Easy Assist to Native Bees by Sandy Truckner



We all want to help pollinators. And here is an easy way we can do so. Simply delay cleaning up our gardens until temperatures are reaching 50, probably some time in late April or early May. Right now in all those dead plant stems in the garden mason and other native bees are spending the winter. When it is warm enough they will chew their way out, mate, and begin the process again.

Kelly Riley in her column in the Farm and Dairy writes "Most people don't realize that 80% of native bees nest in dead plant stems. Each stem can house up to 20 pollinator larvae which

spend six months developing before emerging as fully formed bees". This usually happens in mid April into May. I have this date down pretty solid because a couple years ago the mason bees in the barn were emerging from the bamboo home which was tied near the lambing pens. So not only were there new babies in the pens, there were new bees flying around the pens too. Mason bees generally don't sting but it was a bit bothersome. Needless to say I moved their bamboo tube home elsewhere.

So if we clean up our garden too soon, or worse yet, have already done so last fall, we might be needlessly eliminating a generation of native bees in our yard.

Kelly goes on to say that "mason bees, leaf cutter bees, native wasps, and other beneficial insects also reply on these natural habitats to complete their life cycles". Butterflies and moths such as swallowtails and fritillaries usually overwinter in chrysalises or pupas in the garden and wild areas. It is only too easy to cut down and rake out the plant material they are adhering to.

Another beloved insect we can help by this practice of leaving plant litter is the fire fly. Fire flies overwinter in leaf litter or just under the soil surface. Not only do they play an important role in pollination they are exciting to watch when they light up. Just north of here Allegheny National Forest holds an annual Firefly Festival during the last week in June. This date coincides with the mating displays of over fifteen different species of fireflies that call Allegheny National Forest home.

So if you've noticed a decline in fireflies in your yard, you might want to leave your leaves in your gardens and encourage your neighbors and friends to do the same.

Let's all take pride in our gardens decorated with dried plant material and leaves. So much so that when we see a winter garden neat and devoid of any plant residue, the next thought becomes, "What happened to all their native bees and butterflies and fireflies?"

If you just can't stand to leave all those plant stems sticking up every which way, you could cut them off and bundle them with twine and set them in a similar setting to await the emergence of this year's pollinators.

Clustered Mountain Mint



Botanical name of this pollinator favorite is Pycnanthemum muticum. Voted as 2025 perennial plant of the year by Perennial Plant Association members, is also known as clustered mountain mint, blunt mountain mint or short-toothed mountain mint.

Clustered Mountain Mint is a pollinator favorite, attracting beneficial insects and is widely used in butterfly and herb gardens. It grows 2 – 3 feet tall in dense clumps and loves the sun. It will tolerate some shade and blooms with white or pink flowers, adding a bright pop of color.

Some people crush the leaves and rub them on the skin to prevent mosquito bites and keep ticks at bay.

Bonus! Clustered Mountain Mint repels deer and rabbits with its strong mint scent. That strong scent adds a sensory addition to any garden.
