Elm Spring Farm: A Legacy Rooted in History and Family

For nearly 185 years, Elm Spring Farm in Hughesville, Missouri, has stood as a testament to resilience and family heritage. Established in 1840 by General David Thomson, the farm was built adjacent to the natural spring that still flows today, a key reason Thomson chose this land after moving from Georgetown, Kentucky. The two-story brick farmhouse, designed in the Federal style, has endured for generations, with each family adding to its rich history.

By the **1960s**, the farm had fallen into disrepair, but **Lee Dow** took it upon himself to restore and preserve it, ensuring it remained in the family. His son, **Frank Dow**, made Elm Spring Farm his home for **over 40 years**, raising his family and continuing the tradition of hard work and stewardship. His wife, **Wanda**, who shares a deep connection to the farm's history, built **a cabin adjacent to the farmhouse**, allowing the family to remain on the land while protecting the original home.

For **Crystal Dow**, Elm Spring Farm is more than a historic property—it is **her childhood home**. She grew up on the farm before leaving for **15 years**, traveling the world with her husband, **Matthew Adler**, during his service in the **U.S. Air Force**. Their oldest son, **Brody Lee Adler**, was born in **Germany** while they were stationed at **Incirlik Air Base in Turkey** and was named in honor of **Lee Dow**, who played a crucial role in preserving the farm.

Now back home, Crystal and Matt, a disabled veteran, live in the historic farmhouse with their two sons, Brody (16) and Barrett (6), while Wanda resides in the adjacent cabin. After the passing of her father, Frank Dow, Crystal officially established Elm Spring Farm LLC in February 2024, carrying forward the family's commitment to preserving, sustaining, and growing the farm's future.
