The release will take place in the beautiful **LeFevre Butterfly Garden** located at the bottom of the parking lot behind the main Garden Center building. The colorful flowers there will entice the released Monarchs to land to take a sip of nectar.

What I Learned....Cuttings/Cutting Back by Sandy Truckner



If you are like me you lost some favorites over the winter. Late winter/early spring weather was tough on a lot of plants with excess rain creating lingering wet conditions, not to mention the early warm up followed by a couple freezes.

Now is the time to create some insurance against losses next winter by taking cuttings of your favorites. See the article in the summer 2021 newsletter for tips on how to take the cuttings. But basically you take a 4 - 6" cutting, place it in damp soilless mix, cover with a clear plastic bag or box, keep in bright light but not direct

sunlight. Trim back any leaves that are too large. Check periodically and air out.

There is still time to cut back by 1/3 to 1/2 any perennials that are too tall. Most will come back as strong as ever. They will bloom a little later but probably won't need staking now. Here are some that can be cut back: phlox, monarda/bee balm, aster, ironweed, veronica, balloon flower, goldenrod, Joe pye weed, Russian sage, heliopsis, boneset, artemisia, nepeta. July 1 is about the latest to cut back because it does delay flowering.

Here are some perennials that you wouldn't want to cut back: iris, day lilies, red hot pokers, true lilies, ornamental grasses, and similar plants, any that have the flowering stalk coming directly from the base of the plant. I can speak from personal experience that cutting back those overly tall lilies doesn't work.

Back to lost plants. I used to take a start of my pink chrysanthemum (Hillside Sheffield Pink) to May Mart when I could. Unfortunately it was one of the plants that didn't make it through the winter. So if you happened to buy one of those plants and can take a cutting, I'd sure appreciate seeing it at the September annual plant auction.

"Pollinator Palooza"



Westmoreland Pollinator Partners is offering a passport for a tour of pollinator-friendly gardens across Westmoreland County.

Anyone visiting at least six of the 21 featured gardens will be eligible to receive a free native plant that appeals to local pollinator species.

Passport folders for the Pollinator Palooza Tour will be available at the Ligonier Country Market special feature booth on June 25, Aug. 13 and Sept. 17. Stickers

confirming a visit will be available at the participating gardens Participants also can document visits by taking photos of the native plants in the gardens. Anyone photographing a native plant will receive an additional native plant while supplies last.

The idea of the passport is to see the various gardens and to take back ideas to your own lawn, garden or yard.

Participating gardens in Greensburg include Historic Hanna's Town Gardens, **Greensburg Garden Center LeFevre Butterfly Garden**, Penn State Master Gardener Donohoe Center Demonstration Gardens, Westmoreland Conservation District Meadow, The Westmoreland Museum of American Art Garden, Amos K. Hutchinson Elementary School Garden and West Penn Power Garden.

There are also participating gardens in the Ligonier, Latrobe-Derry, and Mt. Pleasant-Scottdale areas. For information, including a map of member gardens, visit Westmoreland Pollinator Partners on Facebook.
