in our garden to entice the released Monarchs to land and take a sip of nectar. New this year is an amazing water feature which replaces the original fountain. The new gently flowing "river" is pollinator friendly and gives off a relaxing ambience.

There will be plenty to see and enjoy:

Birth flowers

According to the language of flowers, introduced to England in the early 18th century by Mary Wortley Montague, flowers had meanings. Each month has a symbolic flower whose characteristics may be "inherited" by anyone born in that month. Later authors have been inspired by this tradition to create lists that associate a birthday flower with each day of the year.

The birth month flower for June is the rose and honeysuckle, meaning romance and love. July is larkspur and water lily, meaning positivity, dignity and grace.

What I've Learned.....Multiplying Your Perennials



Ever wish you had more than one of a favorite perennial but didn't want to dig it up to divide it? Actually it is easy to increase your plants using the technique of cuttings.

Here's one method I use. Fill a 4" pot for with soilless mix, get it wet but let all the excess water drain away. Take four 4 - 6" cuttings from a non-flowering stem; or you could just cut the flower off. Remove the lower leaves. If the cutting has large leaves I like to cut about half the leave off to help with moisture loss. Rooting hormone can be a help but usually is not necessary. You can dip two cuttings and try two without. Shake off any excess powder. Make four holes with a pencil or similar tool. Insert each cutting in a hole. Gently firm the soil around the stem. Place the pot with the cuttings in a clear plastic bag using plant markers

to keep the bag above the cuttings. Seal the top with a twist tie. Place in a warm very bright spot that will not receive any direct sun.

Check periodically and remove any that might start to rot. I like to blow in the bag to change the air from time to time. When the cuttings have rooted, open the bag to let the moisture level equalize with the outside air. If they wilt, close the bag and wait a bit longer. Gradually expose the rooted cuttings to more light adjusting their exposure as they mature. Finally move each cutting to its own pot or plant in the garden protecting it from the sun if necessary.

The end of June is about the latest that is recommended to take cuttings. While they will probably still root, I suspect they will not be mature enough to make it through the winter. These new plants will benefit from extra protection against changing temperatures and harsh conditions throughout the winter. A mulch of pine boughs is a tried and true method of protecting plants. Apply after the ground has frozen. They are usually not happy spending the winter in their original 4" pot above ground.

I have saved numerous plants using this method. Having found the original plant to not have survived the winter, I was thrilled to find the new plant had survived. My Blue Fortune anise hyssop, Alma Potschke aster, and Pink Delight butterfly bush are still around because of cuttings. This year I've already rooted cuttings of Cinderella Swamp Milkweed to replace other swamp milkweeds that didn't survive. Here's hoping they achieve some size before the monarchs arrive!

Gardening Tip From Susan Wisneski....



Give hanging baskets a good soak! When they get too dry, take the basket down and set in a pan or bucket of water for 10 minutes. Then rehang and let them drip dry.

Epsom Salt for your plants.



Epsom Salt is magnesium sulfate. If my soil is deficient, I use 1 tablespoon, sprinkle around base of plant, blend into the soil and water thoroughly. I use this around my peppers and tomatoes early in the sea-

son. Works for me!

Pinch your petunias.



Make them fat and sassy! I do this around July 4th. Trim off the growing tip using scissors or your fingernail. This will force the petunia to

produce two new growing tips below the cut.
