Dear Friends,

Happy Advent and happy New Year! Advent is the beginning of the new year for the church. It's also a time when we prepare for Christ's coming by thinking about what we need to do and be as disciples of Christ.

It takes all of us working together to be the church and to be a community of faith.

"For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ." (1 Corinthians 12:12)

In our various church groups, people offer their gifts to the work of the church by doing the things necessary for a healthy community. Some groups raise money and plan how to use our resources so the church can continue to thrive. Other groups help us to grow as Christians through education and formation. We have a group that plans ways to share our resources with those in need around the world. And of course, all groups provide opportunities for Christian fellowship. By working together, we do the work God has called us to as disciples of Jesus Christ.

We all have a part to play in the church and together we do the work and ministry of Church of the Advent.

The season of advent reminds us, though, that the real purpose of Church of the Advent is not to have worship and fellowship activities. Sometimes it surprises people to hear that – wait, worship isn't the main purpose of a church? No, our purpose is to proclaim the Gospel to the world and help God's people in our wider community. Worship strengthens us to be disciples: to go into the world and minister to people.

Fellowship helps us build community and serve each other. Both things are important, but they are not the purpose of the church. They are not solely what we are called to do as disciples of Christ.

Wonderful things happen when churches focus on doing God's ministry in the world rather than focusing their energy entirely on internal matters. As we begin a new church year, let's unite ourselves as a community of faith that looks outwards to the world. Then we are truly serving Christ as his disciples.

ADVENT PROPERTY COMMITTEE UPDATE

We celebrate the close of the year with good news indeed! The Diocesan Council, in response to the recommendation of the Diocesan Loan/Grant Committee, has agreed to support the deferred projects as outlined in Advent's application with a relatively short-term, low-interest loan. As the upcoming season permits, and in sync with contractor schedules, improvements to stairs, safe ADA access, parking lot designations, and completion of landscaping design will finally be realized. In the meantime, special thanks to our Sexton, Onesimo Corona, for repainting yellow striping on all stairs in consideration of the time change bringing dark evening hours. Moving Forward...

November 14th finally came. Months of declining vitality, chafed by weeks of precautionary isolation, were ending. COVID and medical clearance delays since last summer had finally run their course. Medical science and art—diagnostic, testing, surgical, nursing, therapeutic, plus the spiritual support of many people intervened—all came to bear on the task of repairing my failing heart at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania. I was to experience a concentrated surge of expert care from doctors, surgeons, PAs, NPs, RNs, technicians, and support from many of you.

In retrospect, I see the process as an intricate choreography set to ever-slowing musical movement. It was a dance of measured medical restoration by doctors and surgeons extended through the ministration of nursing of all stripe, entwined by the swathing of prayer and support by many more. My experience with this dance began with a predawn drive from shore to city, delivering me to an orderly registration, followed by well-honed preparation steps; then an **adagio** of gurney wheels rolling briskly down polished floors through double doors to the OR where multiple hands swirled about the OR, fiddling or positioning this or that technology over me with a *series* of IV's started. I nodded to multiple soft-voiced checks on my comfort as twilight but not darkness ascended into my hyper-alertness, muting my awareness. Then, **accelerando**, a slow minuet of mystical masked figures, each in turn, shimmered in and out of my supine view. Next, **ritardando**, hushed and meticulous movements of dramatic and intimate, extensive and intimate, virtuoso and rudiment, transforming me, infirm, to one, renewed. In less than three hours, a voice pronounced from somewhere on the borders of my hearing, "It is done. It all went well."

Then more gurney wheeling into a swish of reassuring voices and sponge stick massaging cold water on my parched tongue and lips in recovery; then more gurney movement in and up the elevator and out, finally ending in a space lit by reflected light from a vaulting tight-cluster of center city buildings that vaulted into a cloudless skyline. Another flurry of hands, then melting away, full stop!

Finally, in solitary, I hesitate, then **rallentando**, I release my crimped-up knuckles and drift into relenting sleep to soft, rhythmic beeps and hums of rolling monitor screens graphing heartbeat, bp, and O_2 measurements. A quiet voice from somewhere inside interpolates it all, "Let go now. Let your healing begin."

The mystical dance continues in the following days of drip, pinch, stick, and steady monitor beeps. New, caring faces emerge around the clock in day-and-night shift shuffles; an aperiodic pattern of visits at all hours by the sage and humble technicians ensues—all caring, all focused, and all are ministering those measures to return me to a less labored life of gratitude and hope.

I am home now. Yet, the dance perichoretic continues in my heart in new metaphor and rhythm. I am prompted to remember the powerful synergy of communities linked in prayer, support, healing, recovery, encouragement, and restoration. Not just for me but for all, at all times, places, and circumstances. I am reminded once again that nurturing communities lie at the center of our Anglican/Episcopal ethos. This gives rise to new and different codas of our enduring faith and practice. I reflect that in the interstices between home, hospital, family, friends, and parish, we experience God in [the sometimes highly skilled] giving to, receiving from, and mutually sustaining of each other through all tests and challenges. The important modern poet Wallace Stevens opines, "Life is an affair of people, not of [things and] places." And the central wonder of it all is that this was sprung from a simple manger in a stable at Bethlehem in Judah in Palestine long ago in the divine dance of loving, healing intervention, to the effect, as John the Divine, parish patron, records, "See, I make all things new." *Rev. 21:5.*
