Course Description:

Remove the anxiety out of writing by using IEW's systematic and incremental approach. Engaging historical source texts (Colonial life, Boston Tea Party, Declaration of Independence, the Statue of Liberty, the Space Race...) are used to help students learn to extract key ideas, invaluable in note-taking. Checklists provide a concrete way to determine what must be included in each paper. Students also add to their vocabulary, learn how to organize their sources, conduct research, and write top quality papers. (It is not necessary to be studying American history concurrently, to take this course.) This course covers all nine of the IEW writing units, so that previous exposure to IEW is helpful, but not necessary.)
