


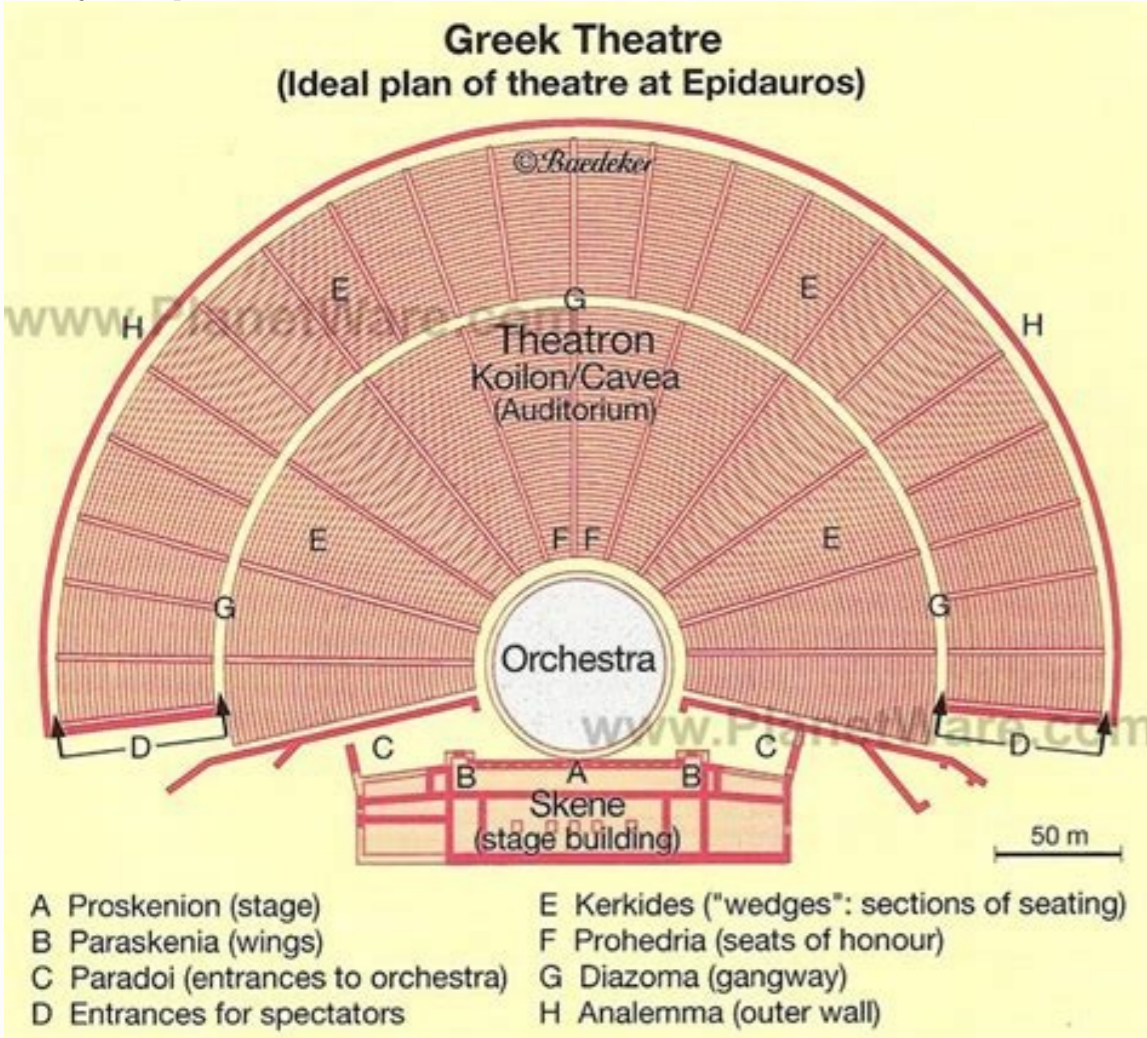
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Greek theater seating chart section a

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In Ancient Greek Theatre seating was somewhat related to social class, but not completely. It's actually quite simple to explain. There was only two kinds of seating. VIP seating was for priests and officials of the city. These seats were called Prohedria. These were considered seats of honor. In the theatre anyone was welcome to watch the plays and musicals. Attending the theatre was considered so important that the government paid for the poor to attend. This meant that everyone could attend the theatre regardless of social class. In conclusion, Ancient Greek Theatre demonstrated social class, but still included both rich and poor people. Greek Theatre Los Angeles Seating Chart When you look at the Greek Theatre Los Angeles seating chart embedded below, you'll be able to see the seven distinct seating sections. In all, the Greek Theatre seating capacity is nearly 6,000, and each section in the theater offers a unique view of the stage. Greek Theatre Pit Seating Views The Pit Level of the Greek Theatre Los Angeles seating chart may be configured as a standing-room-only section or with reserved seating. Regardless, the Pit is the closest level to the stage, so you're guaranteed to get up-close-and-personal with the artist no matter the Pit seating layout. Greek Theatre Section A Seating Views Section A is the first level behind the Pit on the seating chart. The first few rows of this level will get you very close to the performers and are some of the most desirable seats in the Greek Theatre. Even the rows farther back in Section A will be close enough to get a solid view of all the action happening on stage. Greek Theatre Section B Seating Views The central section of the main seating level is Section B. Four sections across, this level provides the most balanced view of the stage, and its slight elevation over Section A makes for a solid view of the performers at the front of the theater. Greek Theatre Section C Seating Views Section C is an elevated section at the rear of the venue. If you don't mind being farther from the stage, Section C isn't a bad spot to sit during Greek Theatre Los Angeles concerts. The sound is still excellent, as you can hear in the video below, and the tiered seating allows you to see the full stage. Greek Theatre Terrace Seating Views The Terrace Levels on the Greek Theatre Los Angeles seating chart are elevated above the main levels and to the sides of Sections A and B. These will offer the most aerial view of any level in the venue, as demonstrated in the video below. Section 6 offers a comfortable head-on view for end-stage shows Head-on to the Stage: Seats directly across from the stage, like those in Section 5, Section 6, Section C and Section D provide the most comfortable looks of the performance. Bench Seats - For fans who don't like the flat seating or extreme angles of the lower bowl, seating in the center of the benches (sections 4-7) is a fantastic alter...Lawn Seats - A unique way to take in a show at the Greek Theatre is on the steep lawn located behind the main seating bowl. This is a small general admission seat...Pit Tickets Seating - For most shows, the Pit is a reserved seating split up into left and right sections.



The Pit usually features twelve rows of seating with Row 1 right ...Seats With Backs - Tickets in sections A-F and the Pit at the Greek Theater will have seats with backs. These sections are closest to the stage and provide the most comfort. The intimate Greek Theatre is a completely open-air venue with no overhead protection. Additionally, umbrellas are on the venue's prohibited items list. If you're seeking refuge from the sun, the best seats for shade are the Left Pit and the front rows of sections D, E and F. When the sun begins setting behind the stage, these seats will be the first to be shaded. Sections C and D are at the center of orchestra seating and provide some of the best views of the stage. Like the closer Pit seats, ticketholders in the middle of the orchestra will have head-on views of the stage - but the distance from the stage makes it slightly easier on the neck to look up at the stage. All orchestra seating is on chairs with a back. The traditional layout of the Greek Theatre in Berkeley results in some interesting seating angles in Sections A and F. While some of the seats in these sections are as close to the stage (or closer) as Pit seating, the seats face the Pit instead of the stage. This creates regrettable sightlines for some, while others will appreciate the historic layout and won't mind the angle. Seating in the Orchestra is on folding chairs with a back. Each section has a varying amount of rows and seats. Find a section to see row and/or seat numbers. Concessions and restrooms at the Greek Theatre are available at the top of Sections 1 and 10.
