not familiar with rear-engine driving dynamics in some rear-first trouble. Combine unexpected oversteer with a swing-axle independent rear suspension, and things could get ... surprising.

A factory recommendation of 15 psi front, 26 psi rear tire pressure was issued, but tire pressure warnings, as they so often do, went unheeded. An unfortunate lack of a standard front sway bar—economy-car cost-cutting, naturally—didn’t help matters. And accidents happened.

Yet the public didn’t seem to mind—at first. Production neared 340,000 in 1961 and 1962, and remained relatively strong beyond that as Chevrolet continued to refine the Corvair and shuffle the model range.

The Corvair was not conceived as a particularly sporty car; four-door Corvairs were the first off the line in 1960, followed by the two-door club coupe. The majority of 1960 cars were equipped with the optional two-speed Powerglide automatic transmission. But the introduction of the Falcon/Valiant-analogous Chevy II economy car in 1962 gave the Corvair room to move toward performance—a direction it was already drifting toward with the successful debut of the Corvair Monza concept at the 1960 Chicago Auto Show.

And so what was launched as a versatile and economic platform for a new kind of economy car began to embody something different.

This almost unintentional sportiness resulted in a more sorted Corvair suspension. A regular production option package with antiroll bar, stiffer springs and swing-axle travel limiters arrived in 1962. This became standard in 1964, along with a transverse rear-suspension camber compensator. Perhaps tellingly, a handling-improving camber compensator had been available via the aftermarket from 1960; aftermarket parts-giant EMPI likely foresaw the demand for this kit after manufacturing a similar setup for its sport-oriented customer base of Volkswagen drivers.

The sad end for the Corvair station wagon came in 1963, while the sport-packaged Corvairs continued to rise. But model-year improve-

ments were more or less evolutionary until a major redesign for the 1965 model year—which came not long before the Nov. 30, 1965 release of a book, “Unsafe at Any Speed,” that notoriously called out the car by name. The first chapter of self-styled consumer advocate Ralph Nader’s text, titled “The Sporty Corvair—The One-Car Accident,” stated, in part, that the car was a public tragedy resulting from the supposedly secret world of automotive engineering. But was the unsafe, widowmaker reputation of the Corvair wholly deserved? No—or at least, not entirely. For one, any early ‘60s American compact car shared economy-class road dynamics with the early Corvair. Nothing from the Big Three in 1960 that was both compact and economical was built to travel nimbly at any great velocity; in 1972, a National Highway Traffic Safety Administration study found that the Chevrolet was on par with its economy contemporaries in the handling department.

(This was as much an indictment of the era’s cars as it was an acquittal of the Corvair: With four-wheel drum brakes, bias ply tires and thrift-spec suspension damping, early 1960s compact-car handling could be described as downright frightening compared to even the most beat-up, last-pick, mismatched-tire economy-class car left standing in a modern airport rental-car-fleet pickup lot.) Moreover, economy-oriented imports—to say nothing of the Porsche 356—shared the Corvair’s initial rear-engine, swing-axle configuration, and along with it, the same oversteer and fold-over potential.

Having experienced a swing-axle, rear-wheel fold-over behind the wheel of a Volkswagen Beetle shortly after getting a driver’s license, this writer can attest that the experience is a bit crazy—but certainly not isolated to the Corvair.

It’s true that swing-axle rear suspension-equipped import cars earned reputations as widowmakers for the same reasons as the Corvair—we’re looking in your direction, Renault Dauphine—but never to the extent of the much-maligned Chevrolet.

The VW Bug’s shortcomings (suspension and handling being just two of them) are even seen as endearing through the lens of nostalgia!

Tragically, and ironically, the Corvair’s greatest opportunity to turn a metaphorical corner (and to turn real-life corners safely and confidently) arrived just as Nader’s book debuted. A new-for-1965 redesign brought crisp, almost Italian styling to the Corvair formula, while the Corsa’s optional turbocharged—turbocharged!—engine now boasted peak output of 180 hp. A quad-car-bureted naturally aspirated version of the flat-six, meanwhile, was rated for 140 hp. The contentious swing-axle? Gone, in favor of a fully independent design.

Yet the fallout from bad press and muckraking lingered, and the Corvair’s reputation as an ill-handler stuck despite marked advancements. The Corvair offered more style, performance, refinement and, arguably, safety than ever before, but it was too late.

The storm created by the press, performance-oriented competition from the new Ford Mustang and internal corporate friction, combined with a brand battle with the far more conventional Camaro, was too powerful for even the well-equipped Corvair to survive. Sales crumbled: under 110,000 cars in 1966, barely over 27,000 in 1967, around 15,000 in 1968 and just 6,000 in 1969.

The Corvair evolved for nearly a decade, taking a few surprising turns along the way, as what may not have started life as a sporting machine grew into one. In an alternate timeline, Chevrolet might have continued to develop the Corvair, perhaps as its own brand un-

der the GM corporate umbrella, but orthodoxy combined with increasing production costs and public perception caused the demise of the Corvair more than any danger inherent in its design.

The last of the Corvairs were sold as 1969 models with a \$150 incentive toward any Chevrolet purchased before 1974—by which time, we imagine, there were at least a few freshly minted Vega owners wishing they could have had a brand-new Corvair to drive home in.

Late Model Front Suspension Removal by: John Cleveland

I'd recommend a lift, but this can be done with jack stands. If using jack stands the car will need to be high enough off the ground to allow the front cross member, springs and shocks, hubs and backing plates to be removed from under the car. To get the suspension out a garage jack (wheeled) can be used if the car is high enough, or a dolly of some kind can be fabricated and the suspension lowered on to it. Remember, safety first!


Get some good flare nut wrenches. I would recommend Craftsman or Snap On. You don't need a whole set to work on a Corvair, but a 5 piece set of Craftsman is just \$35 while a 6 piece set of Snap On will run you about \$200. Either set will be high enough quality you'll pass them down to several generations of Corvair mechanics. The two you'll use most is the 3/8 - 7/16 and the 1/2 - 9/16. No Corvair tool box should be without at least these two sizes. If your brake lines are in good shape, a good wrench won't round the nuts and you'll have a better chance of getting them off. Worst case is a pair of Vise Grips. If this is the case I am preparing an article on replacing brake lines; guess why!

I'm not going to go in to rebuilding a front suspension for the simple fact that after we got my suspension out and on the bench I realized I was totally out of my comfort zone. If you haven't don't this before, get someone to help. Removing the thing is the easy part and some of the steps, such as removing and installing the springs, can be downright dangerous. If you're not in a hurry to get this done, start looking around for a good used suspension that can be disassembled, blasted and rebuilt. This allows time to do the job and at the end, just take the old one out and put the new one in. Prices and quality vary widely, so take some time and look around. Sometimes you can trade your old one for their old one. Again, get some help if you're not sure what to look for. Also, you'll possibly need every tool known to man and it takes time to run some of those tools down. Severely rusted bolts may need a cutting torch to persuade them to come off and access to a press will be needed to remove and install bushings.

Whether you use your existing suspension or a different one, before the job starts clean up bolts and nuts and begin soaking them with penetrating oil to help loosen up the rust. Take a good look at it to determine what replacement parts you might need. All the bushings, tie rod ends, shocks and ball joints for sure, but look at things like the springs, upper control A Arm shaft and tie rod sleeves. My sleeves had been mauled by a pipe wrench and one of them actually had a twist in it! I opted for new ones with new clamps. The front suspension takes a pretty good beating over its lifetime and things can crack or bend. Get new bolts whenever possible. Grade 8 bolts are readily available and some shopping around can get you some pretty good prices. Tractor Supply sells grade 8 bolts and nuts by the pound which can really save you some bucks.

Good luck!

1. After the car is raised and secure, remove the front wheels.
2. Loosen and remove the front brake lines from the brake hoses on both sides of the car (photo at right). Have a rag handy to catch brake fluid.
Remove the clip that holds the brake hoses to the brackets (photo below).



3. Remove the speedometer cable from the driver's side backing plate.



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

4. Remove the pitman arm from the steering box. You may need to drive a wedge in to get it loose.
5. On the passenger side remove the two bolts holding the idler arm to the frame.

At this point the suspension is ready to be removed from the car. The last step involves removing the 6 bolts, 3 on each side, that hold the cross member to the body. The photo at left shows the location of the bolts from the top of a suspension that has been removed.

OR



You can continue to disassemble the suspension by removing the stabilizer bar and steering linkages. This will make the final cross member removal easier.

Al suggested rotating meeting locations. It was thought that may not be very practical due to how widely dispersed our membership is. On the whole Al's thoughts were well received.



RUSS THULEEN'S 140 ENGINE BUILD

Everyone knows that Russ is probably the most knowledgeable and talented Corvair Mechanic in the Southeast. Well, he happens to be very generous as well.

The Chevrolet Corvair quad-car-bureted naturally aspirated version of the flat-six was rated for 140 hp. Russ thought that the RM block (RM 6-164 with Manual Transmission, Special High Performance Engine used in 1965-67 cars) hanging around his shop needed to be built and DONATED to the Corvair community. So he set about getting the parts he needed and a build plan. Like the RM block, some of the rebuild parts (Gaskets, seals, etc.) were already in his stash. The 140 heads were transported all the way over to Georgia for a full rework. While there the valves were ground and refurbished. New valve seals were installed and the seats were properly 'peened'. But not all of the parts were available so a call to Clark's was in order. Upon receipt, Russ's labor hours continued to mount





Jacking Up Your Car by John Cleveland



If you work on your car in the driveway like I often do, you get used to getting the floor jack out and getting the car off the ground enough to safely work under it.

In the past I always stuck the jack under one side, jacked it up high enough to get a jack under the back on one side, then went to the other side and did the same. Once the rear jacks were in place I positioned the jack under the front cross member from the front of the car and raised the front. Doing this would twist my convertible so much that the doors would always get out of alignment, adding one more

thing to do when the real job was completed.

While cleaning the garage one afternoon I came across a pressure treated 4X4 from my deck



rebuild and the idea was formed. Why not make a support to put on the floor jack and raise the rear of the car in one step and not twist it?

The length of the 4X4 is 1 inch shorter than the distance between the weld seams of the frame. I took my router and hogged out a circle in the center that fit the pad on my jack to keep the 4X4 from slipping side to side.

The position under the car is just behind where the tunnel cover meets the back cover. Your floor jack must have a low enough profile that it will go under the car with the 4X4 on it. You could take an inch or so off the 4X4 to make it fit





Alternative Fuel Lines by Billy Cannon

I have been slowly getting the '62 Rampside that I bought from Wilma 'road worthy'. One of the requirements of driving a 140 equipped rampside is modifying the engine compartment in order to mount aftermarket air cleaners. Russ had freshened up a set of secondary carbs for the truck but I wanted to assemble the engine bay 'tins' and give it a good coat of paint before installing the fuel system. After seeing Rick Norris's race car fuel system it made perfect sense to me to do the same setup on the truck. The stock copper flared fuel lines and fittings on the 140 tend to leak after they are tightened a couple of times. The flare is designed to 'crush fit' the hard line to the fitting and once installed and then removed for reuse after a carburetor replacement, leaks will develop and the brass nuts tend to 'round off' even with the best of flare wrenches.



Rick's design utilizes AN-6 fittings assembled with Aeroquip hose cut to length. (Remember to measure twice and cut once.) Once installed, these fittings can be reused over and over with absolutely NO leaks. I recommend purchasing at least a couple of the -6 size aluminum wrenches. They do not damage the appearance of the fittings if used properly. With the electric fuel pump mounted to the front of the truck and below the fuel tank, the 'bulkhead' fitting works great with getting the lines into the engine compartment. The only deviation to the drawing above is the use of two fuel blocks (each with 2 outlets) rather than the 4 outlet version that Rick used. The cost of this system is comparable to what Clark charges for a complete 140 fuel line set. I plan to use this for ALL my future projects.

From the Prez,

One of my favorite song lyrics is by John Lennon when he said that life is what happens to you while you're busy making other plans. That has been true at our house the last few months. Here is July staring me in the face and I'm wondering, "Where did spring go?" Instead of my other plans I'm in one of life's cycles that comes around when everything starts breaking down. The lawn mower, Denise's truck, my car (clutch cable, continuing carb issues, trunk lock spring), basement tile coming loose... And then there are the projects you are trying work on in between all the break downs that you just can't keep from going south.

A case in point is my latest guitar project. I am modifying a guitar I've had for quite a few years but didn't like the body style and weight. I've taken it apart, stripped the finish and found the body is made of plywood! OK, keep going I say, so I get the body cut to the shape I want. While rounding over the edges the bit comes out of my no name laminate trimmer, while it's running, and gouges into the side of the guitar body. It then takes off across the garage and imbeds itself in a box of sandpaper. OK, keep going I say, so a little more body modification than I'd planned. When I get it sanded down and put on the first coat of sanding sealer the veneer starts lifting off. OK, keep going I say, so I get some epoxy wood filler and start filling in the voids caused by peeling off the lifted veneer. I've got the primer on and 6 coats of white paint. This helps but it still looks like a 6th grade science project. OK, keep going I say. Think I'll go for a wild paint job to hide all the blemishes. Just hope it sounds as good when I'm done as before I started!

Now for the Corvaire stuff. Thanks to our club members who have been keeping the Corvaire and the club in the public eye so far this year. We have been well represented at quite a few shows and cruise ins. Now that things seem to be settling down around the house, I hope I can get out and in the mix with them.

Thanks also to Russ for giving me an afternoon to learn carb rebuilding. I now have two primaries ready to go if I have any more difficulties and will soon have a couple of secondaries. Some investigation has brought to light at least one issue with the carb problems I've been dealing with: When I installed my fuel pressure regulator I used rubber 'gas line'. At least that's what the youngster at the auto

parts store called it. Since I moved the fuel filter from before the regulator to the last thing before the stock fuel lines to the carbs, the idle circuit plugging seems to have gone away. I was seeing some blackening on the filter element that looked mysteriously like fuel line. Got some hose rated for fuel installed along with a new filter and there's no more discoloration on the filter.

Other Corvaire projects I hope to get one this summer are getting the ring and pinion replaced on the differential I shelled last winter and the steering box rebuilt.

So those are my plans. Let's see what life has to say about it!

'Dustless' Blasting by Danny Joe

When I put my Rampside on the rotisserie, I wanted to try an attachment for using a pressure washer to sandblast with.

I bought a kit from Northern Tool (\$69.00), it has a tip that plugs in where the regular tips connect. The tip uses the venturi effect to draw sand up the hose and inject it into the water stream. It has a steel tube for the pickup end; the tube has a air vent pipe welded to the side that is supposed to help assist in keeping the sand flowing.



As it is dustless, it is possible to use silica sand without a respirator, which is less than half the price of non-silica medium. Using play sand from Lowe's (on sale \$2.50/50 lb, regular \$3.85), it was soon determined that it is not dry enough to feed properly. Spread out the sand to dry (Luckily I have a concrete parking pad next to my shop that is big enough to hold a dozen bags easily.). It is kind of a pain and requires about 10 buckets to hold the dry sand, then store them in the shop to keep them dry.

Even with drying the sand, it still did not feed consistently. The sand would fill up the hose and stop flowing. The pickup hose is 12' in length, so I cut it down to about 6'. This improved feeding, but with the sand that close I soon found that the container has to be covered to keep it dry. It doesn't take much moisture to gum things up! I have also done a couple of other things to help. I have an old Craftsman sandblaster kit, I am using just the hopper for its tapered bottom, also putting the hopper on a cart to raise it to waist height. When using the Craftsman hopper the probe is removed and the hose plugs directly into the bottom as they are the same size. A pressurized hopper would probably work much better!



Performance: probably about what you could expect for something that is intended for small projects. It does remove paint and rust, but is painfully slow if the sand isn't feeding properly. I have used 30 bags of sand so far and have done about half of the underside.

Positive: since it is dustless, no respirator needed! If you don't mind getting covered in wet sand, all you need is safety glasses (and remember to keep your mouth shut!). I get wet anyway, so just rinse off with a hose when done.



Flash rust: It shows up almost immediately. There is a chemical (HoldTight®102) to add to the water that prevents flash rust for 48-72 hours. There is no residue and the metal can be painted with no further preparation. As it is taking so long to remove the remain-

der of the paint and undercoating, I am not using the Hold-Tight®102 at present. After the underside is completely cleaned, I plan to use the chemical to remove the flash rust with sand and rinse.

The HoldTight®102 is \$185 for 5 Gallons. Recommended mixing ratio is 7 ounces per 5 gallons of water. I have a 65 gallon tank, which would give me about 20 minutes of pressure washing for 3 quarts of the chemical.

After blasting, epoxy primer will be used to seal the metal.

Dual Master Cylinder Installation

This is the first of a series of articles about a winter project I had installing a dual master cylinder, new brake lines, hoses and new front and rebuilt rear wheel cylinders. I had been having some braking issues and after getting in to this project I found out why.

The project isn't real difficult if you have the tools and can deal with some unexpected twists and turns along the way. Remember, your car is around 50 years old and the brake lines could be original. This is what I was dealing with on my car. When Russ and I rebuilt the front end I twisted off the end of the front passenger side brake line trying to get the hose disconnected. Since removing the gas tank wasn't part of the plan we drilled a hole through the fender well and ran a new line up into the trunk and over to another hole drilled to get under the dash to the brake line tee. You can see the temporary line held in place with white Velcro. Also shown is the original master cylinder.



Start by removing the brake line between the original master cylinder and the union that runs to under the dash. Then remove the two nuts

that hold the master cylinder to the trunk wall.

Here's what you'll have after the old master cylinder has been removed. Coming through the hole you can see the brake rod from the pedal inside the car. Clean it up and install the new gasket. I purchased



my new master cylinder from Clark's and just followed the directions that came with it. They tell how to bench bleed it before it is installed. Do not skip this step as it makes bleeding the brakes much easier when you're finished. The object just below the left mounting bolt is the brake line union that takes the brake line under the dash. The tubing seen to the far left is the temporary line I ran after twisting the end off the original line.



Here's the new dual cylinder mounted and ready for the brake lines to be installed.

If this is all you are going to do, the original line between the old master cylinder and the union can be reused. The kit includes the second brake line, a template for drilling the additional hole to get it under the dash and a union for connecting the new line to the existing brake line.

You'll need to make some adjustments to the brake rod that is connected to the brake pedal and actuates the master cylinder. Instructions for this are in the shop manuals and the tech guide.



When the installation is complete top off both chambers in the master cylinder and bleed the brakes. Begin with the rear wheels first (longest lines first). In a Corvair the passenger rear seems to be the longest run and the driver's side rear the next. Third, do the passenger front, then the driver's front. There are many good sets of specific instructions on the internet where you can get detailed information on performing this task.

Stay tuned next month for the really fun part; removing all the old brake lines and installing new ones.







Accelerating towards a cleaner environment

CommuteSmart, along with Waste Reduction and Technology Transfer (WRATT), conducted free vehicle emissions testing for Alabama Power employees on the roof of the Corporate Headquarters employee parking deck on Wednesday, July 20.

'Emission' Testing by Russell Noble

Had emission check today at work for free, so I drove the Vair in. Only 16,900 ppm of CO! Blew HC out of the water at 1,240 ppm. BTW, carb rebuilds and plugs scheduled for this winter.

Installing Brake Lines


This article will focus on hooking up the lines to the dual master cylinder I installed in the car last November. The dual master cylinder provides separate braking circuits for the front and rear of the car which still leaves some braking available if there is a failure in either circuit.




For tools you'll need a couple of good quality flare nut wrenches and the regular assortment of wrenches, screwdrivers, hammers, dynamite, nerve medicine, etc. I would highly recommend taking the lines apart instead of cutting them and then taking the fittings loose with vice grips. I purchased the brake line kit from a popular vendor and I had to use some of the original lines to get the new 'pre-bent' lines bent correctly. A good tubing bender would have been handy, but I've bent a lot of tubing and know some shortcuts, especially for correcting bends already made.

If you purchase the dual master cylinder kit it comes with a template for drilling the second hole in the trunk for the additional braking circuit. It also comes with a piece of pre-bent tubing and a coupling to tie in to the brake line going to the rear of the car. Since I had already drilled a hole for my temporary front passenger brake line the picture is not the same as the template in the kit.

In this picture the line on the right is going to the original bulkhead cross fitting that is under the dash. The line on the left is the new line that will feed the rear brake circuit. Note the coupling connecting the two lines. I also used my own grommet with some clear, paintable silicone to seal the hole in the new line since the hole I drilled wasn't the size the kit instructions recommended.



Here's a picture looking up under the dash at the original cross fitting (red circles) and the new brake line going to the rear of the car (yellow circles). The two lines coming out of the cross fitting go to the two front brakes. The plug on the right of the fitting went to the rear brake line. The line from the master cylinder comes in through the top (see picture above). The line shown in the yellow circles is the new line going to the rear brakes.




The long line going to the rear of the car was the most difficult to remove and install. You must remove the tunnel pan cover and I would recommend removing the heater duct from the tunnel. This is a good time to do any upgrades/repairs on the heating system since you are going to have most of it exposed on both ends.

On my car the hose between the back of the tunnel duct and the heater fan was in bad shape. The new hose was not that expensive and it made a huge difference in heater performance. I also cleaned out the duct that ran through the tunnel and installed a new foam gasket to the vent under the back seat.



Pay close attention to how the long brake line comes out from the front to the rear of the car. It has to go around the clutch and emergency brake cables, shift tube and the wiring that runs through the tunnel.




Carpet pulled back and heater/defroster duct removed.


Take pictures to help you get everything back together correctly, especially detailed photos or video of the tunnel, front to back. It will greatly help getting it all back together correctly.

This is the picture that saved me. It shows the brake line in relation to the emergency brake cable, and how they properly cross in the tunnel to avoid rubbing together.

These pictures are of the tee at the rear of the car (driver's side) where the long brake line from the front branches to each rear drum. The picture on the left shows removing the old brake hose. On the left the new lines are installed, waiting on installation of the new brake hoses and clips.

Most of the trouble I had was installing the long brake line. It seemed to be bent too short to go up into the cabin at the front and I had to rebend it in several places to get it to fit. If I had drilled the hole from the trunk according to the template the long line would not have reached without a lot of straightening of the 'stock' bends in the tunnel area.

New brake hoses and rear brake cylinders are available at local auto parts stores though I couldn't find front ones anywhere except Corvair vendors. The front and rear cylinders are different sizes internally. I bought two rear cylinders at Advance Auto. When I went to install them one had a metric bleeder fitting and one had SAE. The packaging and part numbers were exactly the same. Next month I'll conclude with installation of the front brake lines which involves pulling the gas tank. I'll also show never revealed photos of my original master cylinder and hopefully of the rear brake cylinders. You won't believe your eyes!

The meeting was adjourned at 8:15 PM.


Unfortunate turn of events for Russell Noble's '65 Corsa 'vert at the Fultondale cruise in!

Remembering Walt


Scott Pilkington wrote the following on Thursday, August 18, 2016 10:27 PM

"I am sad to report that Walt moved in to the next realm this afternoon. He was 88. A constant student of art, automotive theory, aerodynamics and creative space usage and the application thereof to his beloved 366 that he put close to a half million miles on. He was a friend, mentor and confidant. I will miss him. I last talked to him a week ago. He was chipper and sharp witted even though he knew the end was near. His laugh was the same."

Famed UltraVan-owner (#366) and VCE member, Walt Davidson was the king of weight reduction. You had to see the interior of his coach to believe it. It was said he wouldn't paint his coach because the paint was 4 lbs. a can. Walt had no door on his bathroom - too much weight again. He got his coach down to weighing less than a Corvair passenger car and he had the weight slips to prove it. In fact I think the last time he drove it across the scales he had weight slips claiming just under 2400 lbs.

Walt was also very knowledgeable! On page 18 of the transmission section of the CORSA Tech Guide he wrote out the test procedure for a torque converter sprag using a spare stator support shaft.

"...Now with the torque converter still on the bench and the stator support shaft (SSS) in place: hold torque converter still with the left hand and grasp the SSS hard in the clockwise direction. If SSS wants to continue turning, that is, spin out of your grip, you have a bad overriding clutch (sprag.) Again, you should be able to twist the SSS while engaged with the stator in the torque converter and hold it while feeling the internal pieces continue to turn."

I've made the decision to go back to a mechanical fuel pump after several years of trying electric ones with little success. My failure rate with the electric pumps is worse than when I ran mechanical ones and I'm getting tired of being stranded on the side of the road with a fuel pump failure. At least with a mechanical pump I can get going at least far enough to get off a freeway or busy highway and change the oil if I need to. A four month old electric pump left me on the side of I-65 last evening at rush hour and that was the straw that broke the back!

I'm not buying cheap pumps, but using ones that fellow Corvaire enthusiast recommend. It could be where it's installed, but I've talked with people who have them installed in the same place. The circuit is fused, then goes through an oil pressure switch, then to a switch under the dash before going to the pump. Both switches are wired to be bypassed in case of a switch failure, so I know it isn't one of those.

I'd be interested to know anyone out there who has had electric fuel pump failure from pumps purchased in the last couple of years. I wonder if we are going to go through a period of poor production like the mechanical ones did.

Thanks to Billy for running the meeting in September. All the other officers were off doing something else. I was stuck in Savannah, GA working on some new facility installations. The tropical storm down there caused us a couple of days delay so I didn't get home in time for the meeting. Better go for now as I have to REPLACE ANOTHER FUEL PUMP this afternoon. 

The "Corvairs at Barber Motorsports (formerly SE Corvairs Picnic)" was introduced and because we have time for the rebranding during advertising, "SE Corvairs Picnic" will eventually be dropped. With that in mind, Billy projected

an event flyer/registration and T-shirt design for the club's approval. Discussion followed and attendees of this meeting approved. The design will be publicized to ALL members for their approval/suggestions through follow on meetings.



Progress report on the Rampside!

The sandblasting was so slow I was not able to use the flash rust preventative. Because of this I used Rustoleum's Rusty Metal Primer on the underside so I could just spray it directly over the flash rust. The Harbor Freight HVLP sprayer did an excellent job, though I had some water in the air by the time I got through.

Did some research online, saw this air drier made from PVC pipe. It cost about \$30 to build. I put 2 inputs on it as the one small compressor I was using could keep up with the sprayer but not with the DA sander.



It is supposed to work by giving the air a chance to slow down, cooling the air and condensing the water. It works perfectly so far, I have operated the DA sander for 2 hours at a time with no moisture coming through the final air hose. I get a good amount of water from the drain valve everyday.


I had already blasted all of the hard-to-reach places on the exterior, so I used a wirewheel to remove all the flash rust and also the old paint that wasn't blasted away. Kevin Told me that Bill Warren's painter was wiping down with ospho before the final sanding, that it seals and shows rust that would not otherwise be seen.

I got some ospho, found out that just spraying it on causes a mess. The best method is to wet a rag and wipe down. It really did show rust in places I was sure were clean.

Presently working on sanding, hoping to spray the epoxy primer this week. I need to get the body primed before the rainy season starts, the doors and other pieces can be prepped and kept inside the shop for a good time to prime them.

After the priming is done it will be time to go back to the metal work!

Installing Brake Lines

This is the final article on replacing those pesky brake lines. The lines going to the front brakes require removing the stabilizer bar and gas tank so it is a good time to replace those old cracked and dry bushings and get that new sending unit you've been wanting. I would also recommend purchasing new gas




tank fill and vent lines as they will be soft and flexible which will make installation a lot easier.

The stabilizer bar come out pretty simply. Remove the bolts, nuts and washers from each side and spread the bottom part of the stabilizer link with a large screwdriver or pry bar. (Yellow Circle). Install the new bushing by spraying the bar and inner part of the bushing with you favorite penetrating oil. This helps the bushing slide on to the bar.

Now comes the fun part, removing the gas tank. Hopefully your've run almost all the gas out of the car before starting this project. Most of the remaining gas can be removed with a hose and suction pump from the fill spout. I got a hand pump from Harbor Freight that worked well. There wasn't much gas left in the tank so I only got about 1/2 gallon. It's best to do it outside or in a well ventilated garage. There will still be some gas left in the bottom of the tank and in the lines, so loosen a gas line from under the car and drain into a good gas can. I used a connection to my electric fuel pump which was at the lowest point in the system.



The wire to the sending unit should just pull off the sending unit and the gas line clamp can be loosened and the gas line removed. There will be a ground wire that should be attached to the underbody that will need to be removed. (Red Circle).



Fuel pump mounted behind gas tank is the lowest part of my fuel system. Excellent place to completely drain the system.

I thought I had a shot looking up to where the filler hose and vent line connected to the tank, but couldn't find it. There are hose clamps on each one that need to be loosened and then they can be wiggled free of the tank. Best access is through the driver side wheel well, but if your arms are skinny enough you can reach up the side of the gas tank. Both methods may be needed. If the hoses have been there a while they will be dry and stiff and require some effort to get them loose. The fill hose may also be painted to the metal inside the access door and that may need to be scored with a knife to loosen the paint.

Here is a shot of the cavity where the gas tank goes. The yellow circle shows where the front passenger side brake line exits to the wheel. I had no issues installing the passenger side line. The bends were all correct and it fit well.

Below is a shot of the driver side front brake line. This line came incorrectly bent and I had to do a lot of work on it. Because this line has a lot of bends, it is a complex installation. Note that in this picture it shows how far off the line was from the exit hole in the fender well. The grommet is installed in the hole prior to taking the picture (red circle).




On the next page you will see the front brake circuit connections under the dash (yellow circle). There is a two hole grommet the two front brake lines go through, using the existing hole. The old connection that went to the rear line is now plugged. The driver side front brake line was bent facing to the side of the car instead of to the block fitting. It was one of two incorrect bends in this line. It is connected to the left side of the block.



You can see the new rear brake line coming in to the right and going to the tunnel (right circle).

Once you are done with the lines, the gas tank and stabilizer bar can be reinstalled. A couple of things I've found that make reconnecting the gas line fill and vent hoses are to use new ones because they are more flexible and to use a SMALL amount of light grease or oil on the inside of the hoses that are going on the gas tank to help them slide on. Another good tip is to put the hose clamps on before you put the hoses on. I mention this because I am really bad about not putting the hose clamps on....



Fill the system with brake fluid, bleed the system and check for leaks.



The brake pedal will probably need some adjustment after all these changes. The adjustment is shown in the red circle. It can be moved in or out to get the correct pedal movement.

Here are a couple of before and after bonus pictures of the old master cylinder before I drained it. I have no idea how my brake system got this way. I check my brake fluid quarterly and used a new gasket every time I removed the top of the master cylinder. This happened over a four month period. The fluid wasn't pristine when I checked it before, but it was nowhere near this.


The Corvair Really Was An Unsafe Automotive Product

DeLorean. Belatedly, in the late 1960s, GM also formally recalled Corvairs for carbon-monoxide leakage from its heater exchange system. Though lethal, the Corvair was a pretty car.

Progress report on Club Cars!

This month the Russ Thuleen VCE Corvair garage was certainly open for business!

First in the hopper was Howard Tutt's '66 Monza for a much needed oil leak fix. What everyone thought to be a complete push rod tube reseal turned out to be just a simple tightening of some oil pan bolts and a valve cover gasket replacement. An easy task with the car up on the lift. While up in the air a general safety and mechanical problem mitigation inspection was performed. A major problem was discovered on the drivers side front flexible brake hose. Apparently the previous owner had installed the wrong hose which was too long and caused it to rub on the tire when the car steering was all the way to the right. The protective outer lining was 'almost' worn completely through. Hose replacement and brake bleed was performed and no other problems under the car were detected. Howard's Monza is a very solid car throughout and is one of the best riding Late Model Corvairs that this reporter has ever been in.



This reporter's '62 Rampside was next on the lift for a gas tank replacement. You may remember that this is the truck that I bought from Wilma after Bob's unfortunate passing. Again, a solid example of a vehicle that has had the Vulcan loving touch applied to it. As per Bob's request, it is outfitted with new 140 internals, intake and exhaust on a truck block. It has a '64 4 speed transmission (Shifter in the floor—tube through the gas tank). Members of the club had previously installed a dual master cylinder, all new brake hardware and lines and rebuilt and refurbished the rear drive components. But the then reconditioned tank has sat these past several years and the gas in the tank along with the sending unit had gone BAD. Hence the need for the new tank.. After a 2nd day air delivery of the NEW sending unit, we installed the tank and thought we were finished. After installation of three different electric fuel pumps with miserable results (NO GAS to the carbs), Russ made the good decision to try a NEW pump. VOILA...the 140 sprang to life but was running like crap. You guessed it...the bad gas had gotten into the accelerator pumps and every component was stuck or plugged up. Russ once again instructed Howard and I on how to rebuild '66 Rochester carbs and now the old truck is running up and down the road like it should.

Next was Clyde and Brenda Cork's '64 Spyder. It would not go into reverse and was running pretty rough as well. The first problem was an improper installation of a quick shift modification. After returning the shift mechanism to stock, the car was brought down and test driven. It went into reverse a few times but then just said 'Nope...ain't gonna happen!'. So back in the shop and back in the air. This time it was the rear clamp holding the shift tube to the internal shift rod of the tranny. The clamp was too large and was not clamping with enough force to hold the tube as it should. After sourcing the correct clamp and installed she now goes into 'backards' all the time. It was told to me that Clyde will now have his convertible in the Veterans Parade. Good to hear!






Birmingham, AL Veteran's Day Parade

Refinishing a Wood Grain Steering Wheel

On one of my visits to Russ he showed me a Corvair simulated wood grain steering wheel he had got on one of his parts hunts. As a lead in he brought up how much it cost to have one of them restored (hint, hint...). Then he asked if I thought I could do something with it, and of course I volunteered. If you are a restoration purist out there, you may want to quit reading here. If you want a laugh or two, keep going. Bottom line is this was trial and error and it worked, so I think it is worth passing along.



The wheel was extremely dirty and it was evident it had been out of a car for a long time. There was one deep crack which would need to be filled.

The first thing to do was to clean it up to get it down to the original stuff. Since I didn't know anything about the wheel, even if it was real wood or not, I started with some 600 grit sandpaper on a small part of the back side. The paper quickly loaded up with grime and some light scraping with a razor blade indicated a greasy type of scum on the wheel. It was evident some internet investigation and heavier equipment would be needed.

The internet didn't really provide much help so it was back down to the garage and some 400 grit paper. The 400 loaded up almost as fast as the 600, so down to 220 grit and try again. The 220 worked a lot better, but by the way it was loading up I decided to get out the chemicals.

After looking through my stash of cleaners I decided on some Formby's Paint and Poly Remover, mostly because I've been using it over the summer for some projects and was familiar with how it worked. If you use this stuff, follow all the safety precautions on the can. This stuff will burn you bad if you get a glob on you! After putting on the recommended PPE, including a face shield, I applied a glob on a clean rag and wiped it quickly on to the wheel. When I got around it I immediately wiped it off with another clean rag. Since I still wasn't sure if it was wood or plastic I didn't want it on there too long and have it cause any damage. The wipe off rag came out extremely dirty so I knew I was making progress. The wheel didn't look so black and grimy either. Two more applications resulted in a dark bronze colored wheel instead of black grime colored, and inspection with a magnifying glass on another razor blade scrape indicated that most of the grime was gone and I was looking at most of the surface of the wheel.

I got my 220 paper back out and started sanding the back of the wheel where the indentions are for the fingers. This is not fun sanding, and after about a half hour I had worked around the back side. A clean piece of 220 around the front and sides gave the wheel an even more bronzed color. Over the next week or so on my way by the bench I'd stop and sand around the wheel with the 220 using light to medium pressure, then inspecting with the magnifying glass to see placed where the grime was still sticking and where I should focus my work. I didn't want to remove too much material, but still get the grimy places down to the original surface. After each pass I'd wipe the wheel with a clean rag liberally soaked in acetone. This would dissolve what sanding dust was on the wheel and seemed to 'melt' it back on to the wheel. A rub with another clean rag buffed it to a shine. I continued this until I found no more spots of grime and I had a smooth shiny surface after buffing.

Now for the crack. I have some epoxy based wood filler that I use on goof ups when working with wood. I was really impressed with the stuff when building the swirl paint guitar using an old plywood guitar body. It's made by Elmer's and is available in the paint and stain section at the home center. It comes in a rectangular tub. I'd tell you the name, but I'm too lazy to go down to the garage and get it!!!

The instructions say it is paintable, stainable and sandable. I've sanded it and painted it, but never tried stain. I applied it to the crack, let it dry and applied some stain I'd mixed to match the wheel. The filler wouldn't stain to the color I wanted, even after applying it 4 or 5 times. I finally used a scroll saw blade to clean the filler out of the crack. My next attempt was to use the oil based stain mixture and tint the filler before application. This only thinned the filler to the point of being a brown gooey mess. After another tour through all my stains, fillers, dyes, etc. I ran across some Tobacco Brown Color Tone Liquid Stain a friend of mine left when we were applying finish to a guitar I was helping him build. This is a water based product instead of oil based and can be found a guitar parts sellers such as Stewart McDonald. Back to the trial and error I mixed the stain with the filler, filled the crack, sanded then removed it with the scroll saw blade when it didn't match good enough. After about a half dozen attempts to match the color of the wheel, I got it close; just a little too dark.

After sanding the filler smooth to the wheel and sanding the wheel again I used the acetone drenched rag as a kind of sealer and started to work on the aluminum parts of the wheel. These quickly cleaned up with some aluminum cleaner and polish. A final buffing all over the wheel and it was done.

The total time spent on the wheel was around 10 – 12 hours as far as I can tell. Most of the work was done as I was passing by the work bench except for filling the crack, which was about an hour each time I had to clean out the filler and re-apply. I have a greater respect for the price charged by the pros as the cleaning and sanding part is really a pain. But, if you need your wheel refinished, I guarantee I'll be a lot cheaper. Heck, I've even been known to work for beer!


